Ponderings from the Pew




Focus on Me (God). This seems to be the theme in the "Jesus Calling" book by Sarah Young I haphazardly read. I'd love to say I read every day's devotion faithfully on the day it's designed to be read. You shouldn't believe it if I try to convince you. No, I'm a hit or miss person, but the book sits on my desk, and I do try to pick it up kinda sorta regularly. It's a good thing for me that God's faithfulness is not as unreliable as mine. I do know one thing without question – God is faithful. God does not waver; He does not change. God's faithfulness is not influenced by my feeble pleas, half hearted requests, or unpredictable devotions. No matter what – God is with me. And He is with you.

So how do we focus on God during everyday life? We know that Colossians 3:2 says, "Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth." Ok. But I have a job that requires focus, too. Matthew 6:33 tells us, "But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things will be added to you." So... maybe if I read my devotional as soon as I open my eyes in the morning, the rest of my day can be about work, supper plans, feeding the cats, etc. Matthew goes on to say, "Therefore, do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble." Oh, well, now it's making more sense. So, it's not about a time of day to focus on God, and then go on to fuss and fret the rest of the time. It's about recognizing God's constant presence; of seeking God with trust that He will guide our path. It's about living as a child of God with eyes that see the good and the bad through faith. Our hope is in God no matter what. Every breath is a breath as His child. We won't be protected from all evil, but the evil we know is experienced as God's own child. Its impact softened because He is our Father. Evil's temporary triumphs are tempered by the knowledge that "neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present nor things to come, nor power, nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord," (Romans 8:38).

"What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us?" (Romans 8:31). Indeed. Even when "we do not know what to pray for as we ought, ...the Spirit Himself intercedes for us with

groanings too deep for words," (Romans 8:26). God has given us His Spirit. He suffers with us in this life so that we will be glorified with Him in eternity. Evil can't win. Satan doesn't get to win no matter what he throws at us here. We get to look through loss and suffering to the glory that awaits us in heaven. We get to look, "to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, Who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God," (Hebrews 12:2). "Consider HIM Who endured from sinners such hostility against Himself, so that you may not grow weary or fainthearted," (Hebrews 12:3). Jesus knew the pain and agony, the separation from His Father that was ahead of Him. He carried the cross anyway because of the JOY He also knew was His. Consider Him. Focus on Him.



Stewardship Corner—Giving is an Obligation



Does the title of this article cause you to pause? Isn't giving supposed to be the free and joyous response of God's people who express their gratitude and praise of God through their giving? Certainly, our primary reason for giving is a response to the Good News of the Gospel. Knowing what God has done for us in Jesus prompts us to give and keep on giving. God never stops giving to us, and we imitate His nature through our giving.

God's people in the Old Testament were under an obligation to give. God commanded them to give a tenth (tithe) of their incomes for the support of God's work. In fact, there was a second and third tithe so the people were commanded to give much more than one-tenth of their incomes. However, as New Testament Christians who live under God's grace in Jesus, we are no longer obligated to tithe. As new covenant Christians, the motive for giving has changed from a command to give to giving cheerfully.


Are the Old Testament laws no longer relevant? Jesus said, "Do not think that I have come to abolish the Law or the Prophets; I have not come to abolish them but to fulfill them" (Matthew 5:17). Jesus came to keep all of God's commandments perfectly. He paid the price for our forgiveness by taking the curse of the Law upon Himself, freeing us from the demands of the Law. In Jesus, we are free to serve God with pure hearts. Although we are free from the law, we know that God wants the best for us and His laws give us order and purpose.

As New Testament Christians, we live in God's grace. Secure in Christ's presence and love, we express our thanksgiving for Who God is and what He has done for us through our giving. We also know that giving is God's will. Therefore, we have an obligation to give. The Apostle Paul wrote, "So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, and especially to those who are of the household of faith" (Galatians 6:10). We willingly and freely embrace the Law to give knowing it is God's will for us that we serve Him by serving others and extend His kingdom through our generosity. We can conclude by saying that giving is a wonderful opportunity and also an obligation.

