GREETINGS IN THE NAME OF JESUS, OUR LOVING SAVIOR!



WORSHIP SERVICE CANCELLATION



They were driven through hardships, sacrifice, and exhaustion toward the end they were striving to achieve. Some people are blessed with a never-quit attitude. This attitude was captured in a




movie titled *Rudy* that was made back in 1993. This movie is based on a true story of a young man who loved Notre Dame football and wanted nothing more than to play for the team. He was a walk-on, undersized, too slow and too small. He was so determined to make the team and play in a game

that he practiced harder and worked harder than anyone else on the team. At one point in the film, the coach said, "I wish God would put your heart in some of my players' bodies." To play for the Notre Dame Fighting Irish, Rudy went above and beyond.

Most of us are not going to excel on the football field, but, as God's people, we are called to work diligently in our service to others and to extend God's kingdom. The Apostle Paul wrote, "Be steadfast ... always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in

vain" (1 Cor. 15:58b). God wants us to "walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to Him: bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God" (Col. 1:10). God wants us to be productive people in His kingdom.

Living Generously

The purpose of this newsletter is to share God's Word so that our members will better understand who we are to be and what we are to do in the light of the Scriptures. It is our hope that this monthly publication will help you grow in your relationship with the Lord and as a Christian steward.

Is Money a Blessing?

It is God "Who richly provides us with everything to enjoy" (1 Timothy 6:17). Certainly, money and possessions are some of the gifts God gives us. They continue to be blessings, unless...

- money and things related to it are your greatest priority, causing you to place God second.
- money and things related to it keep you from regular worship of God.
- money and things related to it keep you from generously giving for God's work.
- money and things related to it offer you false security and keep you from relying on God alone.

One the other hand, money is a blessing when...

- it's returned to God in thanksgiving for all His benefits to you.
- it's used to care for those in need.
- it's used to bring the Gospel to all people.
- it's viewed not as your own, but as a loan from God.

Let us keep money in perspective. It is a blessing from God to be used as a tool according to His plan. Chief among our blessings is our salvation won for us by Christ as He shed His blood for the forgiveness of our sins. Realizing this, we can then count money as a blessing.



They Didn't Believe

The whole plan of salvation is hard to believe. It just doesn't make sense. God comes to earth as a Baby. The Baby grows up just like any other child, but, becoming an adult, He begins preaching and teaching and healing. His neighbors and acquaintances say, "Where did this man get this wisdom and these mighty works? Is not this the carpenter's son? And they took offense at Him" (Matthew 13:54, 55, 57).

The chief priest, elders, and teachers of the law finally get their way and hold a trial. "Are You the Christ?" they ask. "I am," Jesus answers (Mark 14:61, 61). But this is blasphemy, they agree, so they crucify Him.

Friends and enemies, believers and unbelievers alike witnessed the scene on Golgotha. They saw Him hang on the cross; they heard His words. They saw the soldiers pierce Jesus' side, and "at once there came out blood and water" (John 19:34). That they did believe.

But then came the Third Day. When Mary Magdalene reported what she'd heard and seen at the empty tomb, "they would not believe it" (Mark 16:13). When the travelers on the road to Emmaus talked about their visit with the risen Christ, "[their hearers] did not believe them" (Mark 16:13).

And when Jesus appeared to His disciples, "He rebuked them for their unbelief and hardness of heart because they had not believed those who saw Him after He had risen" (Mark 16:14). Notice who gets the rebuke. It isn't the messengers; it's those who refuse to listen to the message.

Like Mary and the travelers, we are not responsible for what our hearers do with the message. As stewards of the Gospel, it is our joyful task only to bring the Good News: Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

Make Your Choice

Joshua had faithfully served the nation Israel after the death of Moses. He was faithful both to his God and to his people. At the end of his life, as the nation is taking its place in the Promised Land, he offers them a choice: "Now therefore fear the Lord and serve Him in sincerity and faithfulness...And if it is evil in your eyes to serve the Lord, choose this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your forefathers served in the region beyond the River, or the gods of the Amorite... But as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord" (Joshua 24:14-15).

As Christian stewards, we, too, have a choice to make. Maybe we're not tempted to serve the gods of the Amorites, but there is another god that vies for our worship: the

god of wealth. That god promises that, if we put our trust in him, he will make us powerful, envied by others, satisfied by all the possessions he can obtain for us, and bring us status and prestige among our peers. This god, of course, is just as false as the idol the Amorites worshiped. He may bring temporary good fortune, but we find no lasting value, only disappointment and disillusionment, in following him.

The Israelites' answer to Joshua was, "We will serve the Lord" (Joshua 24:21). As the Israelites began their new life in the Promised Land, let us begin this new year. Let us "serve the Lord" as He has enabled us to do.
