## Pastor's Soundings in the Trumpeter...

So what do you want to be when you grow up? Answers are different for different stages of people's lives. When those who are elementary age respond, its easy for older people to smile, and think, "I wonder if they will say the same thing next time?" It gets more serious in high school. Parents want to know so they can plan for their son or daughter's future. Yet many change their minds during the college years. If a person doesn't know by age forty (or sooner) or is starting a family, we may think there's something seriously wrong with them. But how about when your children are grown? Do we quit asking? I believe it is important to keep asking, "What do I want to be when I grow up?" Asking the question keeps a person young and looking forward to new ways of serving others. It is a recognition that as time goes on, our vocations change as well. God has created us for a life of service, serving different ways at different times.

This is also true for our congregation. For the first 25 years of our existence we were on district subsidy. Who knew if this West Fargo Mission would succeed? We are thankful for the many congregations who stepped out in faith and supported the ministry of St. Andrew for those first 25 years of exponential growth. You might say the next 20 years were our pre-teen years. Our congregational life was crammed into a small building, half the size of our current one. Then by stepping out in faith, we expanded our building starting in 2005 taking on a large debt. You might call these years the teenage years. As we look to retire our debt our question is, "What do you as a congregation want to be when you grow up?" Or more importantly, "What does God want the ministry and mission of St. Andrew to be?" This is what the upcoming self-study is about.

"What does God what us to be?" First and foremost would be in the words of Ephesians 4:15, (ESV) "Rather, speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ." That can only happen when people are involved in Word and Sacrament. Corporate worship is vital, so is Bible Study. When we are involved, we give the Holy Spirit the opportunity to work. Being adults is not to stop our receiving from the Lord.

Next is our giving in mission, that is in words of Matthew 28:19 (ESV), "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations...." The required "how" is baptizing and teaching, but getting people to that point is left up to us, responding to the people and opportunities the Lord places in our lives. Take some time and look at all the missions our Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod is involved in at, our ND District work at, and the multiple Recognized Service Organizations (RSO). One RSO we have close to us is the Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch.

Remember the Red River Lutheran School Association from which we run Grace Lutheran School. Our school is both a ministry and a mission. A ministry to our members and a mission to others who are not a part of our congregations, especially to those who don't know Jesus.

As our congregation moves to adulthood and as move to retire our mortgage debt, always keep in mind the "why." If we loose the "why", there's no purpose in our existence. Our purpose is the ministry and mission which our Lord Jesus has given to us in this place and time.

So what does God want us to be as we grow in Christ?

## PHASE II OF THE DEBT REDUCTION CAMPAIGN HAS STARTED!

The Faithfully Forward Together committee recently met to formulate plans for Phase II. The goal of Phase II is to raise enough funds to **totally retire our mortgage debt** by 12/31/23 or sooner.

As a quick refresher, we started Phase I back in September 2021 when our debts totaled \$375,000. In the span of 5 short months, we raised \$128,000 of "over and above" giving to apply against our debt. Throughout 2022, we continued to make our required \$6,386 monthly mortgage payment. And we had some nice 4<sup>th</sup> quarter 2022 donations to FFT, despite the lack of any active campaign.

The combination of reduced expenses due to only one called worker, as well as some strong donations in the last 4 months of 2022 caused our 2022 General Fund to also finish strong. Revenues were nearly \$23,000 ahead of expenses. Those "in the black" earnings were earmarked for mortgage debt reduction.

So, where are we now? We will make our normal monthly mortgage payment in January. At the same time, we will also make a principal payment of \$32,000 (\$23,000 of "in the black" earnings plus \$9,000 of 4<sup>th</sup> quarter FFT donations). After those 2 transactions, our mortgage will be down to approximately \$135,000. That's a \$240,000 drop in our total debt from where we started back in September 2021!! The committee feels the goal of wiping out this debt by year's end is very achievable.

Watch for Phase II's kickoff in February. Together let's "put the pedal to the metal" and put that mortgage debt in the rear view mirror. We can do it!

We keep several months of mortgage payments in the Mortgage Fund to cover an unexpected emergency. We started 2022 with 4.4 months of payments in the Fund. By the end of 2022, we are down to 3.4 months of payments.

### WE NEED MORE USHERS!

On a monthly basis, assist with the church service by handing out bulletins/handouts and greeting people as they walk into the sanctuary to make them feel welcome, assisting with opening doors, gathering offerings, communion cards, & handing out and gathering Friendship Registers, dismissing pews for communion & end of service, taking attendance, turning on/off lights during service, cleaning & stocking pew racks, assisting with placing fans, etc. You can even designate early or late service and sign up for date of your choosing. If you have questions ask one of the ushers after service or contact Mary in the office. If you wish to become an usher, let Mary in the office know with your preferred service.

## A THOUGHT ABOUT COMMUNION

We learn in the Small Catechism, "Certainly not just the eating and drinking do these things, but the words written here: 'Given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sins.' These words along with the bodily eating and drinking are the main thing in the Sacrament." The words, "the main thing," means first, there is a main thing. If we don't have the main thing, we have nothing in common. Second, it's not the only thing. There are other things to consider. The main thing is what's going on in Holy Communion, that is what you are receiving in this vertical relationship between you and your Lord.

However, there's also the horizontal relationship, which is, with whom you are communing. First, is that you are a part of the body of Christ, and so is that person next to you and all the others who are receiving the same body and blood of Jesus in, with and under the bread and wine as you are. How you have and are treating them is how you treat Jesus. That's what's is going on in 1 Corinthians 11 and why Paul points out in 1 Corinthians 11:29 (ESV) "For anyone who eats and drinks without discerning **the body** eats and drinks judgment on himself." The body of Jesus is not only in and with the bread, but also are those communing with you.

These teachings are also important when we visit other congregations who invite us to commune with them. We need to ask ourselves, "What do we have in common with them?" For example, if they deny that body and blood are present, then we don't have that in common with them. It would be hypocrisy to commune with them. Also, when anybody is allowed to come to the Holy Communion no matter what they believe, that congregation has no common confession of what they believe about the Lord's Supper. When we go to a Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod congregation, we are to be assured that they teach and confess what we teach and confess at St. Andrew, and so we have a communion, a common union. For the Sacrament is to be a confession of faith.
