Wednesday, December 5—Zechariah's Hope, Luke 1:5-25


Wednesday, December 12—The Mighty Son, Judges 13:2-7



### **Ponderings from the Pew**



Does it seem to you that people shop for a god similarly to how they shop for a new car? When looking for a vehicle, we make a list of must have accessories like heated seats, heated steering wheels, automatic doors, keyless entry, auto start. We make a list of color options, type of vehicle, maybe even specific brands, and cloth or





and wrong. Whatever works for you, works for him. Hell isn't necessary. My god wouldn't actually send someone to hell. Sin has no clear definition. Well, let's just say that sin doesn't exist. How can it be wrong if it makes me happy?

Humans try so hard to define God; to make Him fit in a form we can relate to and understand. No matter how many times God tells us that He is, in fact, a mystery. I Corinthians 13:12, "For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I have been fully known." We want God to be Who we want Him to be, act like we want Him to act, do what we want Him to do. When we have trouble, we wonder where is God? We seek a god that fits into a box we define, but there is only one true God. Isaiah 45:20-21, "Assemble yourselves and come; draw near together, you survivors of the nations! They have no knowledge who carry about their wooden idols and keep on praying to a god that cannot save....there is no other god besides Me, a righteous God and a Savior; there is none besides Me." There is none beside the one triune God.

God doesn't behave the way we want. He doesn't always do what we want or answer our prayers the way we want. God is God. He alone decides. We don't get to make demands of Him. We are not promised easy, worry free, trouble free lives. God's children are not guaranteed peace on earth. We are guaranteed eternal life. We are guaranteed that He will never leave us even when we suffer here in this world. We are guaranteed that this place is not our home; that we have a mansion prepared for us in perfect heaven with Him. The pain, loss, illnesses we suffer here are temporary – eternal life is forever. Yes, God is a mystery we cannot fully comprehend here. But the time will come when we will see Him face to face. We cannot shop for a god who caters to our every whim. The one true God chose us, and not because we were the best, or had the purest hearts, or handled well on the bumpy roads. He chose us because we were broken, ugly, chipped, faded, sinful.



"Who is like You, O Lord, among the gods? Who is like You, majestic in holiness, awesome in glorious deeds, doing wonders?" (Exodus 15:11). No one. "Do not turn to idols or make for yourselves any gods of cast metal: I am the Lord your God" (Leviticus 19:4). "Thus says the Lord, the King of Israel and his Redeemer, the Lord of hosts: "I am the first and I am the last; besides Me there is no god" (Isaiah 44:6). Don't waste time shopping for a god who cannot save. Be still and know the one true God is with you.






### Stewardship Corner—Make Known the Savior

What greater mystery is there than these words of the Apostle John: "And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen His glory, glory as of the Only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth" (John 1:14)? **Christian Education**: Minutes of October 2 meeting were approved.

#### Reports:

Release Time: Laurie Kimball's report was the page from the newsletter: it listed the teachers and classes and thanked the substitutes we have used so far (Pastor Bill Knaack and Connie Fondow); Vickie Helm, who is leading a group of ladies who watch George Newton while Sarah Newton teaches; and Mike Riewer who sets up tables in the choir room and youth room which are used as classrooms. She asked for volunteers and prayers for the program.

Sunday School: Brandi Backmann reported that attendance has been averaging 35 students this year. We still need adult volunteers in the 1st – 3rd grade classroom. Christmas program practice will begin November 14 for grades 1-6. Students will ride the church bus from school to practice. During November and December we will collect coins for offerings to help victims of Hurricane Harvey. VBS: No report this month.

Preschool: Kim Neubauer reported that enrollment is currently 41 students; we gained one student and lost one. The licensing inspector was here on October 25; an exit interview will be done later. Inspections will be done annually from now on. Parent – teacher conferences will be this month. Information will be sent out about in mid-December to invite families to special services at church to celebrate Christmas.

Old Business: Lori Griess gave an update on the progress of the stage project. We discussed whether or not this is something we will be able to accomplish and if we want to do it.

New Business: We were reminded to think about the VBS survey that we will put together in December to send out in January. Church Properties: Went over progress and possibilities of new exterior sign and kitchen remodeling. Looked at electrical projects. Discussed back door remodel. Mike Riewer has been working on other small repair jobs around the church.

