Ponderings from the Pew



I had a bug to re-paint our master bathroom. Of all the rooms in the house, I believe bathrooms are the most difficult to paint. Yes, they are smaller than other rooms generally, but they have so much extra stuff to move, and paint around, and tight spaces to get into, and itty-bitty spaces between door trim and counters, cabinets and shower stalls to be neatly painted. So, for whatever reason, I thought it would be fun to spend all day enclosed in this small space with my husband. He still lives and that's all I have to say about that. I still live as well even though I stepped just a teensy bit on the toilet

tank to reach a high corner and wouldn't you know, the toilet started leaking! "Oh honey, where's that water coming from?" (insert eye roll).

So, what you need to know about this project is that the first time I painted this room, was when we had just built the house. I didn't want to move out here, and I didn't really care about careful painting. I put almost all auction and oopsie paint on the walls and I wasn't all that



worried about dusting new sheetrock or sanding mud bumps in the bathroom. Now I just say the house has character. Arch figured we should smooth some of these "character" marks out before we painted again. I did some sanding, but it seemed to me I probably wouldn't see the same marks with fresh paint on the walls. Ha! They don't just magically disappear with new paint. They aren't as visible probably owing more to the color than the fact it's a new coat, but they are still there.

When God looks at us, He does not see our imperfections. We are covered in white robes of righteousness through Jesus' death and resurrection. Does it strike you as odd that our robes are white even though they are washed in blood? Blood is red and stains. Yet we are made white as snow. Isaiah I:18, "Come now, 'Let us reason together,' says the Lord; though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow, though they are red like crimson, they shall become like wool." We are not clumsily covered. We are pure in God's sight through our Savior, Jesus. As Hebrews 10:9-10, 14 says, "...Behold, I have come to do Your will...and by that will we have been sanctified through the offering of Jesus Christ once for all.... For by a single offering He has perfected for all time those who are being sanctified." We don't ever need to be re-painted or re-cleansed. Jesus died once for all.

What an amazing gift we have received by grace from God. What a mind-blowing act of purely unconditional love. "See what kind of love the Father has given to us, that we should be called children of God; and so we are," (1 John 3:1).


