

SOMETHING TO PONDER ...

The Parable of the Rice Field

There is a parable told in India about the selfish man who inherited a rice field. The first year the man irrigated the field and it was fruitful. The water, in fact, flowed onto his neighbor's field and this too produced a bountiful harvest.

But the next year the selfish man decided: Why should I let this water flow through my field into his? Water is precious and I must keep it. So he built a dam. This prevented the water from flowing into his neighbor's field but it proved disastrous to his own crop as well. Irrigation water nourished the field only if it flowed. When it did not move because of the dam, the water became stagnant and the field a swamp.

We own no rice fields. Still the parable is clear. Think of what we have inherited from God; think of all He has given us. If we are selfish and keep it all for ourselves, our lives become stagnant, a dismal swamp of mere existence. But if we give back to God by giving to others, both the giver and the receiver share in the fruits of God's love.

The purpose of this newsletter is to share God's Word so that our members will better understand who we are to be and what we are to do in the light of the Scriptures. It is our hope that this monthly publication will help you grow in your relationship with the Lord and as a Christian steward.



God Will Supply

We go to work based on the promise of a wage for our labor. We enter into marriage covenants promising to be faithful to our spouses for life. We get on planes, trusting the pilots are well trained and the aircraft safe so we can get to our destinations. We drive our cars on the right side of the road (in the US, anyway!), confident that oncoming traffic will stay in their proper lanes.

If we put so much faith in fallible humans who are prone to error and misjudgment, how much more can we live as stewards who give first to God, trusting Him to supply all our needs!

"Praise be to the Lord," prayed Solomon. *"Not one word has failed of all the good promises He gave through His servant Moses"* (1 Kings 8:56).

God's stewards throughout history have praised God for His faithfulness: Elijah, fed by ravens beside the brook (1 Kings 17:2-4); Daniel in the lion's den (Daniel 6); Paul preaching the Word of God even while imprisoned (Acts 28:17-31).

How about the Macedonians who gave generously even out of their poverty to share with others they felt were even more needy (2 Corinthians 8)? All these attest to the faithfulness of God. Surely God has blessed us, too, so that we can bless others with our gifts. David, the psalmist, wrote from experience: *"I was young and now I am old, yet I have never seen the righteous forsaken or their children begging bread. They are always generous and lend freely; their children will be blessed"* (Psalm 37:25-26).




Resisting the Lure of Gambling

Gambling can devastate our lives. Those who can least afford it are often

the ones who spend the greatest portion of their income on gambling. When the gambler is addicted, God, family, and others lose importance.

There is no 11th commandment that says, "Thou shalt not gamble." There are, however, several Biblical precepts that gambling violates. The Bible warns us of the dangers of greed (Luke 12:15), selfishness and the desire to get rich quick (1 Timothy 6:9-10). Gambling encourages greed, materialism, and "get-rich-quick" thinking (Proverbs 28:20).

Scripture also tells us that all good gifts come from above (James 1:17) and that we are to be good stewards of those gifts (1 Corinthians 4:2). Gambling encourages a reckless investment of our God-given resources (Matthew 25:14-30). Gambling says, "I don't appreciate what God has provided. I deserve and want more." God tells us not to amass more wealth but to manage well what He has given us (Matthew 6:19-20).



May God help us all understand the risk of becoming addicted to gambling. May He give us strength to stay away from any activity that takes our trust away from Jesus.

Overcoming Selfishness

By nature, we are selfish people. At an early age, we voice our selfishness with the word "Mine!" Unfortunately, this selfish attitude often carries forward into our adult years. Many people live with the attitude, "What is mine is mine, and I'm going to keep it." Because of our selfishness, we look at life in terms of our money, our things, and our achievements. We focus on ourselves and give little thought to those around us.

A selfish attitude is obviously not conducive to giving. Believing that we need and deserve all we have, we have little interest in giving generously. Because of our sinful, self-oriented natures, we fail to exercise generosity in our daily lives. The Bible depicts our fallen condition: *"...for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God"* (Romans 3:23). Likewise, Isaiah 53:6 says, *"We all, like sheep, have gone astray, each of us has turned to his own way..."* We tend to want to do and accumulate things only for ourselves, and our society does little to redirect our focus. The media rarely applauds selfless acts of giving. Instead, admiration is saved for men and women who have attained power, prestige, and material wealth.