Elders: no report.

**Evangelism**: The confirmation/mentor pizza party was well attended. We will repeat this event in April of '19.

It was suggested that we make a second attempt to acquire the names and addresses of students from St. Johns attending institutions of higher learning who are living away from home.

Sending cards and occasional "care packages" to these young people remains our goal.

Doug Kingsley will take care of setting up a tree with cards attached for parishioners to take and subsequently purchase appropriate gifts for the upcoming Toys for Girls and Boys and Tiny Tots program.

The board will sponsor the "Every One His Witness" Bible study to be held during the month of February. A pastor from the district will facilitate the four-week program.

Kathy Henry will continue to provide the group with information concerning the local Women's Intervention Center. This facility will soon merge with the Walker Family Safety Network.

Kathy Henry will coordinate a group of confirmands and other adult members to assist at Ruby's Pantry on the third Saturday of March. No names were submitted for cards to be sent to inactive members.



### Parish Fellowship: Old Business:

New Member Welcome is Sunday, November 18. The reception will be during coffee hour. We'll ask the Evening Guild ladies who are scheduled to bring that day to each bring two dozen muffins and our board will also bring them. Elayne Luiken will also buy fruit and juice. 

Board members continue to send cards of concern or caring to St. Johns parishioners from a list generated and given to us by the pastors.

The board will facilitate St. Johns involvement in the community children's Christmas gifting program. The Kingsleys will be dispersing the appropriate information.

<u>Board of Christian Education – Ruth Knaack</u> (Ginny Ranisate read her report due to absence)

#### **Sunday School:**

Teachers are: **PreK-K:** Sandy Phillips; **Grades 1-3**: Tori Harju; **Grades 4-6**: Shelley Lof; **Grade 7**: Jerry Werder; **Youth Bible Study:** Pastor Newton. First day of Sunday School was Rally Day. Activities were led by Pastor Newton with help from Shelley Lof and Ruth Knaack. Sheets asking for volunteer help are posted outside each classroom. The mission offering this year will go to Hurricane Harvey Relief. The Christmas program this year will be "King Jesus" and will be presented on December 16 during late church. Rehearsals will begin the week before Thanksgiving. So far the response to our new curriculum has been positive from students and teachers. We still need classroom helpers, especially in the I<sup>st</sup> – 3<sup>rd</sup> grade classroom. Average attendance for the first three weeks was 36 students.

**Preschool**—Current enrollment is 41; 10 in the 3-4 year old class and 31 in other classes during the week. Open House was poorly attended. Here is information about the families who are attending: 21 families have a church home; 8 families listed no church; 9 families are members of St. Johns. One family is a member of another LCMS congregation. Twelve families are receiving financial assistance. A state inspection will be done during the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter of this year. Paperwork was due October 5. The Preschool Committee met on September 18 to discuss enrollment and budget. They recommended that the budgeted amount remain at \$16,500 and that the treasurer take \$500 from the preschool savings account and the rest from the budget to pay expenses again this year. This was approved by the board.

Pastors' Report - These adult Bible Study opportunities are offered each week:

Sunday morning class – led by Pastor Neubauer with approximately 30 in attendance Sunday morning class – taught by Sarah Newton studying The Lord's Prayer Tuesday morning – Pastor Neubauer leads a class on Ephesians with 8-16 in attendance Wednesday morning – Pastor Neumann leads a class studying Proverbs Confirmation class meets together this year and is using the 7<sup>th</sup> grade material

Hurricane Maria devastated the island of Puerto Rico in September of 2017. For many months, the island has worked at restoring basic services such as water and electricity. LCMS mission sites are now ready to receive mission teams to help with various projects. The Minnesota North District of The Lutheran Church Missouri Synod has agreed to send two mission teams of 6 to 12 people to Puerto Rico during 2019.

The possible dates (set by local people in Puerto Rico) are May 18-25, July 20-27, September 14-21, November 9-16. Individual costs would be air transportation of probably \$500/person round trip, a portion of the ground transportation cost of \$150/week per team, and room and board of \$55/day.
