Pastor's Soundings in the Trumpeter...

Bill Kitzman lent me a set of horns from an Iranian Red Sheep. The students at Grace Lutheran School chapel were thrilled to look at them closely, touch them and ask questions. They wanted to know all about those horns. They were once horns that rammed the enemy, but they were also horns that bullied others into submission.

Zechariah writes, "And I lifted my eyes and saw, and behold, four horns! And I said to the angel who talked with me, "What are these?" And he said to me, "These are the horns that have scattered Judah, Israel, and Jerusalem." Then the LORD showed me four craftsmen. And I said, "What are these coming to do?" He said, "These are the horns that scattered Judah, so that no one raised his head. And these have come to terrify them, to cast down the horns of the nations who lifted up their horns against the land of Judah to scatter it."" (Zechariah 1:18–21, ESV). Many of you were in worship either in person or on Facebook on February 24th. You heard how Jesus Christ has won us the victory in Jesus Christ, and He continues to build His church. Our real enemies are conquered. This we live by faith.

However, faith can only be ignited and sustained by God's Word, specifically the Gospel. Those horns in Zechariah represented the enemies of God's people. These enemies were the horns that kept God's people from building the temple and living as God's freed people. These horns kept them from receiving the means of grace and living the new life.

It is the season of Lent. It is a time to examine ourselves to see what keeps from receiving the means of grace, which is Word and Sacrament. We also need to examine what keeps us from living the new life. Some of us have more trouble with the first. Some of us have more trouble with the second. All of us have trouble with both, whether we are in worship or not. We can go to Facebook or sit in the pew and watch the service. Was worship simply the background noise to what we are doing or thinking? We can leave church or exit Facebook. Now, what change is going to happen in our life? Our Lord is not just looking for us to have good lives. He's looking for us to have repentant and renewed lives. We are to be confident in Him and what He is doing.

The book of Hebrews describes what this new life is like, "Let brotherly love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unawares. Remember those who are in prison, as though in prison with them, and those who are mistreated, since you also are in the body. Let marriage be held in honor among all [single, married, divorced and widowed], and let the marriage bed be undefiled, for God will judge the sexually immoral and adulterous. Keep your life free from love of money [rich or poor or able to pay bills or sinking in debt], and be content with what you have, for he has said, "I will never leave you nor forsake you." So we can confidently say, "The Lord is my helper; I will not fear; what can man do to me?" Remember your leaders, those who spoke to you the word of God. Consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever." (Hebrews 13:1–8, ESV [Italics mine])

So whether you are in the pew, on Facebook, or looking at TV's "Main Street Living," don't let the horns of life get in the way of feeding your faith and living it. Look forward to when we can all be together again. Make plans for when we can ALL be together again. Make plans to get the means of grace, Word and SACRAMENT. "And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near." (Hebrews 10:24–25, ESV)

IF trimming from envelopes, leave at least 1/4 inch around stamp.

Greetings from Grace Lutheran School,

First and foremost, we owe an enormous debt of gratitude to our Giving Hearts Day supporters and to those who helped us spread the word to about our event. We raised over \$57,000 this year, including a \$25,000 match, which goes a long way in offering scholarships, competitive salaries, and other improvements to the quality of the education we offer at GLS. Our hearts are full. Thank you.

It is enrollment season at Grace. We have an open house coming up on Thursday, March 11, for all grades, Pre-K through 8th grade. New Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten families who register before March 15th will receive a \$600 reduction on tuition. New Pre-K and K families who register before April 15th will receive a \$500 reduction on tuition. Families must commit to returning to Grace again in 2022-2023 to qualify for this discount.

Camp Grace registration is now open to all children in our community. Camp Grace is full-time summer childcare for 4-12 year olds at Grace Lutheran School, running from June 1 - August 20. The \$175/week fee covers breakfast, lunch, snacks, and ALL activities. Openings are also available for half day mornings or half day afternoons for \$100/week.


We continue to have a wonderful year of unique challenges and healthy kids. We thank you for your continued prayers for our students, teachers, families, and staff.
