FROM OUR PARISH NURSE —

November is National Family Caregivers Month. This is a time to celebrate the contribution of those volunteer friends and family members who support a loved one with their health or managing a disability. We're thankful for the contributions of the more than 44 million Americans who care for a family member, friend, or neighbor.

Tips for family caregivers:

1. **Seek support from other caregivers.** You are not alone!
2. **Take care of your own health** so that you can be strong enough to take care of your loved one.
3. **Accept offers of help** and suggest specific things people can do to help you.
4. Learn how to **communicate effectively** with doctors.
5. Caregiving is hard work so **take respite breaks** often.
6. Watch out for **signs of depression** and don't delay getting professional help when you need it.
7. Be open to **new technologies** that can help you care for your loved one.
8. **Organize medical information** so it's up to date and easy to find.
9. Make sure **legal documents are in order.**
10. **Give yourself credit for doing the best you can in one of the toughest jobs there is!**

Since at least 2000, presidents have designated November as National Family Caregivers Month to honor the more than 40 million caregivers across the country who support aging parents, ill spouses or other loved ones with disabilities who remain at home. Adults of all ages are among the ranks of family caregivers, according to a 2015 study by AARP and the National Alliance for Caregiving. More than a third of caregivers were ages 50 to 64, about a quarter were 35 to 49, and another quarter were 18- to 34-year-olds. Perhaps most surprising as America's population ages: 7 percent of family caregivers were age 75 or older, a share that has gone up steadily in the past two decades. Often the recipient is a spouse with dementia or heart disease who needs a high level of care for 34 hours or more a week, and the caregiver has been providing that help for more than five years.

"These everyday heroes, living quietly among us in families and communities across the country, are the major source of long- term care in America," President Bill Clinton said in his 2000 proclamation of National Family Caregivers Month. "By providing billions of dollars' worth of caregiving services each year, they dramatically reduce the demands on our Nation's health care system and make an extraordinary

contribution to the quality of life of their loved ones." The benefit to society also can be an individual burden, borne silently. Isolation issues. Although a majority of caregivers reported that they had a friend or relative available to confide in and have contact with socially, almost 1 in 10 said they had no one to talk to about private matters and 1 in 5 said they had no one to call for help. Lots of balls in the air. Most family caregivers must juggle their home lives with working a paid job and meeting the needs of the relatives or friends in their care. A labor of love. Almost half of family caregivers are adult children caring for their parents. About 1 in 5 are wives or husbands caring for their spouses. If you or someone you love has become a family caregiver, please offer a helping hand or possibly a listening ear. Encourage caregivers to be in touch with local health programs; contact the local VNA, the Family Resource Center, and your local health clinic for ideas and support. And remember to talk with your local pastor, church secretary or Parish Nurse for assistance. Family caregivers are important to our whole society as well as our families.

St. John's Outreach Committee chose the residents at the Guttenberg Care Center as their focus for the God's Work, Our Hands event this year. Because our friends at the Care Center are so isolated during this time, we wanted to let them know we care. Items collected included large piece puzzles, large print word search books, magazines, note cards, candy treats and personal care items. Thank you to all who donated items.

TIPS TO STAY GROUNDED DURING A PANDEMIC

Pandemics are not something with which most of us are familiar. I remember being quarantined due to scarlet fever with daily home visits from our family doctor for injections of penicillin. My siblings hated taking their pills everyday and being stuck at home. My mother quarantined with me and fortunately my grandmother kept the household functioning. I was very ill so it didn't matter so much to me, but I know my whole family suffered silently.

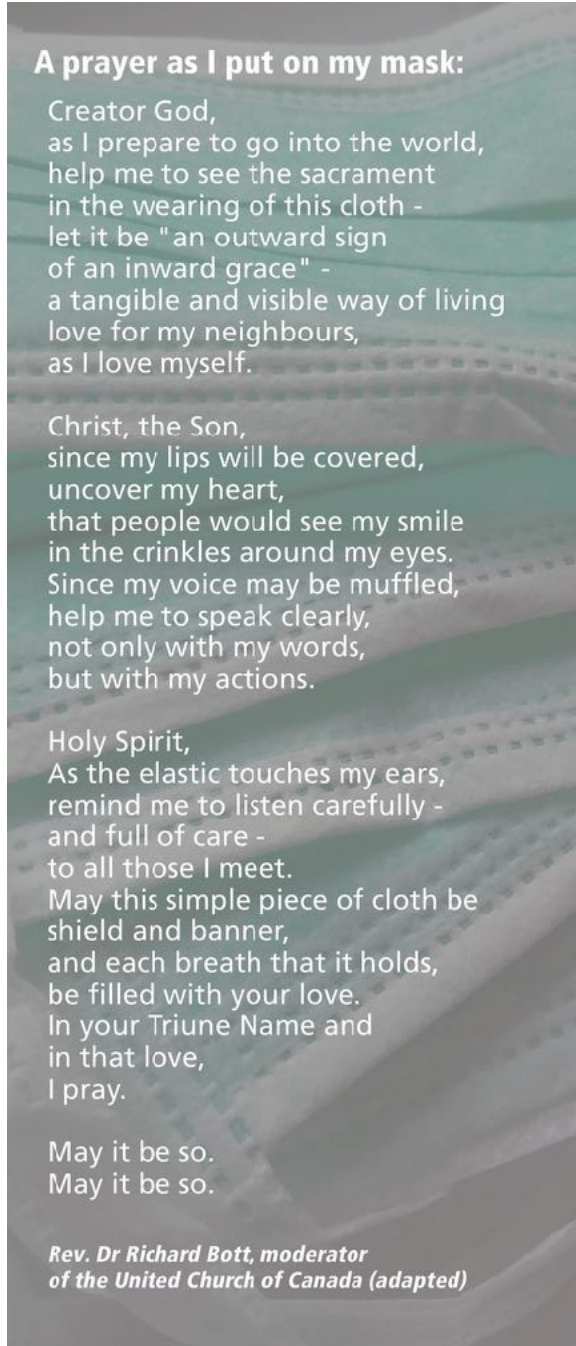
While it may feel like there is a lot we can't control amidst the "fear" of Covid-19, there are several ways we can take control of our personal situations. Whether we are called to self isolate at home, quarantine due to a positive test or just needing to limit exposure to outsiders consider becoming more aware of yourself and how to boost your own spiritual, mental and physical health.

By listening to our body and emotions we can better handle the added stress and anxiety that creep up on us during a pandemic due to the known and unknown aspects of the disease all over the world. While it's important to listen to the news and be aware of the CDC guidelines and updates, too much of the news can have a sobering effect.

There are many ways we can take control of our lives to promote our overall health. (1) Regular exercise has been shown to counteract stress and reduce inflammation due to stress hormones in the body. Walking around your home or neighborhood, if it is safe for you, marching in place, any regular exercises you are accustomed to do, and making sure to just get up and move around every hour or so to improve circulation. Exercise has also been proven to improve mental outlook. (2) Meditation, Prayer, reading your Bible lead to positive, structural, and functional changes in the brain. Challenge yourself to set aside time to read your Bible and prayer. Start with 15 minutes and lengthen the time as you begin to grow in your understanding of God. Praying about everything in your life helps to maintain an even mental outlook. (3) Social connections when you are feeling alone or sad can also improve your outlook. Phone calls to friends or family you cannot actually visit, as well as computer programs that bring us face to face on a screen, are a good way to keep up with others and realize we are all facing similar challenges. Remember, Pastor Mike has made it possible to join in our worship services on the church website and receive a mid week devotion.

Embrace best health practices as much as possible. Always have a mask handy and wear it when away from home and other people may be present. Be sure to wash your hands before meal preparation, eating, and when returning to your home, as well as when your hands are in need of a good cleansing. Maintaining a healthy diet of lean protein, lots of fruit and vegetables while limiting excess sugar, fats and alcohol, helps our body to stay healthy and strong. Check with your health care provider to consider other immunizations and possible vitamins such as Vitamins C and D, and perhaps Zinc to promote your overall health and keep your immune system healthy.

Many of you may have faced similar issues in years past and we will look back on this time as a challenge we overcame together. We will always have viruses around, but our health care community is always developing new methods to prevent and cure illness. Keep contact with others and reach out when you need someone to listen. We have many trained individuals in our community that are ready to help us sort out our challenges and listen to our concerns.

**Council Meeting Minutes
October 15, 2020**

Call to Order: President Craig Tuecke called the meeting to order at 7:03 pm.

Devotions and Prayers: Pastor Ashman read the 33rd chapter of Exodus. This is the story of Moses on Mt. Sinai talking to God. He explained how the Jewish people only spoke of God one time a year during their celebration Yom Kippur. God's name was so sacred it was used only one time a year. Moses wanted to see the glory of God. He saw God's back as he passed by. We only catch a glimpse of God's glory and that is enough. God gives us all we need in this life.

Secretary's Report: The council reviewed the minutes of the last meeting. The minutes of the September 10, 2020 meeting stand approved as published.

The Treasurer's Report stands approved as published.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Ashman submitted a written report for the previous month to keep the Council updated on his activities. The report includes home visits, office visits, phone calls, calls to hospital patients, attending Clayton Ridge athletic events, working on website, preparing and presenting confirmation classes, meetings, baptisms, and funeral.

Outreach Ministries: Nancy Heitman had nothing new to report.

