## Stewardship Corner—Finding Contentment in Jesus

In the Apostle Paul's letter to the people in Philippi, he wrote, "I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances. I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty" (Philippians 4:II-I2 NIV). We are told by Paul that contentment is a state of mind that is not dependent upon external circumstances. True contentment comes from knowing that God is in control and that He will provide for us.

As God's people, we need to be aware that the society in which we live is trying hard to make us discontent. Advertisements suggest that we can't be content without expensive houses, new cars, exotic vacations, big investments, and the latest in clothes. Our culture tries to make us believe that happiness and contentment are within our reach if we acquire just a few more things.

Our contentment should not be based on the size of our incomes or on our net worth. It has nothing to do with the size of our houses or year of our cars. Contentment can't be bought at a department store or travel agency. Real contentment is not related to outward circumstances.

For many, acquiring money can become a preoccupation and an obsession. We can become slaves to wealth. Greed will not allow contentment, because it will always urge us to acquire more. No matter how we try, we cannot be satisfied by worldly things. The love of money can potentially possess a person's life like no other emotion can. Jesus spoke about the futility of greed in Matthew 16:26 when He asked, "For what will it profit a man if he gains the whole world, and forfeits his soul?" The things we possess will contribute only to fleeting happiness, not an enduring peace and contentment.

When we place our security in money, pride, self-centeredness, and self-sufficiency take over as we make ourselves god, trusting in ourselves rather than God to provide. We become like the Rich Fool, who gave himself credit for his success and desired even more (Luke 16:13-2I). We can push God out of our lives.

Contentment comes from dependence on the Lord. When God is our security, we can be content. The Apostle Paul knew both the secret of contentment and how to receive it. Paul told the Philippians and us, "I can do all things through Him Who strengthens me" (Philippians 4:I3). Without Christ, we will never achieve contentment. A relationship with Christ will redirect our focus from transient earthly pleasures to things of eternal significance. Keeping our eyes on "the prize" (Philippians 3:14) will bring about gratitude in our hearts for what we have rather than desiring what we don't have.

## Remember Healthy Balance?

Back in 2015 St. Johns was dealing with some financial issues. Years of deficit spending had caused us to borrow from dedicated funds and our checkbook balance was low enough that we weren't meeting all our monthly expenses. From this problem, the Healthy Balance initiative was born. The plan was to raise enough funds to replace the money borrowed from dedicated accounts and to have the equivalent of two months of expenses in savings. In the past three years everyone has done a great job in bringing us closer to this goal. All dedicated funds have been repaid and are in a separate savings account to avoid having the same problem in the future. We are over half way to meeting our goal of $\$ 74,000$ (approximately two months of expenses). We still need $\$ 34,24$ I to make it to $\$ 74,000$.

## Considering Kitchen Remodeling

You may have read in the bulletin and past newsletters that there's a committee working on getting plans together to remodel the kitchen. You may also be thinking 'the kitchen's fine, why do we need to remodeling a room that only gets used on Sundays for coffee and occasional meals?" Good questions and here's some reasons why we're looking at remodeling.

First, here's what happened in the kitchen the week of March 18-24:

- Monday-prepping and serving snacks for the blood drive, prep and serve snack for $A B C$ students
- Tuesday-prepping and serving snacks for the blood drive, coffee made for Bible study, ABC snacks
- Wednesday-coffee for Bible study, lunch served after noon service, snacks for $A B C$, confirmation and choir kids, meal served before the 6:00 p.m. Lenten service
- Thursday-ABC snacks
- Friday-ABC snacks
- Saturday-nothing going on...the kitchen gets a rest
- Sunday-treats and coffee between services, root beer floats served for Polar Plunge

The kitchen isn't always this busy but it does get a lot of use, more than just coffee on Sunday mornings.
Second, the kitchen's last major remodeling was in 1993. At that time it was expanded into a former closet space so we got more cupboards as well as a dishwasher and garbage disposal. That's over 25 years of Sunday coffee, soup and sandwiches, funeral lunches and other celebrations and the kitchen is showing some wear. The ceiling has water damage from roof leaks. The floor tile has cracked in spots. The laminate is starting to peel and chip on the counter tops. And there's always dents and dings that happen.

The kitchen committee has met with several contractors to get ideas on the what we can do to improve the kitchen. They're planning on presenting their final plan at the voters meeting in June. In the meantime, stop in and take a look at the kitchen's current condition, then watch for posters, pictures and news on what they're considering.
