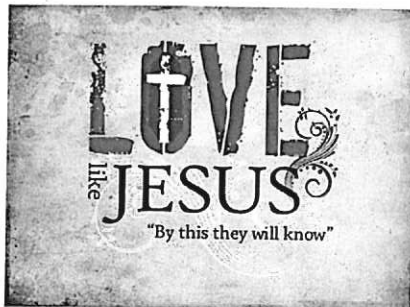


Living Generously

The purpose of this newsletter is to share God's Word so that our members will better understand who we are to be and what we are to do in the light of the Scriptures. It is our hope that this monthly publication will help you grow in your relationship with the Lord and as a Christian steward.

Loving God and Others

God loves us. It's His love that initiated His creation and redemption of mankind. Because God loves us, we can love. The importance of loving is reflected in how Jesus answered the question that He was asked by a Pharisee, who was a lawyer: "Teacher, which is the great commandment in the Law?" Jesus replied, "You shall love

with all

and with

This is the great and first commandment. A second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:36-39). Loving God and others are the first and second commandments we have been given as God's disciples and stewards. In responding to the Pharisee, Jesus refers to "your God." This implies that a relationship already existed. Throughout the Old Testament, God had already demonstrated His love. Jesus wants the Pharisee to respond to the love God had already shown to him. We, too, have experienced the love of God. We, too,

willingly want to express our love for God through loving others.

Even though Jesus was asked to state which was the one great commandment, Jesus could not stop at one. He added a second commandment, for one cannot be kept without the other. We are to love God and others, but we know that true love comes only from God. God's love for us enables us to love Him and others. The Apostle John wrote, "*Beloved, let us love one another, for love is from God. Anyone who does not love does not know God, because God is love. In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent His only Son into the world, so that we might live through Him. In this is love, not that we have loved God but that He loved us and sent His Son to be the propitiation of our sins. Beloved, if God so loved us, we ought to love one another*" (1 John 4:7-11).

Throughout God's Word, He calls us to love everyone which includes not only our families and friends but our enemies, neighbors, and strangers. Jesus tells His disciples that, when they feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, care for the sick and visit those in prison, they are really doing it for Jesus (Matthew 25:35-40). When we love our neighbors, God's love is perfected and shown in us.

God's Instruments of Love

As God's stewards, we receive blessings upon blessings from God Who loves us and wants the best for us. God gives and keeps on giving. However, Scripture is clear that

our stewardship is not seen in what we get from God but rather how He uses us to share our blessings with others. As His instruments, we are His hands, feet, and mouth to the world. We receive in order to give. We find it easier to receive blessings, but, by nature, we are not inclined to be sharing people. Because we are selfish and greedy people, we are more interested in keeping what we have and wanting even more. To enable us to be loving and sharing stewards, God changes our hearts. With transformed hearts filled with God's love, we seek opportunities to use the blessings He has entrusted to us to help others. God's blessings pass through us to others. We are blessed to be a blessing.

The Blessing of Wealth

Is it sinful to be wealthy? Are you suspicious of someone who has a lot of money? Conversely do you consider wealth to be a sign of God's favor? If so, does that mean that those who don't have much money are not in God's good graces? What does the Bible say about this? Let's look at two Biblical characters, one on each end of the financial spectrum.

First is Abraham. When Abraham left Ur to go to Canaan, he took his nephew Lot with him. We read in Genesis 13 that the flocks and herds of each man grew so great that they had to separate. Although God had given the whole land to Abraham, Abraham gave Lot first choice. Lot chose the best land, but still Abraham's animals multiplied. Abraham, out of his wealth, gave the best portion away, and God continued to bless him.

Many years later, Jesus is in the temple where He observes the worshipers putting

money into the temple treasury. He saw rich men dropping their coins in and then "*a poor widow put in two very small copper coins*" (Luke 21:1-4). She was the one He blessed with His words of commendation, for she gave all she had.



What these two had in common was their willingness to share what they had with others. God supplied their needs and enabled them to give to others. Paul writes in 2 Corinthians 9:11, "*You will be made rich in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and through us your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God.*" Yes, wealth is a blessing that God gives, and, as His stewards, we rejoice in the opportunities He gives us to share that blessing as He directs.

All Creation Belongs to God

As God's stewards, we acknowledge, through faith, that God has created and owns all things. All creation belongs to God the Creator. "*The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof, the world and those who dwell therein*" (Psalm 24:1). The Apostle Paul wrote, "*We brought nothing into the world, and we cannot take anything out of the world*" (1 Timothy 6:7). Since all we have is God's, shouldn't we use what we've been given for His purposes? Because of God's grace in Jesus, we are empowered to live lives according to His will and purpose.

Planning a Routine

If you've ever uttered the phrase, "my head is about to explode" you know your brain won't reach critical mass and self-destruct. You say it because your mind has been pushed to exhaustion as a result of the thousands of decisions we make every day. Many of those decisions require immediate deliberations about our options. Other decisions are so routine they are performed subconsciously. We make coffee, brush our teeth, or perhaps even drive to work without thinking because we've performed the task so many times.

Where does exercising fit into the above scenario? Perhaps each day a decision has to be made whether or not to exercise or if at some point we'll decide if something else takes priority. In the moment, we can talk ourselves out of what's best for our health. One way to thwart last-minute changes is to make the decision in advance. In a study published in *Psychological Science*, researchers studied a trait they called "planfulness" and its correlation to how often people exercise. The study confirmed that those who plan for exercise – whether a week or even just a day in advance – exercise more consistently. That settles the debate: **making** the time for exercise is more effective than **finding** the time.