Here's a Few Offering Pointers

St. Johns is a generous congregation and the bulk of our contributions come through the offerings given at worship services. Here are a few tips to remember when you're preparing your offering that will make things easier for you and for our offering counters:

- Please use your offering envelopes if you have them. It makes it much easier for the offering counters if they don't have to check to see if you have an envelope number. If you haven't picked up your envelopes, stop by the church office and we'll get them for you.
- 2. For special offerings, please make out your check to St. Johns. We can't deposit checks made out to other organizations (like the Food Shelf, Pregnancy Resource Center, etc.). These checks will be sent directly to the organization.
- 3. You don't have to put a separate check or cash in each weekly offering envelope if you are giving monthly or twice a month. You can write one check and use one envelope for the month.
- 4. If you really want to be nice to the counters, don't fold your cash or check. Just slip it right into the envelope.
- 5. Consider automatic offerings. You can set up an automatic withdrawal from your account to St. Johns. You decide the amount and frequency. It's easy to set up and there's no extra charge to you. Stop by and see Ginny Ranisate if you're interested. You can also give online at our website www.stjohnspr.org or with your phone. Check out the article on Page 5 for details.
- 6. If you're good with numbers, detail oriented and available one Sunday a month, consider becoming an offering counter. We usually have teams of two counters and it takes about an hour to count.

 Once again, stop by and see Ginny or give her a call at 732-9783 if you're interested.





Christian Education: Approved December minutes.

Reports:

Release Time: Report read and approved from Laurie Kimball.

VBS: Melissa Koch gave an update from Sarah Kaufenberg. Suggested that VBS dates of either August 2-6 or 9-13 from Sunday to Thursday. Suggested times are evenings and after discussion a time of 5:30 - 6:00 with a light supper provided. Theme this year is Rain Forest Explorers.

Adult Education: The new book club will probably start in February. There is no Adult Instruction Class scheduled for this spring, the plan by Pastor Neubauer is to have a class next September.

Pastors Report: Pastor Knaack has been designated as the visitation pastor for the congregation.

Preschool: Currently we have 37 children enrolled with 2 more being added in the middle of January. Enrollment stands at 10 in the 3 year old class and 29 in the 4 year olds. Kim Neubauer is excited to share that they have started the New Year with perfect attendance with no issues with the flu.

Sunday School: Discussion centered around the small numbers of children attending Sunday School and issues with the new material selected for this year. Lori Griess will call Concordia and ask that samples of material be sent for grades PK-6. Christmas Program dates for December 2020 were narrowed down to two different possibilities of either 10:30 a.m. service on December 13 or the afternoon on December 20. Discussed the need for a change for Connie Fondow and Shelley Lof's classes due to the noise between the two rooms they currently have. Sarah Newton will be

leading a Bible study for the teachers on the fourth Thursday of the month at their home. Sunday School offering continues to be sent to Lutheran Island Camp.

Old Business: None

New Business: Continuing discussion of the lack of numbers in Sunday School and what can be done to increase participation. Talked about sending a letter to members and asking for their input to help with determining what we can do to encourage the children and parents to become involved.

Church Properties: Looked into roof leak in kitchen when it got warm. The pole light in front has been replaced. Carpet tiles have been installed in the rear entry.

Elders: Rev. Bill Knaack was accepted by the Elders as Pastoral Assistant with Visitation, Teaching, Preaching and Counseling duties. To assist the Pastors in caring for the spiritual wellbeing of the members of the parish. Worked on assigning assisting elders.

Evangelism: Doug Kingsley reported (via phone conversation) that some of the Christmas gift requests were not returned. He and Julie took care of supplying the needed items and submitted an invoice to Ginny Ranisate for about \$90.00. It is understandable that some people may have forgotten or missed the return date for a variety of reasons. Next year he will record the names of those parishioners taking ornaments off the tree to assist with contacting people who may have inadvertently forgotten.

Deb Luther is taking care of the Diamond Willow monthly BINGO facilitation. It appears that the residents prefer the fourth Tuesday of the month for this well received activity.



It was decided that the board will request that Ginny order Recovery Bibles for the county jail each June.

We will consider sending Chaplain Bain boxes of supplies for the troops again around Easter. Connie Fondow will check with Synod to see if there is a specific Easter devotional booklet recommended for the troops.

The board will make a decision by the February meeting whether or not to proceed with a March trivia event.

Members discussed, at length, the desire for community and St. Johns congregational outreach activities.

Parish Fellowship Public Relations, Stewardship and Young People: did not meet.


