GREETINGS IN THE NAME OF JESUS, THE SUFFERING SERVANT!

Do your neighbors and co-workers know you're a Christian? How about the person who sells you your coffee or the person who delivers your mail? Are you attempting to develop a relationship with these people so you can share the Good News of the Gospel with them? We can give no greater service to Jesus than to be part of rescuing lost souls by sharing the life-saving Gospel. Jesus commissions us to "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and of the Holy Spirit" (Matt. 28:19). God wants "all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth" (1 Tim. 2:4). We are to be Jesus' hands, feet, and mouth. Jesus tells us "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into His harvest" (Luke 10:2). We are the laborers whom Jesus is seeking.

God's plan for His people has always been that we take responsibility for sharing the Good News. Peter wrote, "Always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you" (1 Peter 3:15). God blesses us with minds to learn and mouths to speak. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, God will give us the words and the courage to use them. Along with most people, we're eager to talk about the weather, sports, economy, or politics, but, as Christians, we have been given the treasure of the Gospel message - something vastly more important to talk about. Our attitude should be like that of Peter and John, who, when commanded to stop speaking of Christ, said, "We cannot but speak of what we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:20).

For many, sharing the Gospel is uncomfortable, but people need Jesus more than we need to be comfortable. God has placed us among many people who don't know Jesus. With God's help, we can become very intentional with our witnessing. He can open our eyes to opportunities and give us the words to speak. We may want to consider developing a list of people who don't have a relationship with Jesus. The people could be in your inner circle of family and friends as well as in your outer circle of relationships. We can be empowered to witness because the Holy Spirit will guide and direct us.

God's will is that we share Jesus with people and invite them to church. Don't let your feeling of inadequacy and your excuses, as Moses had, get in your way of carrying out God's will!

Living Generously

The purpose of this newsletter is to share God's Word so that our members will better understand who we are to be and what we are to do in the light of the Scriptures. It is our hope that this monthly publication will help you grow in your relationship with the Lord and as a Christian steward.

Keep your eyes fixed on Jesus during this penitential season of Lent.

What Is Lent?

Lent is a solemn religious observance in the Christian year that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends approximately six weeks later, before Easter. The purpose of Lent is the preparation of the believer through repentance prayer, almsgiving, and self-denial. Holy Week, which begins on Palm Sunday and climaxes on Jesus' crucifixion, on Good Friday, ultimately culminates in the joyful celebration on Easter Sunday of the resurrection of Jesus.

In Lent, many Christians commit to fasting, as well as giving up certain luxuries or activities in order to replicate the sacrifice of Jesus Christ's journey into the desert for 40 days. Many Christians meditate on daily devotions to enable them to draw nearer to God.

Lent is traditionally described as lasting for 40 days, in commemoration of the forty days Jesus spent fasting in the desert. However, the calculation of 40 days excludes the six Sundays from Ash Wednesday to Holy Saturday.

The Number 40 Has many Biblical References

- Moses spent 40 days on Mount Sinai with God (Exodus 24:18)
- Elijah spent 40 days and nights walking to Mount Horeb (1 Kings 19:8)
- God sent 40 days and nights of rain in the great flood of Noah (Genesis 7:12)
- The Hebrew people wandered 40 years in the desert while traveling to the Promised Land (Numbers 14:33).
- Jonah's prophecy of judgement gave 40 days to the city of Nineveh in which to repent or be destroyed (Jonah 3:4).
- Jesus retreated into the wilderness, where He fasted for 40 days, and was tempted by the devil (Matthew 4:1-2)

Be a Barnabas!

If you look around you some Sunday morning, you might be discouraged. Fewer people and more pew space may greet your eyes. If you are one who works on the church budget or requests a portion of that budget for your particular ministry, you may be dismayed that the level of giving is down. These, plus other factors, can easily contribute to discouragement on the part of individual members, as well as the church in general.

Where do we find answers for such problems and a cure for our discouragement? As always: in the Word of God! Particularly as we look at Barnabas. Do you think all was going well for the early Christians? Read your history books, and you'll find such was not the case. They had their own problems! But along comes Barnabas.

Barnabas was called "son the encouragement" (Acts 4:36). It's understandable that the apostles would give him this name. In Acts 9:26-30, we read that it was through Barnabas' intervention that Paul came to be accepted by the disciples. Barnabas demonstrated his love for the Lord and for others as he "sold a field that belonged to him and brought the money and laid it at the apostle's feet" (Acts 4:37).

Hand-wringing and blame-placing are displeasing to God and ineffective besides. Instead, let us "abide in [Jesus'] Word" (John 8:31). Let us "encourage one another and build one another up..." (1 Thessalonians 5:11). Let us "[address] one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody to the Lord with [our hearts], giving thanks always and for everything to God the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ" (Ephesians 5:19-20).


For Us Jesus Became Poor

Maundy Thursday – March 29 - Christ asks His disciples to wash one another's feet, as He washed theirs, a sign of their love for Him. Serving one another with joy is a tribute to Him.

GOD'S WILL IS DONE

Good Friday – March 30 - On the cross Christ followed through with the will of God. This ultimate sacrifice serves as a model as we offer our lives as a holy sacrifice to Him.



Would you like to truly make a difference in someone's life? Volunteering for the Calumet County Aging & Disability Resource Center's (ADRC) Volunteer Driving Program and Nutrition Program can make it possible. We are looking for volunteers in our Home Delivered Meal/Meals on Wheels Program, Transportation Program and Nutrition Site volunteers.

Volunteer Drivers: Volunteers donate their time, use their own vehicles, and provide transportation for medical reasons, such as doctor, dentist, nutrition programs, nursing home and hospital visitation of immediate family to name a few types of transports we offer.

Meals on Wheels Drivers: Volunteers donate their time and use their own vehicles to deliver meals to those who are homebound. We are in need of drivers for the following locations: Chilton, Brillion, New Holstein. We are currently looking for regular drivers and substitutes.

Each volunteer is required to complete a background check, motor vehicle record check and reference check to ensure the safety of the program participants. We offer mileage reimbursement at the Federal rate of 54.5 cents a mile for both volunteer driving programs.

Nutrition Volunteers: Many opportunities exist at our meal sites. We are looking for volunteers to assist the dining center manager with various tasks for 2-3 hours on a day that would fit into a volunteer's schedule. We are currently looking for volunteers and substitutes at our Chilton meal site for Monday – Friday and Stockbridge site on Tuesdays.
