# GREETINGS IN THE NAME OF JESUS, OUR LORD AND SAVIOR!

Do you trust your heavenly Father to provide all of your needs? I mean, do you really trust God to take care of you? Do you trust Him enough to show your appreciation, your thanks, for all that He provides you with each and every day of your life?

Trust prompts giving. Jesus tells an amazing story about a poor widow who places all of her trust in the Lord. The Gospel of Luke (also in Mark) records Jesus' observing a poor widow putting two small copper coins into the temple collection box. At the same time, He saw some wealthy individuals giving large amounts of money. Jesus said something surprising when He said that the widow "has put in more than all of them" (Luke 21:3). We are told that the wealthy "contributed out of their abundance" (v. 4). These people made a show of their wealth by dropping large coins in the box so others could hear as well as see their giving. The rich gave abundantly, but their giving didn't cost them that much, because they still had plenty left over for themselves. The poor widow's giving witnessed to her trust in God and in His ability to care and provide for her. With her trust and faith in her heavenly Father, she gave everything she had with joy and confidence. She didn't have money for her next meal, but she gave willingly. In a sense, she was giving herself. She knew that God would supply the provisions that she would need.

When is the last time, you've given your entire pay check to God through your church, or when is the last time you've given away all of your savings? Most of us would say that this has never happened. While God may not be calling most of us to give all that we have away. He does want us to give regularly and generously of all we receive. Why do many of us fail to give in proportion to what we earn to the Lord through our church and other Christian organizations? Each of us has different and unique circumstances, but the one common element that keeps most of us from giving freely and generously is fear. We hold tightly onto our money because we are afraid that the money we've accumulated may not be enough. We allow the money and stuff that we accumulate to become our security. The poor widow had little, but, if she had any fear, she overcame it. She gave all that she had out of trust in the Lord.

Jesus spoke a lot about giving because giving is an important part of our lives as God's people. Whether we



have little, like the poor widow, or much, like the "wealthy" we read about in Luke, God calls us to give regularly and generously. Giving expresses our gratitude to God for who He is and what He has done for us especially through His Son, Jesus. Everything that we have has come from the Lord. "What do you have that you did not receive? If then you received it, why do you boast as if you did not receive it?" (1 Corinthians 4:7). By grace, God gives each of us life, and He provides everything we need for our lives. All that we are and have are gifts from God. Giving is one of the many ways that we express our thanks and our worship of Him.

May God help us place our trust in the Lord and demonstrate that trust through our generous giving.

As I reported at the Voter's Meeting in January, our finances are not in good shape. We ended 2021 \$6,910.82 in the red. Which means we are borrowing from our special funds to pay our monthly bills. In January our income was \$19,552.59 and our expenses were \$19,947.10. Once again our income did not meet our expenses. We ended January \$7,305.13 in the red. We are very good at coming together when we have a challenge to meet. So here is the challenge I am putting out there. Let's get this number improved by \$700 before the end of March. This can be accomplished if each member contributes an ADDITIONAL \$10 during the month of March.





# Witnesses to Christ: People from His Passion

John tells us why he wrote his Gospel: "Jesus did many other signs in the presence of the

disciples, which are not written in this book; but these are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in His name" (John 20:30–31). Life! When we believe that Jesus is the Christ, God gives us life—abundant life, forgiven life, and eternal life.

Historically, the Fourth Gospel is likened to an eagle—an image that suggests John soars to heights of glory and grandeur. That's because the evangelist paints a stunning portrait of Jesus, who is the bread of life, the resurrection and the life, and the way, the truth, and the life. Life in Jesus. That's God's gift to you!

This Lent, our life in Christ will be strengthened as we hear the witness of those in John's Gospel who journeyed to the cross. Along the way, we'll meet villains, such as Barabbas and Pontius Pilate, as well as sinners, such as Peter (who denied Jesus *three* times), Mary Magdalene (who was possessed by *seven* demons), and Judas Iscariot (who betrayed Jesus for *thirty* pieces of silver).

