

Fourth Sunday after the Epiphany

January 30-31, 2021



“I know who you are—the Holy One of God,” he said to Jesus (Mk 1:24). True, but spoken by a false prophet, a demon speaking through a poor, helpless victim. “Be silent, and come out of him!” (v 25) said the true Prophet, and indeed, the evil spirit came out, because this One always speaks with authority (Gospel). This Sunday’s epiphany is the revelation of Jesus as the one whose words carry the very power of God. That begins in our Old Testament Reading, when Moses promises this very Prophet. Deuteronomy is, of course, Moses’ final oration to Israel before his death—specifically to the “next generation” of Israelites, the children of those who came out of Egypt as adults. For forty years, Moses has been God’s prophet to the people, though, in fact, much of the speaking was actually done by his brother Aaron (Ex 4:10–16). Now it is time to pass the prophetic mantle to another. The promise of the Prophet like Moses comes in immediate contrast to the preceding words, the warning against false prophesying (18:9–14). Divination, fortune-telling, sorcery, necromancy, inquiring of the dead, and such are all efforts to learn what God has decided is not wholesome for us to know. These are among the very “abominations” for which God would destroy the Canaanites.

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INVOCATION

Take a moment when you first wake up to begin your day with the invocation and remember the grace of your baptism. End each day this week as soon as you go to bed in the same way.

CONFESSION

Psalm 32:1-2, 5-7, 10

Each day confess your "sin-fullness" before God and ask Him for His forgiveness and the Holy Spirit to use you and yours to His glory.

P: Blessed is the one whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered.

C: Blessed is the man against whom the LORD counts no iniquity, and in whose spirit there is no deceit.

P: As Moses speaks to the people through God, we confess those times we do not listen to Your words and close our hearts to You.

C: Forgive us, Lord.

P: As Paul warns, we confess those times when our freedom in Christ causes one who is weak in faith to stumble.

C: Forgive us, Lord.

P: As Jesus, the long-awaited Prophet and Savior, taught with and showed His authority and power, we confess those times when we allow the forces of evil to make us forget the deliverance and love of God we have in Christ.

C: Forgive us, Lord.

P: With David the psalmist, we humbly come before the Lord.

Silence for reflection

P: I acknowledged my sin to You, and I did not cover my iniquity;

C: I said, "I will confess my transgressions to the LORD," and You forgave the iniquity of my sin.

P: Therefore let everyone who is godly offer prayer to You at a time when You may be found; surely in the rush of great waters, they shall not reach him.

C: You are a hiding place for me; You preserve me from trouble; You surround me with shouts of deliverance.

ABSOLUTION

Think of ways you can each day this week creatively show forth (Epiphany) your sense of rejoicing that your "sin-fullness" has been cleansed.

P: Almighty God, our heavenly Father, has had mercy upon us and given His only Son to die for us and for His sake forgives us all our sins. As a servant of Christ and by His authority, I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the ✠ Son and of the Holy Spirit. To those who believe in His name He gives the power to become the children of God and has promised them His Holy Spirit. May the Lord, who has begun this good work in us, bring it to completion in the day of our Lord Jesus Christ.

C: Amen.

P: Many are the sorrows of the wicked,

C: but steadfast love surrounds the one who trusts in the LORD.

SALUTATION

As you meet people throughout the coming week, pause for a moment and consider the greeting and the motivation of your heart and feelings towards the person you greet. What message do you want to send to the community around you today with your greetings?

P: The Lord be with you.

PRAYER OF THE DAY

OLD TESTAMENT READING: *Deuteronomy 18:15-20*

God promised a line of prophets who will speak on His behalf to Israel just like Moses did. He warned of false prophets and assured that their destinies would lead to death.

¹⁵“The LORD your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among you, from your brothers—it is to him you shall listen— ¹⁶just as you desired of the LORD your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly, when you said, ‘Let me not hear again the voice of the LORD my God or see this great fire any more, lest I die.’ ¹⁷And the LORD said to me, ‘They are right in what they have spoken. ¹⁸I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their brothers. And I will put my words in his mouth, and he shall speak to them all that I command him. ¹⁹And whoever will not listen to my words that he shall speak in my name, I myself will require it of him. ²⁰But the prophet who presumes to speak a word in my name that I have not commanded him to speak, or who speaks in the name of other gods, that same prophet shall die.’”

Reader: This is the Word of the Lord.

People: Thanks be to God.

EPISTLE READING: *1 Corinthians 8:1-13*

Paul addressed a controversial topic of eating food sacrificed to idols in Corinth. His message is clear- we have freedom in Christ, but we must live out our freedom with discretion and care for the sake of the vulnerable.

