NORTH WISCONSIN DISTRICT PASTORS CONFERENCE SURVEY COMPILED INFORMATION.

There was a total of 77 surveys filled out, however, 8 of those were individuals who filled out the survey more than once. So, for those who filled out the survey more than once, their most recent survey reply was kept and the older one was disregarded. The reason for keeping the most recent reply to the survey was that it was most likely their most recent thoughts on the matter.

While we are aware that the way the North Wisconsin Pastor Conference has done things in various ways through the years, and there are still some who remember how it was done 10 years ago, 15 years ago, and so forth. We have had a lot of new guys move into the district in the last 10 years who come with different experiences from previous districts, and we have had gentlemen move onto other Districts, retired, or join the Lord awaiting the resurrection.

Therefore, this survey was compiled to help the current committee and any future committees in planning the North Wisconsin District Pastors Conferences Fall & Spring Rally. We are aware that information may change in the future, and such details may not be valid at that time. However, this gives the committee some much needed feedback in planning each conference.

The best feedback though comes from personal one-on-one conversations that are uplifting and building up of the body of Christ and not one of criticism or false witness that destroys those for whom our Lord has died, redeemed, and calls His beloved Child. If you are unhappy with these results or desire to see change in the Pastor's Conference that reflect our theology, confessions, and practices then please volunteer to serve on the planning committee.




Most Current Practice:

As of recently we have had Fall Conference at a Hotel that is able to house both participants and provide a room for meeting. Hosting at a hotel there are additional costs that come with using their facilities. Some of these extras may require food charges, use of A/V, etc. We have hosted at a church in the Fall, but with their school there is concern about interfering with their daily schedule.

The Spring Conference has taken place at Camp Luther, and at some churches who are able to host us. Hosting at a local church is significantly cheaper and does cut down the overhead cost when then passes along a savings to our local churches / participants.


Most Recent Practice:


As stated above we have recently had congregations that have been willing to host pastor's conferences which is a cost savings over being at a conference center of some sort. However, we are unaware of which congregations are able and willing to host the conference. So, while we may have congregations that have significant space to host a conference, they may for various reasons be unable or unwilling to host a conference.

Instead of insisting that a congregation host a conference we thought the best place to begin is to ask about willingness to host. Just because a congregation may be willing / able to host does not mean that they will be selected to host a conference, as there are numerous factors that go into consideration such as the congregation's leadership willingness to host a conference.

We also need to consider the availability of local housing for those traveling to the conference, and enough hotel / lodging for 200+ people. As well as restaurants that can feed those who are in attendance.

Are there adequate hotel / housing options within 10 miles from your congregation?




Are there sufficient food options within a reasonable distant of the church?




Most recent Practice:

Over the last couple of years, the cost of the conference has ranged from \$80 to \$145, plus additional charges for spouses and kids. We have done all we can and will continue to try to do so, offering the conference for FREE to all retired pastors. The range in cost for the conference varies due to things on location of having in a church vs. a conference center and any extra fees that are required from our host. There are also additional cost to be able to bring in more prominent speakers to address the conference.

It should be noted that we do not annually or in anyway receive money from the North Wisconsin District Office for Pastors conference. The conferences are the responsibility of the pastors in our District. So all funds brought in cover the cost of the conference, any extra funds we have go into the Pastors Conference Checking account, giving seed money for future conferences.


We are still really cheap compared to other Districts who charge well over \$150+ in addition to the cost of hotel cost, travel, and meals.

What is your preference for the Fall Conference? (Typically a 3 day event)





We have a total of 215 congregations and roughly 170 pastors workers in our district. And on average, we get about 115-130 people (not just active pastors) who attend the Fall Conference. There have been numerous reasons given over the years for lack of attendance, including the length – so we thought it would be a good idea to get feedback on the length as well as the timing (days on which we meet) to see if there is a need for change.


As you can see from the responses a majority thought the length is just right, and the current timing also appears to be the most favored.

What is your preference for the Spring Conference? (Typically a 2 day event)





Do you regularly attend the Pastors Conference?







Does your spouse or family travel with you to Pastor's conferences?







Some pastors attend with their families, while some are unable for various reasons. But for those who have attended there has NOT really been any activities that have been geared for wives or children. So the thought was to see if there is a strong desire, need for activities geared towards families.

As you can see, very few travel with their family. This feedback allows the planning committee to know that while there isn't a high demand for family activities – they can still plan activities if they so choose, but it's not a real focal point in the planning processes. I would like to see the Fall conference return to being a "practical" oriented conference. Let's bring in some people who are doing innovative ministry and learn from them. How do we better minister in a chaning culture, etc. Seems like a steady diet of CTSFW faculty lately. Time for a change. I'm not positive Antigo is big enough for a conference. We have 140 hotel rooms in our city. Some who attend probably drive home to sleep. I think we have enough restaurants. Due to having a full school and childre ministry... we could only host the spring if it's basically a 24 hour conference, afternoon, eveing and next morning. We would move our school lunch and childcare food times into our gym. I haven't run this past all of our staff leaders yet, so we would need to put a few more heads together before making the final decision if we were asked to do it. Thanks for asking.