# Living Generously

The purpose of this newsletter is to share God's Word so that our members will better understand who we are to be and what we are to do in the light of the Scriptures. It is our hope that this monthly publication will help you grow in your relationship with the Lord and as a Christian steward.

# **Demonstrating our Faithfulness**

We show our faithfulness to the Lord by faithfully managing the resources. responsibilities, and gifts He entrusts to us. The Apostle Paul wrote, "Now it is required that those who have been given a trust must prove faithful" (1 Corinthians 4:2). We are to be faithful in our witnessing (Philemon 6), in expressing love to others (Galatians 6:10), in prayer (Romans 12:12), in our giving (1 Corinthians 16:2), and in all things. Peter teaches, "Each one should use whatever gift he has received to serve others, faithfully administering God's grace in its various forms" (1 Peter 4:10). The writer of Hebrews tells us that only what we do in faith is pleasing to God (Hebrews 11:6). Our actions mean little to God unless they come from loving and faithful hearts. Faithfully managing all that God has entrusted to us demonstrates our faith and is pleasing to Him.

# Stewardship Is a Matter of the Heart

God gives us the privilege and opportunity to be His stewards. Even though God gives us all things, He still allows us the freedom to choose whom or what we will serve. Whether we are stewards for the Lord, for ourselves, or for some other master depends on who or what controls our hearts. What or whom we love, serve, and follow is dictated by what our hearts value as most important.

The choices we make reflect what is in our hearts. Satan is doing everything possible to take the love, compassion, and peace from our hearts that only Jesus can place there.



Jesus said, "Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matthew 6:21). We can paraphrase this by saying, "Show me your treasure, and I will show you your heart." What we treasure the most receives our time, energy, money, and love. Each of us determines where his treasures lie. What do you love and treasure the most? Unfortunately, some of us may find treasures in our homes, careers, cars, hobbies, or investments. God continually invites us to make Him our treasure. If our hearts are right, our treasures will be right.

Jesus spoke about the relationship between the condition of a tree and the fruit that it bears. "Make a tree good and its fruit will be good, or make a tree bad and its fruit will be bad, for a tree is recognized by its fruit" (Matthew 12:33). Just as the condition of the tree determines its fruit, so will the thoughts of our hearts dictate our words and actions (Matthew 12:34-35). When our hearts are filled with God's presence, we reflect God's love, goodness, and kindness. When our hearts are right with God, our eyes are opened to the opportunities to serve

and help others. When God controls our hearts, we willingly use our time, talents, and money in ways that glorify Him. Good hearts produce good fruit. As we spend time in God's Word and participate in the Sacraments, God changes our hearts, making us into faithful disciples and stewards for Christ.

## All of It



# Love through Faith

What is it that precedes the disciples' request of Jesus to increase their faith? It is

Jesus' command to count others so precious as to avoid putting any kind of temptation in their paths.

How is this possible? If we are honest with ourselves, we must admit that, in and of ourselves, we cannot follow these commands. Then we, like the disciples, must ask of our Lord, "Increase our faith."



How does Jesus respond to their request? He assures them that even faith as small as a mustard seed can accomplish great things. "If you have faith as small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mulberry tree, 'Be uprooted and planted in the sea,' and it will obey you" (Luke 17:6). It is God Who gives the faith, and it is God Who gives us the ability to act on it. It is God Who gives us love motivated by faith that sacrifices our own desires for the good of others, love that knows no limit, love that serves instead of asking to be served.

It has been an honor and privilege to serve you, the members of the congregation, over the past 32 years. It will actually be 32 years and 2 days from the day that I was installed as your pastor.

