"To God be the Glory!" (1 Peter 4:11)

GREETINGS IN THE NAME OF OUR RISEN LORD AND SAVIOR!

The aftershocks of that first Easter earthquake continue to topple walls. The wall between God and people symbolized by the angel with the fiery sword outside the Garden of Eden has begun to fall. To be sure, we're not yet in paradise and able to eat freely of the tree of life, but already, like Peter and the other disciples, we're able to eat and drink with the risen Christ. Not only does He share our food as He did on that first Easter evening when He took broiled fish and ate it to show He was no ghost, but also we recognize Him in the breaking of the bread. We're invited to His table to feast upon His body and His blood shed for the forgiveness of our sin. We share the feast of victory over sin, death, and Satan as a foretaste of that day when we will eat again from the tree of life in the midst of paradise.

The most sacred wall in all of Judaism was the wall in the temple that sealed off the Most Holy Place. The wall was of thick fabric. No one could pass through that wall, except the high priest, and he could only pass through once a year on the Day of Atonement. But on Good Friday, as Jesus breathed His last, that temple curtain wall was torn in two. Christ made the greatest sacrifice, with His own blood, and with that, everything changed. No longer does a priest offer the atoning sacrifice for our sin. The blood of Christ covers our sin, and God freely forgives you, me, and everyone who believes in Christ.

On Sunday morning, August 13, 1961, the leaders of what was then the German Democratic Republic (East Germany) gave the order for the border between East and West Berlin to be closed. This was the beginning of the construction of the Berlin Wall, one of the most hated structures of the Cold War. In time, August 13 was remembered as "Barbed Wire Sunday," a dark day in the history of the nation and the world. Families were split, workers lost their jobs, and ultimately many people were killed trying to escape to freedom.

However, what went up eventually came down. On November 9, 1989, around 7 p.m., the order was given for the border to be opened. Citizens of East Berlin began gathering at the wall demanding to be allowed to pass to the west side of the city. By 10:45 p.m., the guards at the wall were so overwhelmed and outnumbered they had no choice but to allow the people through. Within the next year, Germany was unified as a democracy and a new era began.

Easter is the undoing of sin, death, and Satan's "Barbed Wire Sunday." Even the grave could not hold Jesus.

And the earthquake that broke open the tomb that first Easter morning is still breaking down walls. Walls of guilt, walls of addiction, walls of illness, walls of death, walls of culture and class, walls that hem us in, and walls that would keep us out!

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!



Standing Alone

Perhaps you've sat on a jury and have been the only one to see the facts in a certain way. Everyone but you voted guilty on the first vote. What did you do the second time around? Did you do the expedient thing and vote with the majority, or did you vote again according to your conscience and face the wrath of eleven others who wanted to wind things up and get back to their lives? Did you go along with the crowd, or did you stand alone?

Joseph of Arimathea was in such a situation. He was on the Council that voted to hand Jesus over to be crucified. He had seen and heard the facts. He knew Jesus was an innocent man. "Now there was a man named Joseph, a member of the Council, a good and upright man, who had not consented to their decision and action" (Luke 23:50-51).

Scripture very matter of factly states that he "had not consented to their decision and action." We might just gloss over those

words, not thinking about what lies behind them.

The Council was an important and powerful governing body. That's evident in their ability to get Jesus crucified on false charges. If they could bring about Jesus' death, didn't they have power over Joseph as well? Definitely.

But St. Matthew wrote, "...Joseph...had himself become a disciple of Jesus" (Matthew 27:57). This fact makes all the difference! Joseph wasn't standing alone; he was standing with Jesus, his Master!

We, too, are disciples of Jesus. He gives us the gifts necessary to do His work, and He gives us the courage required to be His disciple. Should no one go with us, we still do not stand alone. Jesus stands with us.

He Is Risen! And Now...

One of the most glorious sections in all of Scripture is found in 1 Corinthians 15 where we find the words of St. Paul as he expounds on Christ's crucifixion, resurrection, and subsequent appearances to His disciples. He writes about the implications of those events that, just as we all died in Adam, so in Christ we are all made alive and that, just as Christ

has a new glorified body, so shall we put off the perishable and be raised with an imperishable body. What a glorious passage! This is what Easter means to us!

Without taking a breath, Paul then continues, "Now about the collection for God's people" (1 Corinthians 16:1). To our minds these two themes don't fit together. Certainly thoughts about the collection don't belong in an Easter message, do they? Paul thinks they do, and why not? First, how do we respond to such a great gift as our salvation? Since God has poured out on us the treasures of His grace, will we not want to make tangible expression thanksgiving? Second, with a dying world around us, will we not want to expedite the mission of the Church to spread the Gospel message? "Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labor in the Lord is not in vain" (1 Corinthians 15:58).

Is It Worth It?

A common complaint is that we are not appreciated. The mother gets the kids off to school, transfers them to games and lessons, prepares a delicious dinner, and receives no

thanks and may, in fact, be criticized for being a few minutes late or forgetting the milk money in the lunch.

The worker stays late, placates the disagreeable client, and lands the big contract without so much as a pat on the back.

It's enough to make you wonder if it's worth it. Do you think Jesus wondered? He healed ten lepers and only one returned to thank Him. When the Jewish leaders ganged up on Him, even His most trusted and loyal followers fled, and one vehemently denied even knowing Him.



But, you see, appreciation and thanks are not what Jesus was focusing on. Even though He is God, He "made Himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant . . . He humbled Himself and became obedient to death" (Philippians 2:7, 8). He was obedient to God. He came to earth to give His life in exchange for ours, and He didn't look for praise or thanks from us.

Remembering this and keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus (Hebrews 12:2), we follow His example. We are stewards who desire only to please our Father in Heaven. He is the One Who will say, "Well done, good and faithful servant!" (Matthew 25:21).

SERMON ON THE MOUNT

Midweek Lenten and Holy Week Series

Build on Rock • Matthew 7:24-27 April 1 - We build our lives on very shaky foundations, and then we are surprised when things start collapsing. Jesus reminds us in His teachings that the only solid foundation is Himself, the Rock of our salvation. On Him alone we build.

Ask, Seek, Knock • Matthew 7:7-11 Palm Sunday, April 5 — When Jesus entered Jerusalem, the people asked, "Who is this King of Glory?" They were seeking one who saves when they shouted, "Hosanna!" They were knocking on the door for a new future. What they did not know was that Jesus was opening the door to everlasting life through the cross.

The Golden Rule • Matthew 7:12 Maundy Thursday, April 9 – Jesus lived out the Golden Rule the night He was betrayed, but with a twist. He taught His disciples to do to others as He had done to them: washing their feet, forgiving their sins, and loving them unconditionally.
