Would You Love Me A Little? By Pastor Don Ginkel

There was a four-year-old boy. He had no parents, came from the slums, and was taken to an orphanage. The first night was quite an experience. When bed time came, after the first bath he had in some time, the matron took him to a bed with clean white sheets. He said, "Do you want ME to get in THERE?" After tucking him in the matron reached down and kissed him good night. "What did you do THAT for?" he said, and he rubbed off the kiss.

The next morning, when he saw the lady who put him to bed, he said, "Would you mind doing that again... what you did last night?" He had never been kissed before. It did something to him that warmed him inside. In about a week's time the matron said the boy was coming around three or four times a day. He'd look up at her with a soft look on his face and say, "Would you love me a little?" After some time it was felt Tommy was ready for adoption.

One day he was brought into a room to meet a man and woman. The matron asked Tommy if he would like to go home with the woman. Tommy looked at the floor and didn't say anything. The lady said, "I'll give you a rocking horse and all sorts of play things." She kept on talking, trying to tell him how nice it would be at their home. After a bit Tommy looked up at her and said, "Would you love me a little?"

It was Henry Drummon who said, "Love is the greatest thing in the world." St. Paul said, "Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It is not rude, it is not self-seeking, it is not


easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rewith the truth. It always not delight in evil but rejoices protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres (1 Corinthians 13:4-7)." The poet wrote:

I asked Jesus, "How much do You love me?" And He answered from the cross, "I love you so much" as He held His arms outstretched on the cross. "This is how much I love you." It's love that your fellow Christians want from you and which unbelievers need from you.

Let's give it out today to everyone we can. Let's love non-Christians to Jesus! Yes, let's love Jesus more right now. He who first loved us! "And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. Jesus Is Most Important

In his book, *The Best Is Yet to Come*, John Kieschnick tells the story of Bob Buford. He writes, "Bob Buford owned a cable television company, and God richly blessed his business. Wealth and power, however, didn't fill the hole in Bob's life. He had a nagging sense of emptiness, so he went to a psychiatrist. Bob shared his dilemma, and the psychiatrist told him, 'Bob, I want you to go home and take out a piece of paper and a pen. Draw a box, and in that box write the words that describe the most important thing in your life.'

What do you suppose Bob wrote in his box? What would you write in your box? What is your highest priority in life?

Before we put our answers in the box, let's reflect on our thoughts in relation to Bob's emptiness. As Christians, we understand that wealth and power do not fill our emptiness nor give us the security and happiness that Bob was seeking. As our faith grows, we learn that true riches have nothing to do with money. We can have very little money and be very rich or be very wealthy and be impoverished. True riches have to do with a right relationship with Jesus who, through His death and resurrection, brings us happiness, contentment, joy, love, peace, and life everlasting. Material possessions do not constitute real riches.

Material things are transitory. What we possess materially is subject to loss in a variety of ways. Our wealth can be lost in the stock market or through rust, obsolescence, and thievery. No matter how much money we may have, we have no way of guaranteeing that it can be kept safe and secure. Money can be lost, stolen, or its purchasing power lost through inflation. Investments can decline in value and businesses can fail. Our property can be burned or robbed. All material things can be gone quickly. Even if our material things stay with us, we will eventually leave them, because, at the end, we can take nothing with us.

God had blessed Bob materially, but he was still feeling empty with no purpose. Through faith, we understand that what we need most is a relationship with Jesus who is the only person whose love and forgiveness can give us all that we need. So, in response to the psychiatrist's question as to what is the most important thing in our life, our answer in the box is "Jesus!"

Salt and Light • Matthew 5:13-16

Do Not Worry • Matthew 6:25-34



A Life of Service

We are called to give our time, energy, and effort to serve others. Christians are giving people. While on earth, Jesus was the perfect example of a giving life full of service and compassion. When we intentionally fail to give our support to others, or if we ignore the pleas of those in need, we dishonor God. God is calling us to be His hands to help those who are in need, and He will lead us where He wants us to serve. Because of God's calling and our devotion to Him, service becomes our way of life. Service is what emanates from a life filled with love and devotion to Christ.