- Constitution and By- Law Revisions
  - Constitution Revisions:
    - Amendments:
      - 12.1 Amendments to this constitution (except 2.0, 6.0, and 11.0) and the bylaws and changes in the Articles of Incorporation may be adopted at a regular or special meeting of the Voters' Assembly, provided:
        - 1. 12.11 That they do not conflict with the provisions laid down in Article II or with any section of any other article that pertains to scriptural doctrine and practice
        - 2. 12.12 That the proposed amendment has been submitted in writing at a previous meeting of the Voters' Assembly.
        - 3. 12.13 That a quorum of at least twenty voting members is present.
        - 4. 12.14 That the amendment is adopted by a two-thirds majority of voters present and voting.
      - 12.3 All amendments shall be submitted to the district for review and approval. Only after—such approval shall amendments be valid and implemented.

The revised constitution shall, as a condition of continued membership in good standing of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, must be submitted to the president of the district for review by the district constitution committee and favorable action by the district's board of directors before being adopted by the congregation.

- o ByLaw Revisions:
  - Meetings:

- 4.1 Regular meetings of the Voters' Assembly shall be held quarterly unless no business needs to be conducted. in the months of January, April, and October. Meetings will be held in person. Voting members who cannot attend in person may participate virtually. Under certain circumstances, identified by the church council, meetings may be held virtually.
- **4.2** The regular meeting of the Voters' Assembly during the month of January first quarter shall be designated as the annual meeting.
- 4.3 All-Regular meetings of the Voters' Assembly shall be announced by word or in the bulletin in all church services on the preceding two Sundays. or by a mailing to the membership.
   Whenever a meeting has thus been announced and convened, at least twenty twelve all voting members present shall constitute a quorum except for when the following subjects will be voted on, which would then require a quorum of twenty people. If a quorum is not met, another meeting will be scheduled where all members in attendance will constitute the quorum.
  - 1. Amending the constitution/by-laws
  - 2. Buying or selling property
  - 3. Disbanding of the congregation
- 4.4 Special meetings of the Voters' Assembly may be called by the Church Council, er-by-the Board of Elders, er by the pastor with the approval of the president, or ten (10) voting members. as the need arises. Announcements of special meetings shall be made in the services of the two previous Sundays or in the services of the previous Sunday when accompanied by notification by mail, email, text or some other electronic means. The purpose of all special meetings must be included in the announcements. as described above.
- 4.6 Board meetings may be held either in person or virtually
- AMENDMENTS

These bylaws may be amended in a properly convened meeting of the voters assembly

Amendments shall be adopted by a majority of all votes cast, provided the proposed change has been announced in a previous meeting or has been submitted in writing at least two weeks prior to the meeting to all voting members

The revised bylaws shall, as a condition of continued membership in good standing of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, must be submitted to the president of the district for review by the district constitution committee and favorable action by the district board of directors before being adapted by the congregation.

# Election of Congregational Officers

• **7.0** The nominating committee for each year shall consist of the vice president and a senior outgoing *junior* member of each of the Boards. of Elders, Trustees, Stewardship/Evangelism, and Christian Education, ...

## Terms of Officers

- **8.2** The term of the President and Vice President will be 2 year terms being duly elected on alternating years eligible, for not more than—**1** 2 consecutive terms. The nature of the duties of this board requires that only men noted for their Christian knowledge, zeal, and experience in the spiritual work of the Kingdom of Christ shall be elected.
- 8.3 The term of office of all other officers who do not serve on boards shall be for one year, eligible for continuous re-election. for not more

- than two consecutive years, except for the office of the treasurer and financial secretary, whose term of office may be extended upon approval by the voters.
- 8.4 No Board members shall-may hold the same office for more than
  one two full terms of two or three years as set forth for each board. After
  one year of being out of office, this person shall again be eligible to hold
  this same office.
- Call Committee
  - Currently, there are 3 people on the call committee: Rick Riemer, Sue Wittmann, and Dave Sonnabend

    - The call committee will be responsible for all the paperwork that needs to be completed and will be a liaison to the congregation
