Pastor's Soundings in the Trumpeter...

Israel, Israelites, Judahites, Jews, and Israelis...they are not the same. Let's look at some history.

We first run into the name, Israel, in Genesis 32:28. There a man who wrestled with Jacob says, (ESV) "Your name shall no longer be called Jacob, but Israel, for you have striven with God and with men, and have prevailed." As you know the history, Jacob has twelve sons. They have families and become known both as Israel and Israelites who end up living in Egypt for over 400 years. When they leave Egypt, not all of them were Israelites who traveled to the promised land as we read in Exodus 12:37–38 (ESV), "And the people of Israel journeyed from Rameses to Succoth, about six hundred thousand men on foot, besides women and children. A mixed multitude also went up with them,..." One could easily assume that some of them were sympathetic, even converted Egyptians and other peoples as well. Here we start to see that God is including other people from other nations to be "His people." Think about Rahab and family. Think of Ruth as well. God has a global mission, and we must ask "Who is Israel?"

So again, as we travel through the Scriptures, we come to 1 Kings 12. King Solomon dies and his son, Rehoboam, reigns next. Under him kingdom divides and only Judah stands with him, eventually Benjamin as well. These along with some Levites from the north become Judah, the Southern Kingdom. The rest are or go to the north and become Northern Israel and disappear from history after Assyria destroys Samaria in 722BC. The temple is destroyed in 586BC and kingdom of Judah along with it, and God's people are carried off to Babylon. Those who are left behind become mixed with the other peoples, a group of which end up at the time of Jesus as Samaritans. The Judahites in Babylon finally are able to return under Cyrus 70 years later and resettle, but don't mix with the surrounding peoples in the area, They rebuild another temple. These are the people who eventually become known as Jews.

Again, the temple was destroyed in 70AD under Roman occupation. Sacrifices no longer can be offered. The religion of Judaism changes dramatically. Reduced to the reading of Scripture, prayers and alms. However, changes in their religion already happen with the rejection of Jesus as the Messiah, for the temple curtain already was torn in two, and when Jesus said, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up," the disciples knew after the resurrection, "He was speaking about the temple of his body" (John 2:21 ESV). God now dwells not in buildings of stone, but in the person of Jesus Christ. Jesus is the true Israel reduced to one.

Paul reminds us in Romans 11:6 that all Israel will be saved, but already in Romans 9:6 he distinguished an Israel apart from Israel, "For not all who are descended from Israel belong to Israel." In other words, the New Testament Israel is the church, and Old Testament Israel is the Old Testament church. The Old Testament church looked forward to the Christ who was to come, and the New Testament Israel looks back to the Messiah who has already come, Jesus Christ. The Son of God is always focal point of Israel, Old and New Testaments (John 5:39).

What about Israel which was established in 1948? It's a country just like any other country, but it is not the church nor Old Testament Israel. Its center is not Son of God, who has now come in the flesh. If Israelis want eternal life, they need Jesus just like we do. Jesus said, "You search the Scriptures because you think that in them you have eternal life; and it is they that bear witness about me,..." John 5:39 ESV).

As of October 17, GTIG has raised nearly \$849,000.

This is incredible. GTIG will continue to fundraise until the project is fully funded between \$1.25 and \$1.5 million.

- We need monthly average income of \$32,808 to meet our budget goal and cover normal operating expenses like payroll, utilities, missions, maintenance, etc. In September, we were \$1,128 short.
- We have only met our Income goal four out of the nine months so far this year.
- Thankfully, we are continuing our pattern of carefully managing our expenses. As a result, we finished September with a month end gain of \$2,838.
- The YTD \$45,807 in the black earnings includes Insurance Proceeds of \$5,951 which will be applied to our new roof loan happening later this month. Our actual General Fund "in the black' earnings thru September is \$39,856. Which is still AWESOME!



For the past two years we have been promoting the Faithfully Forward Together Debt Reduction Campaign. This was a successful venture as we just recently retired our Mortgage Loan in September.

A NEW PUZZLE TO SOLVE

But...we've had a bit of bad timing with a roof repair that just couldn't be put off any longer. SO... another loan! This new loan is very small (only \$49,000) and the required payment is less than \$500/ month. Our hope is to piece this loan into our current debt reduction strategy and pay it off in a VERY short time frame (2 years or less).

THE FIRST FEW PIECES ARE IN **PLACE**

We contacted those members who provided consistent donations toward the Mortgage Loan that was just retired. The overwhelming majority said they will continue with their donation, with their funds now being allocated to retire this new roof loan.

BUT WE NEED MORE HELP!

We currently have only about 30 individuals/ families helping with consistent donations for debt reduction. The goal for quickly retiring a \$49,000 loan is very attainable and every little bit helps. You should have received a direct mailer this week with all the details about this new FFT Campaign and loan. If you didn't, please pick one up on the display by the front entrance.

TRACKING OUR PROGRESS!

We have a sign on display with puzzle pieces drawn in showing the roof area repaired. The green puzzle pieces represent those already committed to helping us get this paid off. We will color in blue for new EFT or envelope donations. If we all join in, we can get this puzzle put together in no time!
