Pastor Newton is Taking the Plunge



When we were interviewing candidates at the seminary, one of the questions was, "are you willing to do the polar plunge?" Pastor Newton's response wasn't "No," so in keeping with the tradition started by Pastor Heinecke, Pastor Newton and some of the youth will be jumping into the frozen East Battle Lake as part of the polar plunge at Lutheran Island Camp on March 2 at 2:00 p.m. They are collecting pledges to help send five youth to the National Youth Gathering in Minneapolis in July.

We're planning to video the event and show it between services on Sunday, March 10 in the social hall. The Board of Parish Fellowship will serve some frosty root beer floats to go with the video.

Lutheran Island Camp Jamboree

On March 10 between services in the social hall. Louis Blocker will be visiting our congregation to share information, answer questions, and register our children for summer camp. Our congregation has scholarships available and the camp also provides some camperships so every child can go to camp at least once this summer. The camp theme in 2019 is "Forgiven" and is based on Jesus' words in Luke: "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do" (Luke 23:34a).

Our goal is to have many of our children ready to sign up for camp on March 10. When we do that, we will be able to help each other with rides, encourage children to go to the same camps, and help the camp plan for the summer. Ponderings from the Pew



We took a ten day bus trip to New Orleans recently. A few days on the road, I noticed that Arch and I were holding hands a lot of the time on the bus. Quarters are tight, and you are naturally into each other's space.

As the trip went on, I started to realize how connected that simple gesture made me feel. We didn't need to say anything but felt close together, comfort, love, a bond.



I started to ponder the power of the human hand. We can do all kinds of physical things with two hands; feed ourselves, comb our hair, build houses, fix things, plant seeds, milk cows, wash dishes, write books, and countless other things. But think about the emotions our hands can convey - applause for approval and praise, anger with a fist, love with a tender touch, comfort, encouragement, etc.



Jesus used His hands to heal the blind, raise the dead, cast out the moneymakers from the temple, to pray, to bring Peter out of the water, to break bread, and to calm the storm. Matthew 8:3 says, "And Jesus stretched out His hand and touched him, saying, 'I will; be clean.' And immediately his leprosy was cleansed." Matthew 8:15 tells us, "He touched her hand, and the fever left her, and she rose and began to serve Him." And again in Matthew 14:31 we read, "Jesus immediately reached out His hand and took hold of him (Peter), saying, 'O you of little faith, why did you doubt?""



Jesus established the Lord's Supper with His hands simply in breaking the bread, passing the wine, and speaking the words of institution we still use today. His hands washed the feet of His disciples, helped bring His words to life, and folded in prayer to our Father in heaven. His hands worked good for those He loved.

With our hands we show concern for one another, encourage each other, and impart unspoken sentiments. Set the world aside and hold hands a bit. Think about the hands of our Savior nailed to a cross in unimaginable agony taken on Himself for us. Think of His hands holding you close and rest there a while.

Stewardship Corner—Building Relationships

Relationships need to be built; they don't just happen. Even in families where blood relationships exist, emotional relationships must be built. How do we go about doing that? What are the criteria? Let's look to the master of relationships: our Lord Jesus.



Jesus, the incarnate Christ, lived in a relationship with His earthly family. In the Gospel of Luke, we are told that, when His parents became separated from their son on the return from Jerusalem where they had attended the Feast of the Passover, they were distraught. When they were reunited, Mary asked, "Son, why have You treated us so?" He gave His well-known reply: "Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" Then, we're told, "He went down with them and came to Nazareth and was submissive to them...And Jesus increased in wisdom and in stature and in favor with God and man" (Luke 2:48-52). The Son of God, the Savior of the World, lived in obedient relationship with the earthly parents His Heavenly Father gave Him.

It is in the early days of His ministry that Jesus starts gathering to Himself His disciples, the Twelve who would sleep at His side, share their food with Him, endure the variances in the weather (as they were often outdoors), hear and try to understand His words, and seek to emulate Him, their Rabbi and Master. From Jesus we learn about being stewards of relationships. The criteria include quality time together, the opening of hearts to one another, trust and forgiveness, and interdependence.



Just as He called His disciples into relationship with Himself, so He initiates that closeness with us. He calls us with His Gospel words, "Come to me...and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28). He invites us, "Follow Me, and I will make you fishers of men" (Matthew 4:19). He abides with us (John 15:4); He shares His Heavenly food with us (Matthew 26:26-28); He speaks to us by His Word, Jesus Himself, and through His called servants (Hebrews 1:1-2); He presents us to His Father as holy in His sight (Colossians 1:22).

Secure, then, in our relationship with Jesus, we come to understand both our identity and purpose as His stewards. Equipped by His Word and empowered by His transforming love, our stewardship is no longer limited to specific acts occurring here and there but encompasses our entire lives. With a growing awareness of Christ's redeeming love, we are motivated to express our faith by the way we live our lives.