Jesus Taught us how to Serve Others

God loves the world, the whole world. It is God's love working through us that enables us to be servants to others. Our love for Christ is seen in acts of serving. We can be either other-oriented or self-oriented. Without God's motivation within us, our focus is always directed inward, always

aimed at fulfilling our own needs. He provides the love we need to love others and gives us the desire to serve them. As our relationship with Christ grows, we will be better able to see the world as He sees it, through eyes of love. We understand that we are saved by grace through faith for service.

The surprising thing is that, when we help others, we end up receiving an equal or greater benefit than the recipients from our acts of service. We discover that it is a greater blessing to give than to receive (Acts 20:35).

Reflecting God's Light

Can people see God's light through us? Actions, words, and lifestyle are visible indicators of God's presence within our lives. Our character, compassion, gratitude, humility, perseverance, and faith reflect God's light when He is glorified and honored above all things. The Holy Spirit has placed within each Christian a light that show others God's love compassion. We are to let that light shine. Our light may seem to us like a twinkling candle in a dark world, but God will use it and magnify it.

"But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people belonging to God, that you may declare the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His wonderful light" (1 Peter 2:9). It is our purpose to reflect our Redeemer in the midst of an unbelieving world. By word and actions, we are to acquaint those around us with the wonders

of His love and the redeeming power of His death upon the cross.

When Christ is within us, we are dead to sin, and our spirits are alive because of His righteousness. With Christ, we live confidently knowing that "In all things God works for the good of those who love Him, who have been called according to His purpose" (Romans 8:28).

Through Christ, our lives can be lights that don't flicker, fade, or glow dimly but with light that radiates bright intensity. He is the light of the world; He brings life to us all. In fervent gratitude, we are to hold up His light.

In our Christian journey, we do not take the journey alone, because God has promised to be with us wherever we go (Joshua 1:9). God wants good things for all of us, and we are to do all things in His name and to give Him thanks. To live life abundantly, we need to put our trust and faith in Him alone. In our walk with Him, He will be with us every step of the way until we "win the prize for which God has called [us] heavenward in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:14).

Being a Faithful Steward

A steward is one who cares for something that belongs to another. Christians use the word stewardship as a reminder that all things belong to God. Even talents, gifts, and abilities that we call our own are His and are to be used according to His commands. The motivation for returning back to God what He has entrusted to us is a sense of duty, to be sure. But true stewardship in the life of a Christian grows out of much more. As the Gospel shines in

our hearts, our hearts are changed from a path of self-interest. We are transformed into loving, serving, and giving people who live lives unto God in faith.

Gambling Can Enslave Us

A Business Week magazine observed that gambling has indeed entered the mainstream of American society. It is now touching the lives of nearly everyone, even the person who does not gamble. Since gambling can enslave people and bring them personal and family tragedy, Christians need to provide spiritual care to one another in this area. Only the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, whose love sets us free, will enable us to

overcome such a burden (Romans 8:1-17). God loves us deeply, forgives the sins of those who trust in him, and helps us to resist the temptation to lay up treasures for ourselves. Our



sins are forgiven in Christ, including the sins of greed and lovelessness toward others. At the same time, God helps us to open our hearts in live and kindness, for he is at work in us both "to will and work for His good pleasure" (Philippians 2:13).

God's Money

In order for us to honor God with our finances, we need to remember that our money is really not our money. "The earth is the Lord's, and the fullness thereof, the world and those who dwell therein" (Psalm 24:1). God owns it all and give to us as he pleases. No matter how much we like to think we earned it, we don't have anything that God didn't give us.

CURIOUS BIBLE FACTS

A prisoner, condemned to solitary confinement, obtained a copy of the Bible and by three years' careful study, obtained the following facts:

The Bible contains 3,586,489 letters, 773,692 words, 31,173 verses, chapters, and 66 books. The word and occurs 46,277 times. The word Lord occurs 1,855 times. The word Reverend occurs but once, which is in the 9th verse of the 111th Psalm. The verse is the 8th verse of the 118th Psalm. The 21st verse of the 7th chapter of Ezra contains all the letters in the alphabet except the letter J. The finest chapter to read is the 26th chapter of the Acts The 19th of the Apostles. II. Kings and the 37th Chapter of Isaiah are alike. The longest verse is the 9th verse of the 8th chapter of Esther. The shortest verse is the 35th verse of the chapter of St. John. The 8^{th} , 15^{th} , and 31^{st} verse of the 107^{th} Psalm are alike. Each verse of the 136th Psalm end alike. There are no words or names of more than six syllables.