Educational Ministries: Stephanie Thomas had nothing new to report.

Children and Youth Ministries: Forest Brown reported that he had met with Pastor Mike and got a lot of great ideas that will be pursued when it is safe to meet. Forest

raised the question as to when we think it is going to be safe to meet. The discussion included responses such as after we have a vaccine, next year at the earliest, like school - do something with precautions in place, and look at possibilities after Sunday School has been going for a while. Forest shared that Pastor Mike is a great resource and has a great background of working with youth.

Public Relations Ministries: Chuck Hemann had nothing new to report.

Stewardship Ministries: Michele VonHandorf had nothing new to report.

Worship and Music Ministries: Pat Jones was absent.

Property Ministries: Don Schmelzer was absent. Craig shared that a list of things needed to be done at the parsonage has been made. Carpet in Pastor's bedroom needs to be replaced. There are electrical outlets and the vent/light in the bathroom that need to be replaced. The wall heater in the upstairs bathroom needs to be replaced; and the range hood for the stove needs to be replaced.

Parish Fellowship: Lorna Moser had nothing new to share.

Vice President: Mary Streich had nothing new to report.

Old Business:

Broadcasting Services: Chuck reported about his communication with the A & H Video technician. They walked through a possible configuration for a new broadcasting system. This was a preliminary configuration and it will be revised. This first configuration included a two camera system, keyboard joystick controller, a recording deck, a laptop, and cables. The estimate is \$9,500.00. We discussed revising to one camera, the manpower needed; acoustical tiles, the age of the speaker and if it will tie into the system, and having it permanently mounted in the balcony. It was suggested we use the Sophia Smith CD to help cover the costs.

Sunday School: Stephanie Thomas presented the Return to Sunday School Plan. The plan is to start Sunday School on November 1, 2020 from 9:30 am to 10:00 am. All teachers and students will wear a face covering. Parents will be asked to complete a health screening prior to bringing their children to church. Students will enter using the east entrance by the office. A hand sanitizer station will be set up at the bottom of the steps. Hand sanitizer and cleaner will be available in each



Sunday School room. There will be no singing or snacks due to health concerns and shortened time.

MSC to approve the Return to Sunday School Plan as presented by Stephanie Thomas.

Christmas Worship: Pastor Mike presented his plan to have two Christmas Eve services at St. John's. The first at 1:00 pm and the second at the normal 8:00 pm time. He is looking at soloists to provide music. Having the choir in the balcony was also discussed. With the popularity of these services, reservations will be taken.

Sunday Morning Services: There are many single worshipers attending church. We discussed revising the seating so two single worshipers could sit in the same pew - one near the center and one at the edge of the pew. We discussed using the front pews to increase the number of possible seats and taking reservations for Sunday services.

New Business:

Bible Study Group: A request was made by a Bible Study group of about ten ladies to use the church for their Tuesday Bible Study. Most are members of St. John's. They have been meeting in the park. With the change in weather, they need another place to meet. We discussed them meeting in the Fellowship Hall like Council and confirmation does. We also discussed LSI resuming the use of the Club Room to meet with parents, police officers, etc. They usually only meet one to two times a month. MSC to allow the Bible Study group and LSI to meet at the church and to consider other groups after the beginning of the year per safe protocols.

Benevolence Endowment: Those elected to the Endowment Committee at the Semi-Annual meeting will dispense the Endowment Fund in January after they are installed. The funds will be dispensed to ministries outside of the church.

Chalice/Paten: Pastor Mike explained how nasty the chalice is. The sheen is gone and is not appetizing to drink wine from. There is no matching paten. A plate is being used in place of a paten. The cost of a new set ranges from \$300.00 to \$500.00. Diane shared there is a member looking to donate to a special project. She will check with this person to see if this is a project the individual wants to donate to. MSC to purchase a chalice and paten for up to \$500.00 letting a willing

parishioner give as much as the individual wants and take the remainder out of memorial funds.

2020 Confirmands: Pastor Mike shared that Confirmation will be October 25th. He recommended the following be confirmed: Destiny Barnhart, Elizabeth Davis, Kayla Drewelow, Kelby Severson, and Addison Stoerp. MSC to accept the recommendation of 2020 confirmands.

Employee Insurance: Craig reported that Portico, the benefit program, has informed us that their base rate is going up 3.5%. This is the smallest increase in seven years. We will get the actual figures at the end of October.

Saturday Worship Service: Pastor Mike announced we will be starting Saturday night services on November 7, 2020 at 5:30 pm. Al will usher. Diane will do the music. Members will sit in a designated area to help with having to clean only a small area, and Pastor will go to where the people are at. Letters will be sent to Saturday night regular attendees.

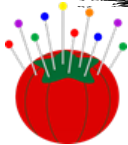
