Pastor's Soundings in the Trumpeter...

As I consider the beginning of Confirmation Instruction, the preparation of the Confirmands, the changes in the worship times, the expectations of Rally Sunday, the start of Sunday School and the addition of Pastor Meyer, Psalm 122 comes to mind, (ESV)

- 1 I was glad when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of the LORD!"
- 2 Our feet have been standing within your gates, O Jerusalem!
- 3 Jerusalem—built as a city that is bound firmly together,
- 4 to which the tribes go up, the tribes of the LORD, as was decreed for Israel, to give thanks to the name of the LORD.
- 5 There thrones for judgment were set, the thrones of the house of David.
- 6 Pray for the peace of Jerusalem! "May they be secure who love you!
- 7 Peace be within your walls and security within your towers!"
- 8 For my brothers and companions' sake I will say, "Peace be within you!"
- 9 For the sake of the house of the LORD our God, I will seek your good.

What a joy to come our house of the Lord to receive Word and Sacrament for our comfort, for our strength, and instruction for wisdom and understanding. The Lord has granted us His full forgiveness and now His abundance to begin anew this Fall.

Let's take a moment to view Psalm 122 in its context and ours. Verse 1 has the "house of the Lord." At first glance, we may immediately think a literal building, like our sanctuary, and then Biblically the temple of the Old Testament. However, when we investigate verse 5, we find that "house" is used again but connected with David. Here "house," means household or the ruling family of Israel descended from David. House has a broader meaning. How does that relate to us? First, we remember that Jesus taught in 5:39, that He is the key to the Scriptures and Jesus is of the house of David (Matthew 1:1, Luke 1:4, 3:31, Psalm 110, etc.).

Second, the above understanding of Jesus being the key, then helps us understand Jerusalem in our context. When reading the Old Testament, the first thing that comes to my mind is the City of Jerusalem. A city consists of buildings, but exists for the sake of people. A city is a group of people living, working and worshiping in one place. When we jump to the New Testament. In Revelation 21:2-22:17, there's the new Jerusalem. This city is called the bride, with Jesus Christ as the groom. This leads us to reason that the Jerusalem is the church with Christ as it head. After we have done all this studying, we conclude that by grace through faith in Christ we are a part of the people of Jerusalem, the church of the Old and New Testaments, which at the resurrection will descend from heaven (1 Thess. 4:13-18, Rev. 12:2, etc.).

Now, and especially this Fall, remember that you are a part of God's City, the church, the new Jerusalem. As God's city, we are to live, work and especially worship together. Each week the Lord promises to bless us, where He has promised to be for us. That place is where Word and Sacrament are offered. For where Word and Sacrament are offered, Christ is there for us and there is the Church.

There is much to explore and apply in Psalm 122, like thrones of judgment (centered in Christ). However, remember who we are in Christ. We are His church, His house, His new Jerusalem. Let each of us say, "For the sake of the house of the LORD our God, I will seek your good."

BY THE NUMBERS

General Fund Income:	\$ 30,834	\$ 215,409

General Fund Income for June was \$30,834. Our 2025 annual budget is \$420,400, which breaks down to a monthly income goal of \$35,033. (This is almost a \$2,000 a month increase from last year). General Fund income covers normal operating expenses such as payroll, utilities, missions, maintenance, etc. **This month we were short of our goal by \$4,199.**

Our 2025 budget for Expenses (this is the last month without an additional Called Worker) is \$381,002, which breaks down to \$31,750 monthly. In June we were able to keep our expenses in check at \$30,257, \$1,493 less than budget. As a result, we netted a very small "In the Black" amount of \$577 for June.

This is the 2nd month in a row where our General Fund income has not met our budget goal. This is a concerning trend, especially since our staff increases this month with our new Associate Pastor. Having a second pastor will increase our expenses at least \$6K every month for salary and benefits. Our General Fund monthly giving needs to improve to cover this, or else the Ministry Fund will be tapped to cover any shortfall. While our non-payroll expenses have been lower the past several months, we expect increases in the future with upcoming Education events, monthly utilities at the parsonage, fall preparation and potential church repairs and maintenance yet to be completed before winter.

Year to Date Net Revenue sits at \$41,124. We will be locking down the results under Budget #1 (No additional Called Worker) and resetting QuickBooks for Budget #3 (Adding an Associate Pastor) starting in mid-July and for the remainder of the year. This will allow us to track our new expenses and giving income accurately.

PARSONAGE UPDATE:

We needed to collect an additional \$23,000 to cover the extra beams needed for support and the unplanned huge foundation/concrete issues that left us no option but to repair. As of mid-July, we have collected almost \$16,000 towards these repairs. We are short about \$7K for these unplanned items. We are close to finishing this remodel and looking forward to Pastor Meyer moving in the beginning of August. Once again, as we can't say it enough...THANK YOU to Tom Moltzan who had spent countless hours at the parsonage and leading the way! Plus...Thank you also to all our church member volunteers and Trustees who have continuously showed up to help with the many projects needed!

SOUND SYSTEM UPDATE:


The total cost of this upgrade is \$32,395 and has been broken down into two sections. Part 1 is all the equipment needed to improve our audio in our church. That price tag is \$24,100 and we have now collected all the funds to cover this portion! Some of this equipment is already being installed. Part 2 is focusing on the video side which will cost an additional \$8,300. We still need to raise these funds. This upgrade should take us well into the future. The goal is to have this fully operational by Rally Sunday. Thank you to Joe Franklin and the members on the Board of Elders (Ray Wasness & Jeff Pierce) for all their work on this large project!

Along with these two large scale projects, Frank still has a long list of "TO DO" items that have been temporarily placed on hold. However, repairs are always needed which means they address issues as they come up.
