"To God be the Glory!" (1 Peter 4:11)

GREETINGS IN THE NAME OF CHRIST THE LORD!

In a short time, we will be celebrating the birth of Christ – a major event, even for those who don't believe in Him. God's Son came to live among us in order to forgive us, reconcile us with our heavenly Father, and give us life everlasting.

How different our celebrations today are from the first Christmas more than 2,000 years ago! Mary and Joseph found no room in an inn so they "wrapped [Jesus] in strips of cloth and placed him in a manger" (Luke 2:7). There were no reporters or photographers waiting outside to write a newspaper article or to snap the first picture of the new king. No one knew what was happening! No one, that is, except for the parents and the host of heaven who made the announcement. But to whom was this announcement made? To the powerful who would speed through the towns and villages, spreading the news? To the privileged elite? No, to shepherds who were outcasts, hired hands who were so low on the social scale that they weren't even allowed to give testimony in a court of law. They weren't even allowed to come into the temple.

Yet these were the ones chosen by God to tell the good news. These wretched creatures saw the angels and "the glory of the Lord shone around them." They heard the message the angels brought: "Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord ... You will find a baby ... lying in a manger" (Luke 2:9,11). They saw, they listened, and then they went to see for themselves. After receiving the Good News, they spread it. "When they had seen him, they spread the word concerning what had been told them about this child, and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds said to them" (Luke 2:17-18).

If lowly shepherds could tell the story, can't we as well? "All who heard it were amazed," Luke writes, but he doesn't say all believed. All we're asked to do is tell the story. How could fear, uncertainty, or apathy hold us back? This is the biggest news mankind has ever received! As stewards of the Gospel, we have no choice but to follow the example of the shepherds and "spread the word concerning what has been told [us] about this child." What a privilege we have to tell others about the baby in the manger who became a man and died for our sins so we can live eternally with Him in heaven!



May God grant us all the passion to tell others of Jesus' birth and love for all people.


Sunday, November 29 - Ponder

Living Generously

The purpose of this newsletter is to share God's Word so that our members will better understand who we are to be and what we are to do in the light of the Scriptures. It is our hope that this monthly publication will help you grow in your relationship with the Lord and as a Christian steward.



The Exchange

Let's recall for a moment Jesus' encounter with the Rich Ruler. This young man came to Jesus asking how he could inherit eternal life. First Jesus threw the law at him: Don't commit adultery, don't murder, don't steal, don't give false testimony, honor your parents. Without hesitation, the young man asserted that he had kept commandments all his life. Jesus said: "You still lack one thing. Sell everything you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in Heaven. Then come, follow Me" (Luke 18:22). This the Rich Young Ruler could not do, for he loved his wealth more than anything else.

How different was Jesus' response when asked to give up the glories of Heaven for the lowliness of earth. Paul wrote in 2 Corinthians 8:9, "For you know the grace of

our Lord Jesus Christ, that though He was rich, yet for your sakes He became poor, so that you through His poverty might become rich."

How have we become rich through the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ? What do we count as riches? Do we look at wealth the way the Rich Young Ruler did or through Christ's eyes? Jesus asked a thought-provoking question: "What good will it be for a man if he gains the whole world, yet forfeits his soul? Or what can a man give in exchange for his soul?" (Matthew 16:26).

Jesus was willing to give up His whole world in order that our souls could be saved. He gave His life in exchange for ours. We celebrate at this time of year His coming to earth as a helpless baby for the purpose of exchanging His life for our eternal lives.



In response to this great sacrifice, we must ask what we can do. The Apostle Paul wrote, "Be imitators of God, therefore, as dearly loved children and live a life of love, just as Christ loved us and gave Himself up for us as a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God" (Ephesians 5:1-2)

In our prayers of thanks for the birth of the Christ Child, let us also ask Him to give us hearts of humility like His and the will to expend ourselves in lives of giving and serving in imitation of His life and death.

Telling Others about Jesus

At the birth of a child, most parents make numerous telephone calls to relatives and friends to tell them about the wonderful In addition to telephone calls, news. announcement cards are often sent. When Jesus was born, there were no telephones or mail service. However, God had a better method of announcing the birth of His Son. He used His angels. "And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid. I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; He is Christ the Lord. This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in strips of cloth and lying in a manger' " (Luke 2:8-14).



God, in His sovereignty, did not choose the rulers of the time nor the wealthy to be among those who were the first to hear of Jesus' birth. Interestingly, He chose a group of people who, in many ways, were

considered outcasts. Upon hearing the good news of the Christ Child, the shepherds went to Bethlehem to see Jesus in the manger.

After seeing Jesus, the shepherds went out and "spread the word concerning what had been told to them about this child" (Luke 2:17). God used these people to be His ambassadors. The people who heard the shepherds talk about Jesus were "amazed at what the shepherds said to them" (verse 18).


Like the shepherds, we are called to be faithful witnesses of Jesus and His love. Once we begin to comprehend His love for us, we will be compelled to share that love with others. In telling others, we reflect our gratitude for His love, grace, and mercy. God hears and sees our gratitude through the way we live our lives.

Joy to the World

One of the more popular songs during the Christmas season is "Joy to the World, the Lord is Come!" God showed His amazing and incomprehensible love by sending His only Son to earth to live among us for 30 plus years. The Lord has come, filling us with great joy. Yet we confess that we often are mired in discouragement and grief. While looking at our present circumstances, we forget that Jesus has gone before us and that He is with us to take us through all the difficult times in our lives. He is still with us today to bring us abundant joy. May God keep our hearts in the joy of Jesus and to share that joy with those we meet.

Blessed are those who can laugh at themselves, for they will never cease to be amused.


ADVENT CHALLENGE
