GREETINGS IN THE NAME OF JESUS, THE LIGHT OF THE WORLD!

2020 is a leap year. The next leap day is February 29, 2020. The previous leap day was February 29, 2016.

Why do we have leap years? We need leap years to keep our calendar in alignment with earth's revolutions around the sun. It takes the earth 365 days, 5 hours, 48 minutes, and 45 seconds to circle once around the sun. This is measured from the March equinox.

Our calendar, however, has only 365 days in a year. If we didn't add a leap day on February 29 nearly every four years, we would lose almost six hours off our calendar every single year. After 100 years, our calendar would be off by 24 days.

Leap day, February 29, is added to the calendar almost every four years to the shortest month of the year.

Here's some interesting information as to how leap years are calculated. In our calendar, three criteria must be taken into account to identify leap years:

- The year can be evenly divided by 4;
- If the year can be evenly divided by 100, it is NOT a leap year, unless;
- The year is also evenly divisible by 400. Then it is a leap year.

According to these rules, the years 2000 and 2400 are leap years, while 1800, 1900, 2100, 2200, 2300, and 2500 are NOT leap years. Interestingly, some of our youngest members may experience a time without a leap year (2100).

Leap Year – It gives us another day of Lent. So instead of 40 days of Lent this year, there is 41. It seems early to mention Lent but before the month of February is over we will be in the season of Lent as Ash Wednesday is February 26. Leap year also gives us another day of God's grace and blessing to enjoy!

Living Generously

The purpose of this newsletter is to share God's Word so that our members will better understand who we are to be and what we are to do in the light of the Scriptures. It is our hope that this monthly publication will help you grow in your relationship with the Lord and as a Christian steward.

God's Gift of Faith

In his book *The Christian Faith*, Robert Kolb shares the following: "Faith can refer to the object of our trust—what we believe in. Faith also refers to the human act of believer, of trust, of placing our confidence in and depending on someone or something. Faith—in the second sense—is the very core of our being. It is our basic grasp on reality. If faith is misplaced, then all of life is skewed. If faith is misdirected toward one of God's creatures, rather than being directed toward our Creator Himself, then life goes sour and spoils."

Faith rests upon someone or something. The Christian faith rests upon the person of our God Who has revealed Himself as Jesus of Nazareth. Our faith rests upon Who He is and upon what He has said to us. We have His revelation of Who He is and His message for us in the Holy Scriptures.

Faith is a gift that God gives. He gives it through His means of grace—Word and Sacraments. Those are His tools. But those tools are used, or applied, if you will, by people. It's those people who can sometimes be the difference as to whether or not those tools work. Gandhi is said to have remarked, "The reason I'm not a Christian is because of the Christians." What he saw in the lives of Christians, regardless of what they may have said, convinced him he didn't want to be a Christian. The well-known theologian, John Stott, said that one of the reasons evangelism in the church doesn't always work is that the lives

of the people of the church don't reflect a wholehearted commitment to the Lord Jesus.

Works Are the Application of Faith

Faith is the most precious gift anyone can receive from God. By faith, we believe that God will do what He has promised to do. "Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see" (Hebrews 11:1). God provides for our needs, gives us peace and fellowship with Him, and guides our ways. Everything from God is free and unconditional, including the faith to believe.



To do the work of the Lord through faith is to live knowing that God will keep His promises. Through faith, we are able to conduct our lives as faithful stewards who live to please the Lord. Faith in Christ affects the way we conduct ourselves at work, at home, and at church. The depth of our faith will affect our giving and whether we treat our neighbors like the Good Samaritan treated the traveler (Luke 10:25-37) or like the Rich Man treated Lazarus (Luke 16:19-31). When God is exalted, joy and gratitude permeate our lives, and we are eager to do good works.

Through His Word and Sacrament, our faith is nurtured, and we bear fruit. We can give generously of what we own, because we believe that God is faithful and will keep His promises to replenish us. "You will be made rich in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and through us your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God"

9:11). With hearts and minds turned away from self and filled, instead, with thanksgiving to God, we begin to see others through His eyes, walk in His steps, and love others as He loves them.

Faith Determines the Amount

Every year we may ask ourselves the stewardship question, "What percentage of my income will I give?" Our faith will set the percentage. Jesus said, *"I tell you the truth, if you have faith as small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there' and it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you"* (Matthew 17:20-21). Giving is more a faith issue than a financial one. Many individuals and/or households enjoy a good income but lack the faith to release it.

We need a faith that dares to sacrifice. Can we be called generous givers when our giving does not cause us to do without at least one single purchase or event? Are we not willing to give a sacrificial percentage to God's Kingdom? God does not ask us to give things up just for the sake of giving something up, but He does ask for meaningful self-denial that characterizes our whole lives.



Many generous givers have discovered to their delight that the remaining part of their incomes goes even further after they have given generously of the first portion of their incomes. Proverbs 11:25 reads, *"A generous man will prosper; he who refreshes others will himself be refreshed."* St. Paul made a similar statement: *"Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously"* (2 Corinthians 9:6).

Whether God gives us much or little, we are called by faith to give generously.

The 23rd Psalm

A Sunday school teacher decided to have her young class memorize one of the most quoted passages in the Bible—Psalm 23. She gave the youngsters a month to learn the chapter. Little Rick was excited about the task, but he just couldn't remember the psalm. After much practice, he could barely get past the first line. On the day that the kids were scheduled to recite Psalm 23 in front of the congregation, Ricky was so nervous. When it was his turn, he stepped to the microphone and said proudly, "The Lord is my Shepherd, and that's all I need to know."

