Living Generously

The purpose of this newsletter is to share God's Word so that our members will better understand who we are to be and what we are to do in the light of the Scriptures. It is our hope that this monthly publication will help you grow in your relationship with the Lord and as a Christian steward.

The Steward's Identity

Who are you? Most often we identify ourselves by our relationships: I'm a father or mother, son or daughter, husband or wife. I'm a carpenter or teacher or businessperson or work in another of the myriad of professions now available to all. Do we identify ourselves in any other way? Do we see ourselves belonging to God? Because God has created us and in Holy Baptism recreated us, we belong to Him. We are His children. In and through Him, all things have "In the beginning God their beginning. created the heavens and the earth" (Genesis 1:1). In His sovereignty, God chose us to be His stewards and to give us dominion over His creation (Genesis 1:28).

To give us the forgiveness of sins, to enable us to overcome the old nature, and to live the life of perfect stewardship in our places, God gave us the most precious gift of His Son. Jesus took our sins upon Himself on the Cross so that we might be reconciled to our Father. Because of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection, we are secure and free in our relationship with our Father. God proclaimed His love for us on the Cross. He waits for our faithful response.

In His ministry on earth, Jesus, our Chief Steward, became our model for stewardship.

In Jesus, we are delivered from the Law to the Gospel of stewardship. At great cost, Jesus has freed us from the power of the Law with His innocent and precious blood so that we may serve Him in "everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness" (Luther's Explanation to the Second Article of the Apostles' Creed). Our motivation and strength as stewards come from the power of the Cross. By His grace, we now have our new identity in Christ. By grace, we see our need for a Savior, and we put off the old self. This paves the way for us to understand our identity as disciples and stewards of Jesus. Through the Gospel, God transforms our identity, and we become His friends, His children, and people who live each day as stewards.




The Gospel Changes Our Identity

The Gospel is our motivator for Christian stewardship. The Law tells us what we must do, whereas the Gospel tells us that Jesus has already done everything for us! It is the Gospel that empowers us to respond freely to obey, honor, love, and respect God. The Gospel, rather than the Law, prompts us to live each day as stewards. The Gospel gives us a new command: "...love one another: just as I have loved you, you are also to love one another" (John 13:34). The Gospel enables us to "be imitators of God, as beloved

children. And walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave Himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God" (Ephesians 5:1-2).

By God's grace, through His gift of faith, we begin to understand all that God did for us through His Son (Romans 5:8). The love of Christ compels us to live for Him. Corinthians 5:14-15). As the Holy Spirit opens our eyes and hearts to God's tremendous love for us, we are transformed into new creations with a new identity. "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come" (2 Corinthians 5:17). With God's love within us, the doing of His will becomes a joy. The Good News of the Gospel changes us from self-serving people to self-giving people who want to live each day as His stewards.



Our Identity as God's Stewards

We don't really want to be stewards. Our first impulse is that we want to be the owners. We want to have possession of things. We want to be important, to be respected, and even to be envied. That's not how it works, though. No, nothing is ours, but God has given us the high calling of stewards. (John 15:16). With such a high calling comes responsibility. With such high honor comes accountability:

"Moreover," writes the Apostle Paul, "it is required of stewards that they be found

trustworthy" (1 Corinthians 4:2). May we, like the two faithful stewards we read about in the Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25:14-30), hear our Master's gracious words, "Well done, good and faithful servant."

Seek First His Kingdom

As God's people by grace though faith in Jesus Christ, we are filled with the Holy Spirit and enabled to demonstrate our love in ways that honor Him. There are many ways that we can respond to God's love for us, all of which are aimed at thanking and praising Him for sending Jesus to be our Savior. First and foremost, we respond to God's love for us by placing Him above everything else in our lives. "But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things will be added to you" (Matthew 6:33). We can also respond to God's love for us by serving Him and His Church with our special talents, interests, and spiritual gifts (1 Peter 4:10).

Prompted to do Good Works

God's gift of grace through Jesus Christ is offered to us out of God's love for us and not as a result of having earned or deserved it. "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast" (Ephesians 2:8-9). undeserving people, we receive God's mercy. Our response and works that we offer do nothing for our salvation, but they demonstrate our love and gratitude for what God has done for us through Jesus. The result of being saved prompts us to do good works (Ephesians 2:10). With renewed and changed hearts, we are zealous in honoring and praising our Lord through what we do.




