Pastor's Soundings in the Trumpeter...

Research and anecdotal evidence suggest that youth need at least five influential adults in their lives, besides their parents and other family members. Those five adults serve as mentors, role models, confidants, and cheerleaders. Those of you who have raised or are now raising teenagers may be able to attest to this. Think about your children, and the adults who were (or are) involved in their lives. Who are they? What makes them such important figures in your children's lives? The reasons are manifold, I'm sure, but I suspect that they all boil down to one simple concept: They care, and they demonstrate that care by action.

Many youth will probably cite their parents or other family members, along with teachers, coaches, and possibly pastors or youth group leaders as being the most influential people in their lives. But how many would list a neighbor or church member? I don't know, but I have a feeling the number is much lower. I, for one, would love to see that number be much higher. A couple of years ago we implemented a program here at Saint Andrew to attempt that, congregational prayer partners. Each youth of our congregation was paired with an adult member who was to pray for that youth and ideally, if possible, to meet with that youth occasionally. Those meetings would be opportunities to catch up, find out what's going on in that youth's life, and learn ways the adult could pray for the youth. How are we doing? Have any of us kept it up? I'd be interested to know, and for those of you who have, thank you. God bless you. Because I know it isn't easy.

Youth ministry is commonly thought of as part of Christian education; we don't often think of it as Christian stewardship. And yet stewardship it is. We usually speak about stewardship in terms of "time, talents, and treasures." It's really the first one that's at stake here. It doesn't take any special skills and you don't have to have a lot of money to take an active interest in a kid's life. I applaud all of you who already do this and encourage you to keep it up. I also encourage those of you who may not be so engaged to look for opportunities to be one of those five so desperately needed adults of influence in a child's life. All it really takes is a little bit of time. Go to their games, concerts, and plays. Teach a kid how to fish or hunt. Take them out for ice cream or go grab a donut. These are all small things and might seem like they couldn't possibly have that big of an impact on a child's life. But they do, because they communicate to that young person one critical truth: I care about you, because God cares about you. And that's the first step to opening doors to much deeper and stronger relationships and conversations.

One of the recurring themes from our recent congregational self-study sounds something like this: "We need to keep the youth active and involved in the church." I agree. Wholeheartedly. And we tend to think this means we need to have more youth events, activities, "stuff for them to do." But I submit to you that "keeping the youth active in the church" has more to do with adults than it does with youth, and I don't just mean parents of current youth. We all have a responsibility—as a component of our faithful Christian stewardship of time—to take an active interest in our youth, to show them we genuinely care, that they are dearly loved children of God, and that they matter to us because they matter to Him.

At the same time, we will also continue to hold youth group events and activities. Not to do so would be irresponsible. So please take a look at the youth page(s) in this newsletter for a rundown of what we have coming up in our congregation, local area, district, and even nationwide. And may God bless all of our efforts to "keep our youth active and involved in the church," especially as we adults remain active and involved with them.

STAFFING ARRANGEMENT UPDATE

In a regular meeting of our congregational Voters' Assembly in November, 2019, Saint Andrew Lutheran Church elected to expand Pastor Harvala's parttime position as Assistant Pastor to full-time. On December 1, 2019 Pastor Harvala announced in both worship services his acceptance of that offer! His full -time service to our congregation officially began January 1, and a reception was held between the services on Sunday, January 12 to mark this joyful occasion and the change to his status and also to welcome him back into full-time ministry in the church. Now that we are once again served by two full-time called pastors, Pastor Jahnke and Pastor Harvala will be splitting the preaching and liturgy duties on Sunday mornings, as well as confirmation and Bible class teaching, counseling, and visitation. In addition to these specifically pastoral acts, and in the absence of a called Director of Christian Education, Pastor Harvala will also have oversight of the youth, young adult, and share oversight of education programs of the congregation, working alongside the Board of Education. While Pastor Harvala was serving us on only a parttime basis, he was also serving as the vacancy pastor at Our Redeemer Lutheran Church in Moorhead. This vacancy continues, but they are currently in the process of sending out another call. Pastor Harvala will continue to serve in that role as their vacancy pastor, at least through Easter, pending the outcome of the current call. Should the vacancy continue beyond that point, the arrangement of the ministry between our two congregations will be reevaluated in consultation between the pastors, congregational leadership, and our respective District presidents.

For now, we rejoice that God has provided workers in His kingdom and give thanks to Him for the work He is doing in our lives through the ministry of Word and Sacrament. Please continue to pray for our own pastors and for all church workers, and for our congregation, as well as for Our Redeemer, that God would provide for them as He has for us. May His grace and peace be with us all, in Jesus' name.

BACH CHOIR CONCERT

At Immanuel, April 4 at 7pm

Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) was a Lutheran church musician whose sacred compositions artfully communicate God's Word and other sacred texts that express the Christian faith. Bach himself was a man of deep faith, and this is evident in the texts he chose and the way that he sensitively expressed them through music. One author describes Bach's music as "so complex that it leaves us completely mystified, then at other moments so irresistibly rhythmic that we want to get up and dance to it, and then at others still so full of poignant emotion that we are moved to the very core of our being" (Bach: Music in the Castle of Heaven, Gardiner).

I'm excited to share with you that as a part of Immanuel's music ministry, I have started a new ensemble called the Fargo-Moorhead Bach Choir. This choir is made up of two smaller community choirs: the Bach Chamber Choir, a 16-member auditioned ensemble, and the Bach Festival Choir, comprised of Immanuel's choir and community members (no auditions). The goal of the F-M Bach Choir is to bring Bach's music and the message it artfully communicates to the community. In addition, we will present high-quality classical music in a concert setting with the hope of reaching community members who may not already know Jesus as their Savior.

The first concert of the F-M Bach Choir is Saturday, April 4, 7:00pm, at Immanuel and will include a professional string ensemble accompanying the choirs. The theme that runs through the pieces is the joy that is found in God's love, and in particular, the love that Jesus showed the world through offering Himself as a sacrifice on the cross and the subsequent joy of receiving salvation through that sacrifice.

I would like to extend an invitation to you to join me in this endeavor. You can support this ministry in a number of ways:
