Military BibleStick Challenge


The challenge among the five churches continues through Easter Sunday. Those participating in the

From the proceeds of the Chili Dinner, Ladies Aid has given a gift of 1,318.30 to mission projects.



Nothing Fishy About It

We enjoy going to the St. Louis Missouri Botanical Garden – and especially visiting the 14acre Japanese garden. Once there, we often stop to watch people feed the large Japanese carp, called koi. They look like giant goldfish, and it's fun to see these carp go after food pellets in a feeding frenzy.

An interesting fact about koi is that their growth is dependent upon their environment, specifically the quality of the water and the size of the pond. Typically, koi can grow to about three feet in length, but that growth can be stunted if the fish are kept in a confined pond with poor water quality. Saying it another way, if you give koi the right environment for growth and keep them immersed in a good water source, they will grow.

That's an apt comparison to us as Christians. We have many opportunities to ". . . grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. . ." (2 Peter 3:18). Unfortunately, our sinful natures often tempt us to chase after other options that not only hinder our growth, but also cause us to drift away from God.

Every Sunday, for example, is an opportunity to immerse ourselves in the hearing and learning of God's word through worship and Bible study. In that environment, we are joyfully reminded that even though we sin daily, God forgives for Jesus' sake. We are tempted every day to seek out unhealthy "growth" substitutes — ones where we could find ourselves beached and doing nothing at all beneficial, or floundering in less-than-healthy waters that could lead us to get snared by the hooks of our sinful desires.

At those times when we find ourselves like carp swimming aimlessly, or being drawn to feed on harmful pellets that tempt us, don't forget to grasp what it truly means to be a CARP: by God's grace we are Christ's Atoned and Redeemed People. We are CARP swimming in the cleansing waters of baptism that have washed away our sins. Through Christ's atoning sacrifice on the cross, we live as redeemed people in God's eyes.

Here's the other comparison we have with carp: they are typically at the bottom of the fish hierarchy. They are the bottom dwellers of ponds and rivers and aren't considered much of a delicacy when it comes to mealtime. We can relate: being poor miserable sinners also places us at the bottom of humanity, but thanks be to God that He looks past our lowly state and through His love we are Christ's Atoned and Redeemed People.

He Is Risen! And Now...

One of the most glorious sections in all of Scripture is found in 1 Corinthians 15 where we find the words of the apostle Paul as he expounds on Christ's crucifixion. resurrection, and subsequent appearances to His disciples. He writes about the implications of those events that, just as we all died in Adam, so in Christ we are all made alive and that, just as Christ has a new glorified body, so shall we put off the raised with perishable and be imperishable body. What a glorious passage! This is what Easter means to us!

Without taking a breath, Paul then continues, "Now about the collection..." To our minds these two themes don't fit

together. Certainly thoughts about the collection don't belong in an Easter message, do they? Paul thinks they do, and why not? First, how do we respond to such a great gift as our salvation? Since God has poured out on us the treasures of His grace, will we not want to make a tangible expression of thanksgiving? Second, with a dying world around us, will we not want to expedite the mission of the Church to spread the Gospel message? "Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labor in the Lord is not in vain" (1 Corinthians 15:58).

In the Palm of His Hand

Our Father, who loves us so much, sent His own beloved Son to this earth to be born to a young mother and her carpenter husband. This Child, who was and is King, was born in a stable, surrounded by animals, not servants. Shortly after His birth, His parents were forced to flee to escape the wrath of a jealous king who, in an effort to eliminate all competition, killed all male children under the age of two. But the Heavenly Father held His Son in the palm of His hand. No harm came to Him until the appointed time.

None of these events came as a surprise to the Father. He was aware of the conditions in the world. He chose humble people to be His Son's parents. He knew what would happen on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. Nothing that occurred was beyond His control. He held His Son in the palm of His hand. That beloved Son is our Good Shepherd, and no less watchful is His care for us. He comes to us and gives us faith so that we, His sheep, can recognize His voice. Jesus' own words tell us this is true: "My sheep listen to My voice; I know them, and they follow Me. I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; no one can snatch them out of My hand" (John 10:27-28).



Therefore, we have nothing to fear! Family problems, loss of job, uncertainty of the future – we are secure in His hand, for He will allow no one to separate us from Him. He holds us in the palm of His hand.

Carry Your Own Load

When things are going well and we achieve some success, it is easy to forget that it is God Who gives us our gifts and soon we are using them for our own glory, rather than His.

Whether God gives us many talents or few, we are accountable to God for what we do with them. The Apostle Paul wrote, "So then, each of us will give an account of himself to God" (Romans 14:12). "For we must all appear before the judgment seat of

Christ, so that each one may receive what is due him for the things done in the body, whether good or evil" (2 Corinthians 5:10).

In the Parable of the Talents found in Matthew 25, Jesus spoke about being accountable. Jesus said that a man going on a journey entrusted three servants with different amounts of talents (money). Upon his return, he found that two of the servants had demonstrated their faithfulness by prudently investing their talents. When the master heard they had doubled the amount they had been given, he praised them and gave them even greater responsibility. The one servant who did nothing with his talent received the master's wrath.

Our Savior came to earth with a job to do. He held Himself accountable to carry out His task even though it caused Him extreme anguish (Luke 22:44). Joyfully (Hebrews 12:2), willingly He went to the cross for us, faithfully fulfilling His purpose of saving sinners.

We, too, will be held accountable for the blessings which God entrusts to us. Through faith, God can strengthen and equip us so we can hear, "Well done, good and faithful servant" (Matthew 25:21).