Planfulness involves putting in writing on your calendar the days and times in the coming week you'll exercise. Yes, that still involves thinking, but it's being made before your day gets going and provides protection against the hour-by-hour decision-making of what you'll do next. Eventually, the plotting of your waking hours and how you'll use them will turn into what makes exercising easier: a routine.

Routines take the constant thinking out of the equation because they become imbedded in the day – they become second nature. For example, just like making coffee each day, you know exercise is going to happen. Just like brushing your teeth, exercise is what you do each day to care for your health. Just like driving, you won't have to think about how to work the buttons on the treadmill or think through which sidewalks to walk down because

those decisions will be second nature – you've done them many times before.

For me, morning exercise has become a natural part of my day. When the alarm goes off, there's no need for me to decide what to do. I automatically get out of bed, reach for my sneakers and grab the workout clothes that will complement that morning's activity. Healthy, habitual routines may seem mundane, but what you'll find is that once established, they are a dependable, driving force that can kick in on those days you may not feel like caring for your health.

Did You Know?

A study published in the *Journal of Clinical and Experimental Neuropsychology* found that pregnant women who exercised three times a week for 20-minutes improved their child's brain function and development. In addition, the babies of mothers who exercised were slightly ahead of other babies in their ability to grip, jostle and control how they rolled.

Get Your Dosage of Green

A very small study in *Frontiers in Psychology* showed that spending just 20 minutes outdoors in God's creation – your yard, park or green space – can help lower stress hormone levels.

The research involved 36 people who spent three days a week for eight weeks outdoors where they could either walk and/or sit during their "green time." Researchers used saliva samples to measure cortisol levels (a stress hormone) before and after being outdoors. The results showed that being outside at least 20 minutes was associated with the biggest drop in cortisol levels.

 - Hank Horn made the motion to say yes to the referendum. Second by Bob Behnke. MC.

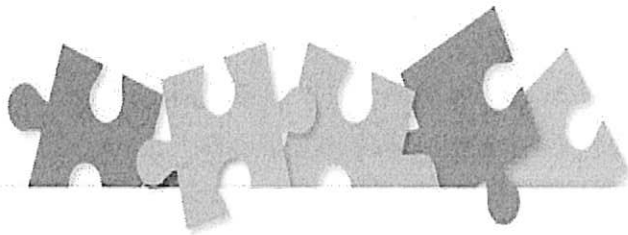

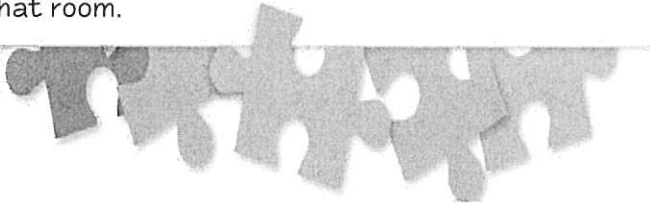
All eyes were on the radiant bride as her father escorted her down the aisle. When they reached the altar and the waiting groom, the bride kissed her father and placed something in his hand.

PUZZLE EXCHANGE

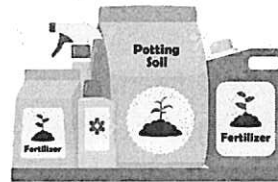

A woman was visiting a church one Sunday. The sermon seemed to go on forever, and many in the congregation fell asleep.

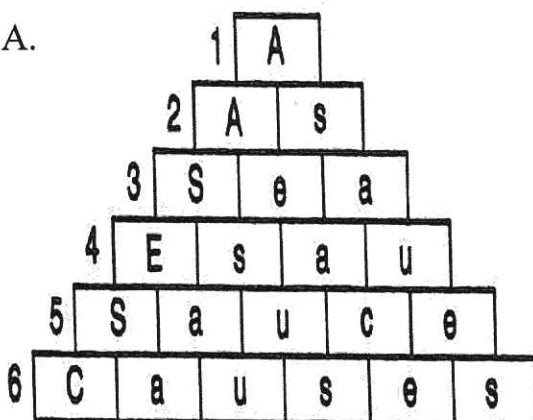

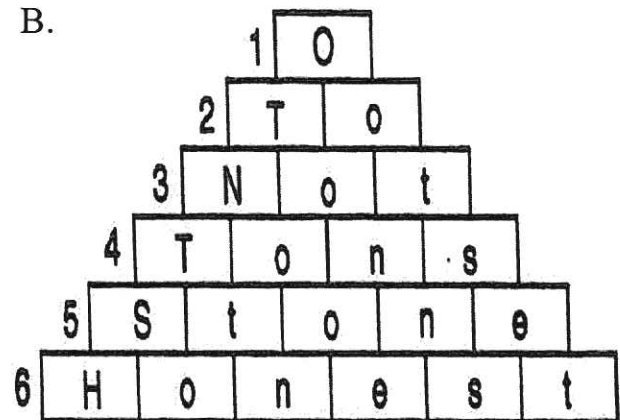

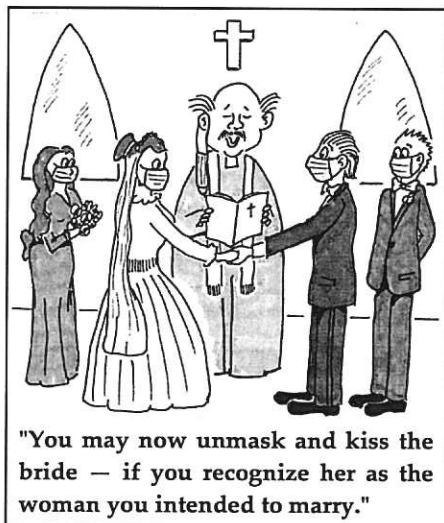