Giving Spirit

According to legend, a desert wanderer happened upon a spring of cool, crystal-clear water. The water was so delightful; he decided to bring the king a sample of it. Barely quenching his own thirst, he filled his leather canteen and began his lengthy journey in the hot desert sun to the palace.

When he finally reached his destination, the water had become stale because of the old leather container in which it had been stored. The king graciously accepted the gift of his faithful subject. He tasted it with an expression of gratitude and delight, and the wanderer went his way with a joyful heart.

After he had gone, others in the king's court tasted the putrid water and asked why the king had pretended to enjoy it. "Ah," responded the king, "it was not the water I tasted, but the spirit in which it was given."

How blessed we are that God receives our paltry gifts because He sees our grateful hearts.

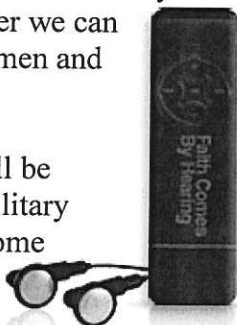

I simply remember my favorite things, and then I don't feel so bad.

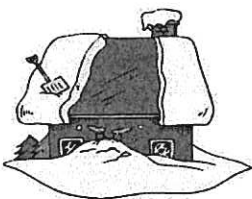

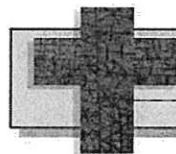

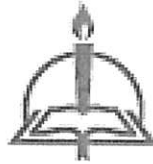

SERMON ON THE MOUNT

Midweek Lenten and Holy Week Series

This series for Lent and Holy Week will take us through some of the most familiar teachings of Jesus from His Sermon on the Mount in Matthew 5-7 and relate them to the events surrounding Christ's life, death, and resurrection. In the process, the services will reveal that the cross itself is the ultimate sermon on the mount for our journey of faith in this sacred season.

Blessed Are You • Matthew 5:1-11

Ash Wednesday, February 26 - We who are poor in spirit, who mourn, and who hunger and thirst for righteousness are called blessed by our Savior in His Sermon on the Mount. Ash Wednesday reminds us that though we have been brought low by sin, our Lord will bless us with new life in Him through the cross.

Salt and Light • Matthew 5:13-16

March 4 - Christ calls us to be salt and light in this world of sin. We who have tasted and seen His great love for us on the cross can spend our Lent savoring His salvation and shining with His glory and grace in the places where He has put us.

Prayer and Fasting • Matthew 6:5-18

March 11 - Lent is a season of prayer and fasting. We grow in our relationship with Christ by communicating with Him, and we learn more about Him and ourselves by giving up those things that can distract us from our connection to Him.

Do Not Worry • Matthew 6:25-34

March 18 - So much of our lives, even in Lent, is spent worrying about what might happen or what has happened. Christ teaches us to stop being anxious, but simply to trust that He knows what is best and will take care of us to the very end.

Judge Not • Matthew 7:1-5

March 25 - We live in a very judgmental world, so Jesus' advice not to judge sounds radical to our modern ears. When we leave all judgment up to God, we free ourselves to look at one another through fresh and forgiving eyes.

Build on Rock • Matthew 7:24-27

April 1 - We build our lives on very shaky foundations, and then we are surprised when things start collapsing. Jesus reminds us in His teachings that the only solid foundation is Himself, the Rock of our salvation. On Him alone we build.

Ask, Seek, Knock • Matthew 7:7-11

Palm Sunday, April 5 - When Jesus entered Jerusalem, the people asked, "Who is this King of Glory?" They were seeking one who saves when they shouted, "Hosanna!" They were knocking on the door for a new future. What they did not know was that Jesus was opening the door to everlasting life through the cross.

The Golden Rule • Matthew 7:12

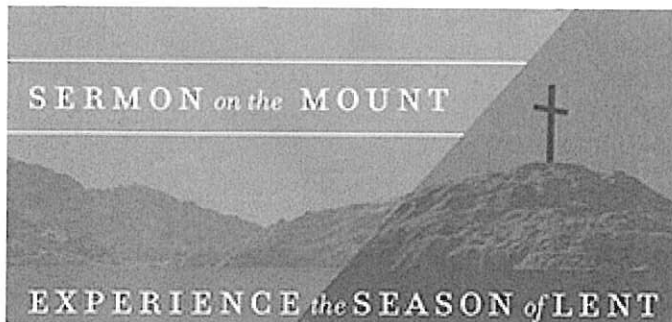
Maunder Thursday, April 9 - Jesus lived out the Golden Rule the night He was betrayed, but with a twist. He taught His disciples to do to others as He had done to them: washing their feet, forgiving their sins, and loving them unconditionally.

The Tree and Its Fruit • Matthew 7:15-20

Good Friday, April 10 - Jesus preached that good trees can be recognized by their fruits. Despite its appearance, the tree of the cross on Good Friday proved to be the best tree of all, because by Christ's death upon it came the fruit of everlasting life.

Treasures in Heaven • Matthew 6:19-21

Easter Sunday, April 12 - Jesus taught to lay up treasures in heaven and not on earth. His resurrection is a wake-up call to us all that while the things of this earth are temporary, we have the precious gift of life with Him forever awaiting us.

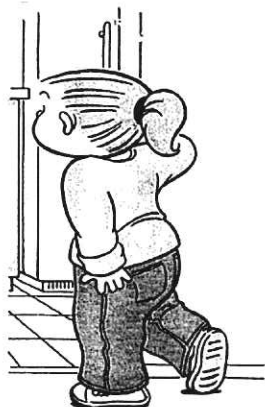
