SHARING YOUR TIME AND TALENTS

A Better Way

whether a Christian should give to their church. Of course, Christians should give to their church. Everyone knows this. Rather, the question asked most is, "How much should I give?" But this question really means, "Should Christians give a tenth of their income to their local congregation?"

Here are some common reasons against tithing. Some say tithing isn't necessary because it isn't expressly commanded in the New Testament. There is no "Thus saith the Lord," or "should" concerning tithing. Others say that Christians give to their congregation in ways much broader than money. They give of their time and their talents, and these together with treasures (money) add up to more than a tithe. Still others say that they give of their treasures to other things besides their congregation, and they want to support those things alongside their church. And then there are those who think Christians shouldn't tithe because of some fear. They are afraid that if they tithe, their gift will be misused, or that after tithing, there won't be enough left over to get the things that they use, want, or need.

Here are some reasons why Christians should tithe. Even though the New Testament doesn't specifically command Christians to tithe, the Old Testament people were commanded to tithe. And on top of this, St. Paul often describes giving a regular and generous proportion of the first fruits of one's income - terms similar to a tithe (2 Cor. 8:7-23; 2 Cor. 9:2-7).

But here's another way to think about it: What was the point of the tithe in the Old Testament? Where did it go? This tithe was intended to support the ministry of the Levites. They were not given any land because they had no time to farm; their full-time job was the ministry. What does it say in the New Testament? "The Lord commanded that those who proclaim the gospel should get their living by the gospel" (1 Cor. 9:14). This is the verse that Luther used in the Small Catechism's Table of Duties to explain what Christians owe to the support of the ministry.

The most common question about stewardship is not It seems clear from both the Old and the New Testaments that the tithe is the goal of Christians in their giving. But what if we're not there yet? How should we handle this? What are we to do?

> Let's answer this by asking a different question. What would you say to your adult children who only attended church quarterly or once a month? After all, there is no passage in the New Testament that requires Christians to go to church weekly. Hebrews 10:25 is the closest verse we have, and it states simply that Christians should not neglect gathering together. And even though there is no passage that commands Christians to gather weekly, that is the implicit expectation throughout the Old and New Testaments.

So, what would you say to that son or daughter? The conversation might go something like this. I'm glad you're still going to church. It is a wonderful blessing to hear God's promises of forgiveness, life and salvation, and to receive His gifts in Word and Sacrament. But you can do better, and it will only be a blessing to you. There is a better way, and I'd really like you to try to attain it.

We should approach the topic of tithing with a similar conversation. The tithe is not specifically commanded in the New Testament, but it sure seems like the implicit expectation of both the Old and New Testaments. So, we're ecstatic that you're giving, and that you're giving in all these various ways — time, talents and treasures. But there is a better way. And that will only be a blessing to you, just as the Word of God — Old and New Testament alike promises. Can you try increasing your gifts over the coming weeks, months and years? Can you put your trust in the God who sent His Son to take away your sin and give you everlasting life? And if He did this for you, if He did not spare His only Son, how will He not give you all things? He will not disappoint.

SPRING MISSION—NEW LIFE RESOURCE CENTER



NEW LIFE RESOURCE CENTER is a non-profit pregnancy center that has been helping mothers in the La Crosse area for 40 years. The center was started with a desire to offer Christ-centered counseling to women who are experiencing an unplanned pregnancy. Over time, the center has expanded to provide services like practical assistance to mothers and families in need.

New Life Resource Center is considered a bridge ministry. Offering help to those in need provides an opportunity to share the Gospel. Friendship and spiritual counsel is offered to help women make God-pleasing choices. Practical assistance (infant/toddler clothing, diapers, baby supplies) is also offered free of charge. Every client is encouraged to take one or more free Bible books.

The center also offers children's Bibles, prayer books, and Bible story books for all ages and reading levels. These ageappropriate items help mothers teach their children about Jesus.

Some of the moms are dealing with issues like homelessness, domestic abuse, childcare, rental/eviction assistance, food needs, substance abuse, and mental/physical health needs. These moms are referred to other helpful non-profits in the area that can be of service to them.

