Coming Soon: "Embracing Great Commission Stewardship"

For three weeks beginning on October 3 & 7, we will have the wonderful opportunity to grow in an understanding of what it means to "Embrace Great Commission Stewardship." Christian stewardship involves the management of our lives and resources for God's purposes. Great Commission stewardship helps us to better understand that the ultimate purpose of our stewardship is to direct our time, talents, and money to God's primary purpose which is to help "all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth" (1 Timothy 2:4). As believers, we are God's instruments through whom He works. We are His hands, feet, and mouth.

Just before Jesus' ascension into heaven, He instructed His disciples: "Go therefore and make disciples ... teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold I am with you always, to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:19-20). These verses have been identified as the Great Commission. Jesus commanded His disciples to go spread the Gospel throughout all nations. The Great Commission wasn't just for the immediate eleven disciples but is directed to all believers, and it won't end until Jesus' second coming.

Faithful stewardship demonstrates our love, devotion, and submission to Jesus. Christian stewardship is motivated by God's love. God's love overflowing from within us provides the power and energy for Great Commission stewardship. Through faith, we begin to love our neighbors as our brothers and sisters in Christ. We see others as God's children who, like us, are lost and hopeless without Jesus. Through the work of the Holy Spirit, we begin to witness and share God's love with others.



Great Commission Stewardship

Great Commission stewardship calls upon us to commit our time, abilities, and our money. When Jesus invites us to follow Him, it radically changes how we view and use our lives and blessings. In Mark 8:34, Jesus bluntly states, "If anyone would come after Me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow Me." Just as Jesus submitted to His Father's will, we are to submit to His. Our time, abilities, and money are not to be kept for ourselves but are to be used in making disciples for Jesus. Not only does God command us, "Go therefore and make disciples," He has provided us with the tools to make disciples, and He promises to go with us: "And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20). Being encouraged, empowered, and equipped, now go and make disciples!

Sharing the Good News of salvation with others (Matt. 28:19)

SHARING, BELIEVING LIVING AND CARING

Do You Wonder How You Can Minister to Those Who Are Hospitalized?

Here are some suggestions by Pastor Don Ginkel

2 Corinthians 1:3-4, "Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all **comfort**, who **comforts** us in all our troubles, so that we can **comfort** those in any trouble with the **comfort** we ourselves receive from God." So, let's do it!

STATE YOUR CONCERN: "I've been thinking about you and praying for you."

- Avoid, if you have not gone through a similar event, saying, "I understand."
- Avoid, pretending to know more than the doctors by predicting the outcome.
- Avoid, being a theologian as to WHY this event occurred, but encourage the patient with God's Word for their situation.
- Avoid, talking about a sleeping or unconscious person in their presence - they can often hear.
- Avoid, sending cut flowers. Instead send plants as the plants continue to thrive, but cut flowers fade and die.

SHOW YOUR CONCERN

- Just be there, but not for a long period of time.
- Offer to be with the family members who are waiting during surgery, but respect their wishes.
- Phone the family and/or patient, but do avoid a long talk unless they express a need to talk more.
- Have fervent prayer at worship for the patient and family. Speak in a normal voice. If there is another patient in the room, they will often thank you for the prayer.
- If possible, have a brief devotion. As a starter consider Romans 8:35-39. Read one verse at a time and explain its implications.
- In Jesus' ministry He often touched the sick and dying. Take a hand while praying. However, before you initiate any kind of touch, ask permission.
- Leave a copy of Portals of Prayer (have an extra copy for a second patient in room).
- Send cards with a brief note of encouragement to the patient and/or family. Don't stop with one card. Include a personal note of encouragement. Cards sent by members of the congregation are appreciated.
- Don't say, "If I can help, let me know." Do offer the family specific assistance - a meal, babysitting, etc.
- Remember that you are there as a representative of Jesus. Remember His words: "I was sick and you visited Me" (Matthew 25:36).




Pastor on vacation . . .

Exercise for People Over 60

Don't Let Identity Theft Haunt You This Fall

Identity Theft Prevention Workshop Sunday, October 21 – 10:30 a.m.

Identity theft only happens to people who shop online and constantly use their credit cards, so as long as I always pay with cash, my identity is safe, right?

Not so fast! ID theft can happen to anyone, anytime, anywhere.

Picture this:

You head to your local farmers market to pick up some early season pumpkins.

On the way, you stop at an ATM, punch in your PIN to get some cash, and get an "ACCOUNT OVERDRAWN" message.

How can this be? It was just payday and you've only used your card once since then to get gas. This must be a mistake. It could be a bank error, but that's unlikely.

What's more likely: Your card information was stolen when you swiped it at the gas pump or the ATM – something called card reader skimming.

Or you could be a victim of identity theft – a far more complicated problem, and one that can be extraordinarily challenging to solve.


Both scenarios are more common than you may think. How common?

Nearly 15.5 million people in the U.S. were victims of identity fraud in 2016. And, in the first six months of 2017, compromised payment cards rose 39%.

But hacked ATM cards aren't the only way to fall victim to identity theft.

Christian Stewards Express their Faith


Stewardship is the expression of our faith. Through faith, we acknowledge what God in Christ has done for us, and, in faith, we surrender ourselves into His care. "Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see" (Hebrews 11:1). With the faith that God gives us, He changes us from self-centered to Christ-centered people. We are transformed into His likeness. When Christ becomes our purpose for living, we become more faithful in our stewardship. Through faith, we are enabled to accomplish His purpose.

Through our faith, we are enabled to see God's truth. With renewed minds and open hearts, we live our lives in response to Who God is and what he has done for us through His Son. We acknowledge that God has given us life and everything we need to sustain life. Our stewardship is simply a response to what God has already done. God initiates everything. We respond out of gratitude and thanksgiving to God.

While stewardship is the outward manifestation of faith, our faith must continually be nurtured in order for us to be faithful stewards. In order for us to follow God's will, we must be nourished by His Word and Sacraments. Through our

relationship with Jesus, He will fill us so that we have His strength to carry out His will. His power flows into us, and, through our faithful response, it flows out of us to others.