¹Concerning food offered to idols: we know that “all of us possess knowledge.” This “knowledge” puffs up, but love builds up. ²If anyone imagines that he knows something, he does not yet know as he ought to know. ³But if anyone loves God, he is known by God. ⁴Therefore, as to the eating of food offered to idols, we know that “an idol has no real existence,” and that “there is no God but one.” ⁵For although there may be so-called gods in heaven or on earth—as indeed there are many “gods” and many “lords”— ⁶yet for us there is one God, the Father, from whom are all things and for whom we exist, and one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom are all things and through whom we exist. ⁷However, not all possess this knowledge. But some, through former association with idols, eat food as really offered to an idol, and their conscience, being weak, is defiled. ⁸Food will not commend us to God. We are no worse off if we do not eat, and no better off if we do. ⁹But take care that this right of yours does not somehow become a stumbling block to the weak. ¹⁰For if anyone sees you who have knowledge eating in an idol’s temple, will he not be encouraged, if his conscience is weak, to eat food offered to idols? ¹¹And so by your knowledge this weak person is destroyed, the brother for whom Christ died. ¹²Thus, sinning against your brothers and wounding their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ. ¹³Therefore, if food makes my brother stumble, I will never eat meat, lest I make my brother stumble.

Reader: This is the Word of the Lord.

People: Thanks be to God.

HOLY GOSPEL: *Mark 1:21-28*

To the human eye, Jesus didn’t possess any earthly authority- He was just a carpenter’s son from Nazareth. However, Jesus taught with authority, performed miracles, and rebuked and casted out impure spirits proving His identity and God-given authority as the Holy One of God.

Pastor: The Holy Gospel according to St. Mark, the first chapter.

People: **Glory to You, O Lord.**

²¹They went into Capernaum, and immediately on the Sabbath [Jesus] entered the synagogue and was teaching. ²²And they were astonished at his teaching, for he taught them as one who had authority, and not as the scribes. ²³And immediately there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit. And he cried out, ²⁴“What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are—the Holy One of God.” ²⁵But Jesus rebuked him, saying, “Be silent, and come out of him!” ²⁶And the unclean spirit, convulsing him and crying out with a loud voice, came out of him. ²⁷And they were all amazed, so that they questioned among themselves, saying, “What is this? A new teaching with authority! He commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him.” ²⁸And at once his fame spread everywhere throughout all the surrounding region of Galilee.

Pastor: This is the Gospel of the Lord.





NOTES AND NEWS

Church Sanctuary Worship Service Guidelines

Special guidelines will be followed to help assure the safety of everyone attending church, but we know the coronavirus is still active among us. We know that God desires us all to be together in worship again, but we are also sure He wants us to use good judgement in protecting our health.

- We encourage elderly, at-risk, and symptomatic people to continue worshipping from home (the “live streaming” service on Face Book continues).
“At risk” conditions include: 65 years or older, chronic lung disease, moderate/severe asthma, serious heart conditions, compromised immune systems, severe obesity, diabetes, chronic kidney disease undergoing dialysis and liver disease.
- **Wearing face masks inside the church/sanctuary is REQUIRED.** If you don’t have one, masks are available throughout the church, along with hand sanitizing stations. Pastor will wear a mask, except when preaching God’s Word.
- Services will be held at 6:00 pm on Saturdays, and 9:00 am & 11:00 am on Sundays. Doors will open 30 minutes prior to each service and secured during the services.
- To comply with 6’ social distancing guidelines, seating will be limited to every third pew (2 pews in between). Family groups and individuals will be separated by 6’ in each pew. Services will be limited to approximately 75 attendees. Overflow will be asked to listen to the service on FM 92.1 in their cars.
- Ushers and Elders will assist with entry and dismissal to maintain social distancing. Do not sit in the taped off pews and follow the Ushers/Elders directions. We will be seating front to back upon entry and dismissing from back to front.
- Ushers (wearing gloves & masks) will hand out bulletins with the service liturgy and hymns (please take these home; they can’t be reused). Hymnals, Bibles and attendance books have been removed from the pews.
- Offerings are collected at the sanctuary doorways while exiting the service. Exit the church promptly upon dismissal as the sanctuary, hallways, restrooms **MUST** be sanitized before the next service. Please socialize outside the church.

These guidelines are based on current Federal, State and County Health requirements and the recommendations of the LCMS to provide for your well-being. Although, we are taking steps to reduce the spread of Covid-19 or other infectious agents, the ultimate responsibility for preventative measures belongs to whomever comes to join us at St. Johns’. Thank you for your patience and understanding during these challenging time.

If you wish not to receive the Sacrament, you may exit out the front doors or wait in line and exit from the Marie Pfarr Room. Please follow social distancing and hand sanitizer is available. **If you choose to attend worship from the parking lot instead of the sanctuary,** as soon as the church has emptied, you will be invited to come in and receive communion at that time, or to avoid leaving your vehicle you can drive under the portico (Marie Pfarr Room side), stop and roll down your window to receive communion.


St. John's Lutheran School Celebrates 100 Days!