When God changes our hearts, though, our selfishness is no longer an obstacle to our giving. With hearts right with God, we acknowledge God as the owner of all things and trust in Jesus rather than our money for our security and salvation. By the working of the Holy Spirit, through His Word, God can remove our selfishness.



End of March we were \$25,141.82 in the black.

Dedicated Funds are doing well – We hope that not having church one Sunday will not see a decline in giving. Remember that we still have bills to pay each month.

Discussion: We do have a loan out – that loan was the Organ Repair and the Parking Lot repaving. So we still have obligations that need to be paid each month. – Filed for Audit.

Elders Report – by Rick Riemer –

Sunday, April 8th Heaven2Go was here for service.

Don Peachy Band – Sunday, June 10th – will be here for our church service – they will also be playing after in the fellowship hall – other items are also being planned that day for fellowship.

Elders are working on a plan for church cancellation. President, Robert Behnke and Elder, Rick Riemer were in communication and were monitoring the weather, to determine when church would be cancelled. They were watching what other area churches were doing to make that call. E-mail's were sent out and the TV station was informed. New policy is being discussed so that more people know what to do and how to get people informed. This policy will be reviewed by the Elders and Church Council. The Elder group has been discussing having former Elders to assist with some church services. This would be about 1 time per month and it would be a non -Communion Sunday, until we have all positions filled for the Elder Board.

Hilbert had a Goal of 12 they a Total of 43 - Great giving of both churches.

Mark your calendars: Jan. 26th, 2019 there will be a conference: “Passionate Believers” members are encouraged to take part – people that have gone in the past have really enjoyed it.

District Conference: June 10-12th Brigitte Sonnabend – has volunteered to be our Lay Delegate. Motion was made to Except Bridget as our delegate was made by Harlen Krahn and 2nd by Pete Kittel = Approved - MC

Update on the Vacancy that Pastor is helping with: He will continue at Hilbert until May 1st. - Pastor Brassfield will fill in as a dual Parish Pastor of St. Lukes and St. Peter, Hilbert. As of May, Pastor Krueger will assist with the Vacancy of St. Martin in Chilton. His plan is to start church there at 10:30 AM. To make this happen – he will disrobe while the last song is being sung. He will make announcement and welcome people and then leave for St. Martin.

Unfinished Business –

Church Constitution – last updates were made in 2007 - Robert Behnke and Pete Kittel are reviewing and hope to have this updated and ready for review by the Oct. voters Meeting. They need to go before two (2) Voters Meetings before it can be approved. Many of the items are non-current practices for today's world.

Land Southside of Fellowship Hall – update by Dave Kamps. – Committee was formed and they met and went over some proposed uses for the land – they then did a Pro's and Con's analysis. Here are the different items that they came up with for review:

1) Sell Property -

PRO's – No Longer Maintain the Property.

CON's – No control of it's usage

2) We, as a church should Build on it –

PRO's – Possible Income for Church

CON's – Need a large amount of up front money – Still need to maintain – higher cost

3) Turn it Into A Garden

PRO's – Community Outreach

CON's – Soil is foundry soil – nothing will grow – Still need to improve the soil - Still need to maintain the Property – No water available for garden – might need to do something to get water to that area.

4) Wait until our next Minister to see if they want to use the Parsonage or find their own housing – at which time we could reevaluate our best options.

5) Received a phone call asking if we had the property valued. This is something that has not been done. But could do if we needed to look further.

Committee members were: Dave Kamps, Myron Peter, Gary Koerth, Joel Koerth, Council lay person, Debbie Kamps.

Looking for what the Congregation would like to do? A Motion to let this topic rest until we need to look at – maybe after Pastor Retires was made by Gary Koerth, 2nd by Harlen Krahn - Approved - MC

Board Vacancies – Board of Elders and Christian Education

Board of Elders is looking for help – maybe enlisting past members of this board to assist one time per month - Those assisting DO NOT need to read in front of church.

New Business –

Church Cancellation Policy – need to work on a policy so that next time we need to cancel church we have a method in place to do it.

Church Safety – Weather Events – Chief Mignon and Officer Bastian did a walk through of Church, Fellowship Hall and Sunday School area. They gave us some suggestions to think about to make church a safe place to be. Pastor also went to a conference – He also had information that we need to discuss as a board and determine the next steps to help everyone feel safe not matter what event is occurring.

No other business –

Peter Kittel made a motion to adjourn – Dave Kamps 2nd - approved - MC


