Pastor's Soundings in the Trumpeter...

As of the writing of this article, the death toll from the devastation on the island of Maui, Hawaii, is at 111. This is a tremendous loss of life and the destruction of property. Our thoughts of sympathy, empathy and concern go out for them. We may be even glad that it didn't happen here. Yet, over the years this area had its own natural disasters as the 1957 Fargo tornado and the 1969 & 1975 floods of West Fargo.

King David confesses about the Lord in Psalm 18:7–8 (ESV), "Then the earth reeled and rocked; the foundations also of the mountains trembled and quaked, because he was angry. Smoke went up from his nostrils, and devouring fire from his mouth; glowing coals flamed forth from him."

Scripture does record instances of God's anger causing natural disasters. One might think of Sodom and Gomorrah, or even Jonah in 1:4-5. Romans 1:18 (ESV) gives us this insight, "For the wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness of men, who by their unrighteousness suppress the truth." The unrest in creation is a result of sin which Adam and Eve set in motion. What do we do?

We are to turn our attention to the cross. There is God's ultimate anger against sin. With Christ's crucifixion and death, creation also reeled with darkness and earthquakes. There God's own Son, the creative Word incarnate, is sacrificed on all of humanity's behalf, yes, on our behalf. The cross is God's ultimate grace toward us.

Since this is true, how do we look at all the natural disasters and the troubles around us? Because of His grace, especially the forgiveness of sins, these events where people suffer are now opportunities for service, our service. Since we are the church, the body of Christ in this place, we are Christ's hands and feet in action for our neighbor. As you read through this newsletter, ponder which acts of service you can be involved in.

"And let us not grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up. So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, and especially to those who are of the household of faith." (Galatians 6:9–10, ESV)

OUR SUMMER MONTHS ARE SURPRISING US!

- Our Income total includes an Insurance Proceeds check of \$5,950 we will use to reduce the amount we need to borrow on our upcoming roof loan at the end of this month.
- We need monthly average income of \$32,808 to meet our budget goal and cover normal operating expenses like payroll, utilities, maintenance, missions, etc. Without the Insurance Proceeds check, our Income was \$32,068. We were only short about \$740 which is great for July, a normally tough summer month for income and expenses.
- The GOOD NEWS is we continue to sit in a strong financial position with \$42,132 in the black. Without the Insurance check, which is allocated to reduce the roof loan amount, we are \$36,182 in the black.

Grace Lutheran School's "GROWING TOGETHER IN GRACE" Project Update

\$50,000 Matching Challenge Pledge Announced!

St. Andrew is a member of the Red River Lutheran School Association (RRLSA) which owns and operates Grace Lutheran School. As such, a special voter's meeting of our congregation was held on July 19th to decide on our congregation's financial support for the "GTIG" upgrading & renovation project at the school. This project will add air conditioning and code-compliant ventilation to classrooms, as well as replace their old and leaky windows. Also, it would convert to either natural gas or geo-thermal for increased energy efficiency. It would also add new ceilings and LED lighting, as well as make modern classroom improvements, add one restroom, and replace the north and south entrance doors.

Each of the congregations making up the RRLSA have been asked for a suggested pledge based on their membership size. St. Andrew's suggested pledge goal is \$131,000. A special Voter's Meeting was held on July 19th to consider this request. The decision made was that we would be able to provide at least \$5,500 toward the project for 2023, and that "commitments for 2024 and beyond would be year-by-year based on the Church's yearend financial position". Furthermore, it was decided that the St. Andrew congregational budget itself will not incur any new debt for this project so long as our congregation has existing long-term debt or another capital campaign in process, which we do with our remaining Mortgage loan and our new Roof Repair loan.

Therefore, rather than placing the "GTIG" project pledge in our budget, individual members of St. Andrew who are so inclined to support the project are invited and encouraged to pledge DIRECTLY* to Grace Lutheran School. To help move this project forward, an anonymous member of St. Andrew has offered a matching challenge pledge of up to \$50,000 toward the \$131,000 goal. Those wishing to support the GTIG project by responding to this challenge pledge are asked to make their pledge, hopefully over-and-above their regular giving, to St. Andrew. Please mention that you are a member of St. Andrew Lutheran Church as a way of showing our congregation's support for our school.

The hope of the "GTIG" project committee is to have the construction done during the summer of 2024 and before school starts up. This means that construction bids and equipment orders need to be made as soon as possible. As of August 16, \$759,000 of \$1.25 million is committed to Growing Together in Grace. Construction ordering will begin when the campaign reaches \$833,000.
