# Preparing to Hear 1 Timothy

Saint Paul wrote this letter to Timothy at least 8 years after Paul served in Ephesus (around 65 AD).

- Timothy had been like a vicar, helping with pastoral work under Paul's supervision, but after pastoring a couple other churches, Timothy was sent to serve at the church in Ephesus.
- Paul writes this letter to young Pastor Timothy after realizing that he might not be able to visit Ephesus again and encourage him in person. This letter sums up what Paul had taught him, and reminds Timothy of the authority he has from Christ.

### Things to Listen for in I Timothy

- A common problem at Ephesus (where Timothy was serving) was the influence
  of Gnosticism: a false teaching in which all material things are considered
  worthless and entangling, and which sees salvation as being the escape of
  material things by learning secret knowledge for those who prove worthy.
- Timothy has apparently lacked confidence in his own authority as pastor and teacher of the church in Ephesus. Paul encourages Timothy by reminding him of his ordination ("laying on of hands") and that his authority to preach the gospel comes not from his own worthiness, but from God.
- Paul addresses several different roles in the church, to be filled by different kinds of people. He lists qualifications for who should be allowed to work in one position or another, and he lists restrictions on who is allowed to serve where.
- In our time, we're accustomed to thinking a bit differently about roles. Often, for example, men and women are considered relatively interchangeable. But Paul writes of God's calling different people to do different things. He takes his cue from the order of Creation and the structure God put in place, rather than from the culture around him.
- As a Christian, Paul notes, your goal is not to argue that you fit in every role, neither in the church nor in the rest of the world. Instead, Paul says, find roles that God has called you to fulfill, and look for ways to serve there, according to his instruction.