The spring conference tends to be smaller...our fellowship hall can accommodate 100-125 people. I'd be interested in having Our Redeemer-Kingsford host a conference. The Iron Mountain area has plenty of hotels, great restaurants, and plenty for people to do if visiting the area. Feel free to reach out to me if interested.

Thanks for all you do! No complaints here.

I'm retired, and I have not been able to attend as often in the past as I would like, but I still enjoy attending when I'm able.

I would like to be a more regular attendee of the Pastors' Conferences, but unfortunately I have not yet made that commitment in my time in Wisconsin. I was a regular attendee of the conferences when I was in Michigan, and I believe there are a number of reasons that have contributed to my change. I will list them below, but they are not in any order other than the order in which I thought of them when considering this question. 1) Family situation changed (it's easier to attend before you have kids). 2) Work load changed (the pace and responsibilities at Pilgrim have not been conducive to faithful attendance). 3) The NWD does not promote the conferences and I, honestly, don't really know they are happening. They are simply not on my radar. 4) The times I have been aware of the conferences, the speakers and/or topics have been uninteresting and or irrelevant to anything I face in ministry. 5) Covid had an impact I'm sure, but I did attend the virtual one. I know it's easy to "complain" or "critique" without offering suggestions or to help, so I would like to offer some suggestions or help. First, look at how the Michigan District runs their fall conference and see what it would take for us to have a similar one. It was always a highlight, not an obligation to attend. Second, begin with a question to be answered as the theme for the conference, then build accordingly. For instance, "How should we think politically as pastors?" There are a wide variety of responses, find 2-3 speakers who will address this from different angles. Or, "Why does creation matter?" Then call Ken Hamm and Chuck Arand. I guarantee people would attend. Finally, and in the same vein as above, I would be willing to serve on the conference committee, or at least serve as a sounding board for sharing my thoughts. I would love to have our conferences be highlight events! Thank you for all you do!

FIRST FEW QUESTIONS ABOUT HOSTING ARE NOT APPLICABLE TO ME SINCE I SERVE AT A VETERANS' FACILITY NOT A CONGREGATION. THANKS FOR AL YOU DO!

I really don't have an opinion on most of the last 3 years since I've been back in the district is the presenters. I have thanks for all you do longing the presentations and anachronistic. When I was first in the district we had theological leaders from other church bodies make presentations that were very engaging, thought-provoking, and challenging. To simply get a sem prof really isn't going to significantly improve our theological acumen or adapt our ministries to an ever-changing culture. In my opinion our district and synod have become far too insular. I realize that I am surely an outlier to the current cadre of younger pastors so weigh my comments accordingly. Thanks for your service to the district.

I'm not a regular attendee at Conferences. I answered with what I'd consider the best if I were to attend.

I like the idea of meeting with South WI District. I said we would be glad to host but we really are too small unless we know it will be a small turnout.

A 2 day conference isn't really a conference, to leave behind the church for 24 hours is silly. Make them 3 days long, it's worth the time commitment for pastors.

The word that means "also or excessive" is spelled "too" not "to".

Including wives and families would be great, but I fully understand the challenges associated with planning for them and incorporating activities for them. Simple child care would probably be the easiest way of incorporating families with young children.

Congregations that normally have the space to host a fall conference are those with schools. Meeting space would be in the gymnasium, with table setup. Meeting in the sanctuary without tables is not an option. You need tables so that you can do work. I suppose an option would be to meet in the lunchroom, but that's not a worse idea (trust me, telling teachers to have kids eat in classroom is not good). Displacing students from their lunchroom, or from the gymnasium are not options we want to take as we'd like to stay in good relationship with teachers. Our spring conference at St Jakobi in Shawano went extremely well, but it is a smaller conference in the spring, therefore a doable option. Doing such a thing for he fall conference becomes much more problematic. Those who are making the suggestions, also don't listen when the logistic difficulties of doing such is explained to them. If somebody has an idea, and knows that it will work, put them on the conference committee, let them do the planning - put up, or shut up Yes, I am aware of logistical issues, and also about having to make everyone happy. I did it as chair for 5+years in the New England District, an serving twice in the NWD.

Going to Marquette, MI, in the fall was always a good time. We should go back there.

Wouldn't mind joining the Southern WI District as long as it's not both Fall and Spring!

I would love to host a conference, but I feel Trinity Merrill would be too small.

Note: Desire to host and ability to host are two different things.

Regarding joint conference - sounds good in theory, but would require location in central Wis. Maybe a once every three year event?

While we have the space and the facilities it might be a bit of a challenge depending on dates because of local events and hotel availability. I would be happy to talk to someone about it. Also while I listed both, we might be better suited for Spring.

I think our congregation could hold a spring conference but not a fall one.

Our facilities are large but with heavy facility usage by our school it prohibits being a possible location for a pastors conference.

If a joint Conference is held with SWD, then it should rotate from our district to theirs each time.
