Pastor's Soundings in the Trumpeter...

We want to be loved. Everyone wants to be loved. What does love mean? A feeling? Many think of love as a happy cozy feeling. You want to be with that other person and/or that person wants to be with you. It's the love romanticized in Disney movies, like Cinderella, Sleeping Beauty, Bambi, and the list goes on.

The English language doesn't help either. The same word used for "love your spouse" is also used for "love ice cream" and the score in Tennis. Loving your spouse and loving ice cream are certain two different things. If your love for your spouse is as in tennis, that's not good.

We see the definition of love changing in our society. Bryan Wolfmueller in his book, <u>A Martys' Faith in a Faithless World</u> writes, "The devil has a vested interest in abstracting and redefining love. If he can convince us that love is a feeling, found in ourselves, then he can disconnect love from the commandments of God. He can use love against the commandments of God. This, in fact, is what happened. It is the easiest to see with the Sixth Commandment and the devil's assault on marriage.

"The argument that two men or two women can be married passed through the Supreme Court a few years back. It was an argument from abstract love, that you can't stop two people from loving each other. 'Love wins' was on the celebratory rainbow flags outside the court. This is not a new argument. For years, the young men have said to the young ladies, "If we love each other, how can it be wrong, is made "right" by the claim of love." p. 150-151.

Biblical love is defined by specific activity. Love is action done for good. Love is not just letting the person do what they want and approving of it. Love is defined by the 10 commandments. For example, love is not stealing from others. When people don't steal from you, they are showing love toward you. Luther through the Small Catechism helps us to look at this commandment in the positive, "help him to improve and protect his possessions and income." Love is shared when people help to improve and protect each other's possession and income. This is true of all of the commandments.

In Mark 12:29–31 Jesus summarizes the law with one word, "love," "The most important is, 'Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. 30 And you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength.' 31 The second is this: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these" (ESV).

Paul connects love with the 10 commandments when he writes in Romans 13:8–10, (ESV) "Owe no one anything, except to love each other, for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. For the commandments, 'You shall not commit adultery, You shall not murder, You shall not steal, You shall not covet,' and any other commandment, are summed up in this word: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore love is the fulfilling of the law."

Love is not centered in ourselves, but in Jesus and His cross, as He says in John 15:12, (ESV) "This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. In Christ's service;

Growing Together in Grace August Update

It is with great pleasure & thanksgiving that we can announce that the Growing Together in Grace capital improvement campaign has surpassed the 66% fundraising threshold. As of mid-Sept, the campaign has raised \$845,605 of \$1.25 million. The Board of Ed has approved taking the next step in the campaign. This is an exciting time in the history of Grace Lutheran School. GTIG will continue its work until the project can be fully funded. Grace Lutheran School's "GROWING TO-GETHER IN GRACE" Project Update

\$50,000 Matching Challenge Pledge Announced! St. Andrew is a member of the Red River Lutheran School Association (RRLSA) which owns and operates Grace Lutheran School. As such, a special voter's meeting of our congregation was held on July 19th to decide on our congregation's financial support for the "GTIG" upgrading & renovation project at the school. This project will add air conditioning and code-compliant ventilation to classrooms, as well as replace their old and leaky windows. Also, it would convert to either natural gas or geo-thermal for increased energy efficiency. It would also add new ceilings and LED lighting, as well as make modern classroom improvements, add one restroom, and replace the north and south entrance doors.

Each of the congregations making up the RRLSA have been asked for a suggested pledge based on their membership size. St. Andrew's suggested pledge goal is \$131,000. A special Voter's Meeting was held on July 19th to consider this request. The decision made was that we would be able to provide at least \$5,500 toward the project for 2023, and that "commitments for 2024 and beyond would be year-by-year based on the Church's yearend financial position". Furthermore, it was decided that the St. Andrew congregational budget itself will not incur any new debt for this project so long as our congregation has existing long-term debt or another capital campaign in process, which we do with our remaining Mortgage loan and our new Roof Repair loan.

Therefore, rather than placing the "GTIG" project pledge in our budget, <u>individual members of St. Andrew</u> who are so inclined to support the project are invited and encouraged to pledge DIRECTLY* to Grace Lutheran School. To help move this project forward, an anonymous member of St. Andrew has offered a matching challenge pledge of up to \$50,000 toward the \$131,000 goal. Those wishing to support the GTIG project by responding to this challenge pledge are asked to make their pledge, hopefully over-and-above their regular giving, to St. Andrew. Please mention that you are a member of St. Andrew Lutheran Church as a way of showing our congregation's support for our school.

The hope of the "GTIG" project committee is to have the construction done during the summer of 2024 and before school starts up. This means that construction bids and equipment orders need to be made as soon as possible. As of August 16, \$759,000 of \$1.25 million is committed to Growing Together in Grace. Construction ordering will begin when the campaign reaches \$833,000.

"IN THE BLACK" ALL SUMMER MONTHS!

- We need monthly average income of \$32,808 to meet our budget goal and cover normal operating expenses like payroll, utilities, missions, maintenance, etc. In August, we were \$2,832 short.
- We continue to be careful with our expenses and generated a small \$837 gain to the General Fund. This is especially positive as we were able to go thru all summer months without going in the negative. We can't recall the last time that has happened!
- The General Fund has almost \$43K of "in the black" earnings. This includes \$5,950 of insurance proceeds that will be applied to the new roof loan. So our actual in the black earnings is about \$37K.
- Special thanks to a large Mortgage Fund donation received which almost covered a full monthly payment!

- Overall Goal \$375,000 to cover the outstanding balances for two loans:
