"THY WILL BE DONE"

Lenten Series Wednesdays @ 7 p.m.

"Not as I will, but as you will," Jesus prayed to His Father the night before He went to the cross for our salvation. And that is our prayer as well this Lent as we seek to do God's will in our lives, as we draw near to the observance of Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection during Holy Week. Each service in this series will focus on a different aspect of God's will at work among us. Biblical characters will give us insightful reference points as they guide us in following our Lord more nearly day by day.

GOD'S WILL AND GOD'S PROMISE

Ash Wednesday – February 14 - By faith, Abraham trusted the will of God when he promised that a son would be born to him. God's will was done when that son, Isaac, was born, and God's will was done when His Son, Jesus, came into the world to redeem His people.

GOD'S WILL AND MY INADEQUACY

February 21 - At first, Moses didn't think he could free the Israelites from slavery in Egypt. But God gave him confidence to set his people free. In Lent we remember that God sent His Son to do His will and set all people free from the slavery of sin.

GOD'S WILL AND MY DREAMS

February 28 - Anointed by God to rule in Israel, King David followed God's will to shepherd his people, but often failed to live up to God's dream for him. We welcome the Good Shepherd into our lives who fulfills God's dream perfectly to gather His wandering sheep into the sheepfold of heaven.

GOD'S WILL AND MY IDENTITY

March 7 - In humility, Mary dutifully accepted the role God had given her to become the mother of our Savior. That Son would later accept His role, faithfully following the path His Father had in mind for Him to save us all.

GOD'S WILL AND MY WORLDVIEW

March 14 - On the road to Damascus, Paul had his worldview turned upside down when God called him to preach the name of the Christ he had been persecuting. We follow God's will by putting the crucified Christ at the center of our worldview.

GOD'S WILL AND MY RESPONSE

March 21 - Lydia followed the will of God by responding in faith and hospitality when the Gospel message of Christ's sacrifice was preached to her. We follow the will of God by responding in love and service to one another in return for what Christ has done for us.

I look forward to you worshiping on Wednesdays and Sundays throughout the season of Lent.

Again this year at our February 14th, Wednesday Ash Wednesday service we will be incorporating the imposition of ashes. This ancient act is a gesture of repentance and a powerful reminder about the meaning of the day. The ashes remind us of our need for cleansing, scrubbing and purifying.

We are not forcing anyone to do this. Only those who wish to receive ashes will be asked to come forward during the service and may have the ashes placed on their forehead or on the back of their hand.

Living Generously

The purpose of this newsletter is to share God's Word so that our members will better understand who we are to be and what we are to do in the light of the Scriptures. It is our hope that this monthly publication will help you grow in your relationship with the Lord and as a Christian steward.

Giving Is Healthy

A leading psychiatrist once said, "Generous people are rarely emotionally or mentally ill." Giving to God and others allows us the opportunity to forget about ourselves and focus on others. Peyton Conway March said, "There is a wonderful law of nature that the three things we crave most in life—happiness, freedom, and peace of mind—are always attained by giving them to someone else." Giving is not just a minor influence on good health, but the key to physical and mental well-being.

Love Prompts Action

In 1 John 4:19 we read, "We love because He first loved us." Because God loved us so much that He would give His Son for us (John 3:16), we, too, can love. And just as Christ's love for us led Him to labor for us through His passion, His death, and His victorious resurrection, so we, too, are prompted by our love for Him and others to labor.

God expects that the love He "lavishes" on us will naturally flow out of us into others. Real love is evidenced by action, both in labors of love to fellow believers and to our neighbors as well (Galatians 6:10).

Christian stewardship should never consist of only occasional activities, but is rather a steady and increasing outflow that shares God's love in us with others. By grace, our giving, helping, and serving are joyful expressions of gratitude motivated by love because of what God has given to us and done for us. The love of Jesus strengthened in us by the Holy Spirit, through Word and Sacrament, flows through us so we can show love to people around us.



The Ruse of the Teddy Bear

Most of the people at Chicago Children's Hospital did not know her name. They just knew her as the sweet, elderly lady in the vivid red suit who wanted to make sure that every sick child had a teddy bear to hug and caress. She kept bringing the stuffed animals, purchased with her own money, to give the sick children. That is why she was simply called "The Teddy Bear Lady."

Her name was Gladys Holm, a retired secretary for an insurance company, who lived alone in a tiny apartment. She lived modestly and frugally, and loved to save and invest—for the purpose of giving and helping people, especially children.

When she died at age 86, her will simply directed that the bulk of her estate be given to the Children's Memorial Hospital in the amount of \$18 million! No one had the slightest idea that the tall, happy woman delivering teddy bears to ailing children had

such wealth. As they began to piece together more of her life's story, they discovered something else. They learned that the gifts of teddy bears was really a ruse. She gave away teddy bears to learn more about the financial resources of the families of the children. When she learned that the parents did not have hospitalization or enough to cover medical expenses, she very quietly had taken care of their bills.

Can you visualize that? Just imagine! Fascinating! The teddy bears were only a ruse. Her real hunger was to find out more about needy people. It was love focused on others. This lady saved most of her income most of her life to help others. Jesus Christ did even more. He gave His own life, into death on the cross, to rescue us from eternal damnation. When we know the magnitude of His sacrificial love, we can become more unselfish, gladly caring and sharing. (Adapted from Arizona Republic, 8/3/1997)



Full-time Stewards

As stewards, we are in a partnership with God. First Corinthians 3:9 says, "For we are God's fellow workers. You are God's field, God's building." As our senior partner, God provides everything we need to make life possible. We are given the responsibility to gather and manage what God has entrusted to us. God's gifts are to be used for the building up of the Churchin the words of 1 Corinthians 12:7, "for the common good"—along with the purpose of leading the lost to Christ. As stewards we are called to respond to God as our creator and owner and seek to fulfill God's purpose.

Not only does God call us His partners, He gives us the right to be called His children (John 1:12). He gives us the privileges and the duties of children. God loves, protects, and provides for us. It is our privilege as His children to be with, talk to, trust in, love, and obey our Father. God has been faithful to us; shall we not be faithful as good sons and stewards to Him? God gives our lives direction and purpose. As our Heavenly Father, He expects our obedience and faithfulness. "Moreover, it is required of stewards that they be found trustworthy" (1 Corinthians 4:2). We will be held accountable, we learn in Romans 14:12: "So then each of us will give an account of himself to God."



Silent Witnesses



Did you ever wish that you could have been there at Jesus' passion?

Imagine what it would be like:



- to hear the crowds shout "Hosanna!" as Jesus rode into Jerusalem
- to smell and taste the feast at the Passover
- to see Jesus carrying His cross to Golgotha
- to touch the nail-wounds in Jesus' hands when He rose from the dead

We cannot do that, but the men and women who were eyewitnesses of these events have left their testimony in the pages of the Gospels. John tells us, "These are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name" (John 20:31). But there were silent witnesses, too—objects, animals, and places that played a part during key moments of Jesus' suffering, death and resurrection. We find them in the pages of the Gospels as well. Though they cannot speak, they can show us something of His love and mercy toward us.

GOD'S WILL WHEN WE ARE NOT WILLING Palm Sunday – March 25 - We are not always willing to do what God asks of us, but in His Palm Sunday entry into Jerusalem, Christ reveals to us that even tough roads are worth traversing for the sake of the Kingdom.

GOD'S WILL AND JOYFUL SERVICE Maundy Thursday – March 29 - Christ asks His disciples to wash one another's feet, as He washed theirs, a sign of their love for Him. Serving one another with joy is a tribute to Him who is the Servant of All.

GOD'S WILL IS DONE

Good Friday – March 30 - On the cross Christ followed through with the will of God, crying out, "It is finished" as He breathed His last. This ultimate sacrifice serves as a model as we offer our lives as a holy sacrifice to Him.

GOD'S WILL FOR THE NEW CREATION Easter – April 1 - When Christ rose from the tomb, He opened the door to a new heaven and a new earth, where righteousness dwells. God's will for us as Easter people is to fix our eyes on the new creation, the perfect paradise prepared for us in heaven.

Because God First Loved Us

Each February, we celebrate Valentine's Day so we associate this month with love. Sharing valentines with loved ones is a wonderful way to express love to our family members and friends. As Christians, we know the occasion that marks the greatest gift of love is celebrated at Christmas when Jesus came into the world as a servant and took upon Himself our sin and the sins of the whole world. Jesus was willing to give up His Heavenly realm and glory to become one of us and then suffer and die for us.

The love of Jesus is far more wondrous than we can ever imagine. The Apostle Paul prayed that we would be filled with the Holy Spirit "so that Christ may dwell in [our] hearts through faith—that [we], being rooted and grounded in love, may have strength to comprehend with all the

saints what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, that [we] may be filled with all the fullness of God" (Ephesians 3:17-19).

God loves us so much that He was willing to send His Son to suffer and die on our behalf. The Apostle John said it so well: "We love because He first loved us" (1 John 4:19). One of the best ways we can respond out of gratitude for that wondrous love is through our faithful stewardship. Stewardship is love in action. God's love for us prompts us to love others. The Holy Spirit opens our hearts and minds so we experience God's love and equips and makes us eager to show our love through our deeds and words.




ST. BARTHOLOMEW LUTHERAN CHURCH ENDOWMENT FUND