New Life Resource Center is a self-supporting organization that relies on the financial support of area churches and members. Donations of gently used infant and toddler clothing as well as other baby related items can be donated to the center. All items are given free of charge. Helping mothers in the community is the bridge that is used to help mothers with physical needs as well as spiritual needs.

She attended the University of Wisconsin – Madison where she obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree in Journalism. After graduation she married Allen Ginsberg and they lived in several cities including Akron, Ohio, Minneapolis, and Washington DC. After Barbara and Allen divorced, she met and married Frank Tiona and they moved back to the Coulee Region on a farm outside Bangor. Barbara began work as the Marketing Director at Valley View Mall. After the death of her husband, she moved to Onalaska continuing with Valley View Mall until her retirement. Barbara enjoyed working with people but also loved animals and taking care of her home and flower garden. She read extensively and was active in her church, Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church of Onalaska.

She is survived by her sister, Tamara Hagen, of Madison and special friend Charles Dahl of Onalaska. She was preceded in death by her parents and husband.

A Memorial Service will be held to celebrate her life on Saturday April 15th at The Gathering Place 133 Mason St., Onalaska. Visitation is from 10:00-11:00 am with a service by Pastor David Baumgarn at 11:00am. A lunch will be provided.

In lieu of flowers, memorials to La Crosse Humane Society and Onalaska Public Library are preferred.

RAYMOND M. MICHALKO (better known as Ray, Dad, Grandpa, Homey, and All Day Ray) 82, passed away peacefully into the loving arms of Jesus, his personal Lord and Savior, on March 1st, 2023. He was at his home with his loving wife, Vickie by his side.

Ray was born on November 28th, 1940 at his family homestead in Blackduck, MN to Paul and Anna (Smuda) Michalko. Ray's parents immigrated to the United States in the early 1900s from Prague, Czechoslovakia. He was very proud of his Czechoslovakian heritage, but even more proud of his strong Christian faith. He was baptized on January 19th, 1941 and confirmed on March 29th, 1953 – both at Holy Trinity Church Missouri Synod in Blackduck, MN.

He graduated from Blackduck High School in 1958 and afterwards, attended classes in Thief River Falls, MN. He later moved to St. Paul, MN and worked for Witte Transportation until he transferred to La Crosse, WI in 1961 as an assistant manager. After working there for 15 years, he moved on to work for Moen Photo in La Crosse as a warehouse manager and a driver supervisor for 4 years. In 1984, he opened Ray's Small Engine Repair Shop, working from his home. He ended up closing shop in 2003 due to health concerns. He also worked for WWTC – La Crosse in the maintenance department from 1983 until he retired in 2004. Ray continued to work during his retire-

ment, picking up shifts to cover vacations/sick calls. He had an admirable work ethic and was a great provider for his family.

Ray was an avid fan of the Minnesota Vikings football team. He rarely missed watching a game on TV. He enjoyed fishing, hunting, and bowling as well. He was well known in the La Crosse area as a very good bowler as he was a member of the "700 Club". At one time, he was the only known bowler in La Crosse who accomplished to bowl a 700 series in each of the bowling houses (3 at that time).

Ray met the love of his life, Vickie, at the Sports Bowl (La Crosse) in 1972. They were married on June 16th, 1973 at Faith Lutheran Church in La Crosse, WI. They almost made their 50th anniversary, but they did end up being together for a little more than 50 years. Ray and Vickie were blessed with 3 children: William, Molly, and Joseph – whom he loved and was very proud of and all of their accomplishments. Family was very important to Ray, especially his grandson, Xavier, whom he was also proud of. He taught him how to fish and Xavier taught him to play chess. He truly cherished their time together.

Ray had a great sense of humor, always making others laugh and having a good time. He made many friends throughout his life. He will be greatly missed, but will never be forgotten. He will remain in our hearts forever.

Resurrection Roll Recipe

We make these special treats each year at our Easter party! We hope you enjoy this fun Easter recipe! This recipe is the perfect activity to share with children or grandchildren.

Items Needed:

1 can refrigerated crescent rolls, 8 marshmallows, melted butter, cinnamon and sugar

- 1. Give each child triangle dough. This represents the tomb.
