The Shepherd's Corner, August 2025... "Fanned Into Flame"

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, according to the promise of life that is in Christ Jesus, to Timothy, my dear son: Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord. I thank God, whom I serve, as my forefathers did, with a clear conscience, as night and day I constantly remember you in my prayers. Recalling your tears, I long to see you, so that I may be filled with joy. I have been reminded of your sincere faith, which first lived in your grandmother Lois and in your mother Eunice and, I am persuaded, now lives in you also. For this reason I remind you to fan into flame the gift of God, which is in you through the laying on of my hands. For God did not give us a spirit of timidity, but a spirit of power, of love and of self-discipline.

(2 Timothy 1:1-7)

Dear Friends in Christ,

Those of us who've tended woodstoves or campfires over the years know that "it only takes a spark to get a fire going." (It may also take a bit of huffing and puffing, or even a good dose of lighter fluid to help things along!)

St. Paul writes to his young protégé Timothy, in the passage above, about the spark of faith that was started in him when he was young. That spark of faith began with mom, grandma, and people who loved him putting the good news about Jesus in his tender young ears, and by bringing him to the "gift of God" in the blessed water of Baptism. The spark of faith was begun in Timothy, and that same spark is in all of us who have faith. That is a good and beautiful and holy thing, and a gift all of us should be forever grateful for.

But should we be content with the original spark - with a little, glowing ember of faith? St. Paul laid his hands on young Timothy and urged him to reach for more. Timothy, it seems, was timid about his gifts and shy about using them. "Now fan into flame the gift of God," Paul told him.

How does that work? How can you and I do it? How can we "fan into flame" the gift of faith God has given us? Should we be content with small things or lesser things, or should we also be asking God for the "power, love, and self-discipline" that will enable us to do great things for Him? This will take more than a little effort on our part; it will take bit of spiritual "huffing and puffing" as we seek the will of God, a little "Holy Spirit lighter fluid" to stoke the fire under us. Fanning the gift of God into a flame will require that "day and night prayer" St. Paul talks about, and seeking God's will in His Word. (That's why we've been doing our "Bible reading challenges," and why I've been asking all of you to come to Bible studies). Being "on fire for Jesus," and spreading the Good News about Jesus in the world around us, is what God is looking for, and has always been looking for, from His Church and from His people.

Fire, as we all know, can be destructive. But we're not talking about an out-of-control forest fire here, or a house fire, or a fire that does harm. We're talking about a blessed bonfire, the kind of fire that warms and comforts and welcomes people - the fire of the love of God.

I've been waiting (not always patiently!) and praying that our Lord will light a holy fire in our churches, and that we'll light a candle together in this place that everyone around us will see and feel. Please pray, with all your heart, that the spark in us all will be fanned into a flame.

Sunday, August 3, 2025, Eighth Sunday after Pentecost "Hearts and Minds On Things Above"

Faith - if it's truly faith in the life and work and Person of Jesus Christ - is that kind of mountain-moving faith that touches hearts and lives, and can change even the most impossible of situations. Join as we see what faith in Christ can do.

Thursday Evening, the Opening of Convention, held the Celebration Service with Holy Communion for over 4,000 people. It is such an emotional time feeling the Holy Spirit with us in Praising, Word and Sacrament.

We were blessed with wonderful Bible Studies and speakers. Friday Evening Bible Studies were offered by Donna Snow and Pastor Cory & Deb Burma. Over 600 participated. Wake Up in the Word was attended by 806 attendees. Leaders included Chaplin Craig Muehler, Rev. John Hakmann, Rev. Robert Roegner, Sharla Fritz, Christa Petzoid and Deb Burma.

- Our Convention Bible Study Leader was author Christina Hergenrader. She spoke of our ancestors, what they went through and how their faith carried them through their lives. What would they think of how things have turned out? We all have a part. There is a divine timeline, have patience. There is grace in waiting. God has a plan for it all and in the end its not about us. It's about Jesus. Don't miss opportunities to share how God has been good to you!
- Our Keynote Speaker was Rev. Kris Whitby who is currently the Assistant to the President of Mission & Ministry for the Northern Illinois District. He spoke of not treating people like a commodity. Build relationships, making friends and telling them of Jesus. Do not loose connections within your community, but learn what the needs are.
- Mites in Action Speakers included: Dakota Boys & Girls Ranch, Light of Christ in Eastern Europe, Lutheran Braille Workers, Lutheran Deaf Outreach and Forged by Fire Services (sharing Jesus with free meals; feed+listen+pray with them. Providing devotions and Bibles)

Over 100 Exhibit Booths offered information on missions, education and resources to serve God.

Servant Events: Attendees accomplished the following activities:

- 81 units of blood were donated
- ♥ 48,605 Mercy Meals were packed for Orphan Grain and 56 quilts were tied for Orphan Grain Train;
- 339 onesies were decorated for Lutheran Family Services
- ♥ 2,544 witness bracelets were assembled for MOST Ministries
- 300 First Responder Tool kits were assembled for Nebraska First Responders
- ▼ 265 cards of hope were created for Phils' Friends and 256 military thank you cards were created and distributed to Offutt Air Force Base in Omaha
- 9,600 feminine products were sewn and provided to Messiah Lutheran Church Lincoln-Common Threads
- ♥ 106 braille books and calendars made for Lutheran Braille Workers

Convention Offerings and Gifts-From-the-Heart totals have not yet been finalized for Camp Linn Haven; Grace Point Institute for Relational Help; Lutheran Early Response Team; Camp Luther of Nebraska; Lutheran Family Services of Nebraska and University of Nebraska at Lincoln Campus Ministry.

A Mission Grant Goal for the 2025-2027 Biennium was set at \$2,622,270.00 Thirty-three grants were chosen and can be viewed at https://www.lwml.org/mission-grants.

Tee Up for Mites raised over \$10,000 with 80 golfers. The Mission Walk had 1697 walkers and raised \$75,000.

As the Convention closed, we were reminded in our Sending Service that Christ is with us. Over these last few days, we have renewed or made new friendships sharing many hugs and encouragement to go out into God's World. We were also excited to have 79 Young Women's Representatives attend the convention. This is our future!
