Contentment

Contentment is determined by what is inside of us, not the circumstances around us. While short-term happiness comes to us when our circumstances are free from problems and times are pleasant, we soon discover that this happiness is fleeting and superficial. As soon as the conditions change, the shallow contentment that we enjoyed will disappear. Even in the midst of good times, we will often experience a nagging hunger or emptiness that demands to be filled. The philosopher Pascal wrote, "There is within every man a God-shaped emptiness that only He can fill."

In Christ alone we will find peace, inner joy, comfort, happiness, and contentment. "Come to Me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take My yoke upon you and learn from Me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For My yoke is easy and My burden is light" (Matthew 11:28-30).

Psalm 46:1 promises, "God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble." He carries us through life's heartaches and frustrations even though our circumstances may not change. Only our relationship with Christ can make us content regardless of what life around us may offer.



On the Lighter Side

Expressing Your Love

The three words "I love you" are very powerful. Love is expressed not only in words but also in action. In fact, it has been said, "Talk is cheap." To tell someone that you love him is certainly not cheap, but love also needs to be expressed by what we do and how we act. As God's people, we convey love through our giving and serving.

In God's Word, He tells us how much He loves each of us and then proves it by giving His Son to die for us. "For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16). Jesus gave His life for us and He keeps on giving. We can demonstrate our love for Him through our giving. When we give faithfully of our time, talents, and treasures, we show our love for Jesus.

God takes love seriously. He loves us, and He expects us to love one another. Jesus said, "Love one another. As I have loved you…" (John 13:34). We express our love to Jesus when we serve those around us. Serving communicates love. "For even the Son of

Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life as a ransom for many" (Mark 10:45).

The love that Jesus places in our hearts can be our fuel to make a difference not only in our lives, but in the lives of those around us. It is important to express our love as we thank God for His abundant grace, mercy, and blessing, but our words must be supported through the greater expression of our love as seen through our giving and serving as God gives us grace to do.

Are You Willing?

"Now finish the work, so that your eager willingness to do it may be matched by your completion of it, according to your means. For if the willingness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has, not according to what he does not have" (2 Corinthians 8:11-12).

There is so much need around us. Daily we are interrupted by telephone calls soliciting our donations to well-deserving causes. We hear of elderly people in nursing homes who never have visitors and of children in need of mentors. Committees within our congregations seek to add to their boards in order to carry out the ministry of our churches.

We may become overwhelmed. Where do we start? How can I—one person—fill all these needs? Often guilt accompanies these questions. What is God asking of us? According to the Apostle Paul, we are expected to give according to what we have. He was speaking here of monetary offerings, but his admonition relates to the sharing of our time and abilities as well. The key, Paul seems to say, is to be willing. "If the willingness is there, the gift is acceptable."

ANNUAL CHILI DINNER




Ladies Aid is planning their Chili Dinner for February 27th. You can eat here or take out after service on that day. If you wish to take out, please bring your own container.
