Need Help with Your Health Care Directive?

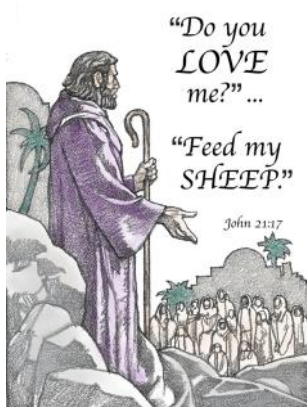

BOARD REPORTS

ELDERS – Jerry Grudem – Elders continue to assist pastors.

EVANGELISM – Connie Fondow

Trivia night was successful. Their next project will be “Bless A Mom.” We will know in April if we will receive a grant. This will affect how many bags are done for the project. Planning for Breakfast in Bethlehem event in December.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION – Lori Griess

Preschool – 2021-2022 enrollment - *35 (30 last year) 24 - 4 year olds, 11 - 3 year olds

No openings available in the 4 year old group. One (possible) opening for 3 year old group. My hesitancy has to do with being able to serve 12 (3 year olds) as this group can be quite active and overwhelming.

*We have had a waiting list for most of the year. Currently there are 2 already enrolled students (4 yr old) that would like to add days (from 2 to 3 or more) and 4 on a list for the 3 year old group.

* One family removed their child in early October when COVID numbers were high. They paid the entire year so a spot was held for them. Last week the student returned.

Current staffing: 1 director/teacher (for both 3 and 4 year olds), 1 teachers aide

Overall the health of the staff and children have been good. There have been more COVID exposures this year - especially in the fall where students were absent for longer periods (themselves quarantine or family member). Our policy states that children are out for 10 days with a positive test or if a family member tests positive. We have had a lot of absences this winter with families traveling.

Yearly state inspection has resumed in person. We had our inspection in October. Overall went ok. We did have 3 citations - mostly wording on paperwork. It was fixed and everything is well again (until next year).

Some of the COVID protocols are still being used and we plan to continue using as a general practice - more handwashing - especially right away when they arrive, hand sanitizer after snack before using common toys which cannot be easily washed (puzzles and books), more sanitizer available after sneezing and using disinfecting wipes more on common surfaces such as chairs and tables.

We have taken 5 “snow” sessions. So far, no plans on making those up.

Challenges of the year:

* Teacher challenge - trying to juggle doing all the classes remains a huge challenge!! I feel like I am doing the work of 3 people to keep up with maintaining two separate classrooms, writing and teaching lessons for 2 age groups, keeping up with the ever changing state rules and making sure everyone is up to date if there has been an exposure. A lot of extra hours have been spent on this.

*Finding time to do the continuing education requirements has been difficult. Some in person classes are beginning to appear but it is slow to resume.



* No fields trip this year (as of now) has meant readjusting learning opportunities.

Highlights:

** Mary Harvala is such a blessing to work with. She has adapted to the preschool world well and is always looking for ways to help out.

** Having a basically full school has been wonderful!!

Financial

We have approx. \$8,800 in the scholarship fund. (4 families on assistance)

Approx. \$6,200 in savings (we keep this amount set aside for misc. expenses)

Approx. \$2,200 in checking

In January, Kim's teacher salary was raised approx. 3% and Mary was raised 4.5%. This was approved by the Board of Education.

Tuition proposal for 2022-2023 was approved by the board.

Current (2021-2022):

\$40 registration fee - non members for 2/3 day week group \$60 - non members for 4/5 day week group, \$0 for members

2 day/week : \$90 (85)

3 day/week: \$120 (115)

4 day/week: \$155 (140)

5 day/week: \$175 (160)

We raised tuition in 2021 for the current school year. The question of raising tuition is difficult for me.

Our only competition is free preschool or head start which is also basically free. I also know that we need to at times raise the tuition to cover expenses. As we all know the economy is tight now and it looks to be getting tighter as the uncertainty of everything unfolds. This past year the Park Rapids schools passed a large funding bond to make some major changes to the school buildings and class structure. I believe this fall the early childhood classrooms will be moved into the Century building. Potentially, this could be a huge impact on enrollment. Right now there seems to be a lot of funding available in the public early childhood world which includes free bussing and meals.

We have a possibility of 13 returning students. Hopefully the ones on a waiting list will have an opportunity to be with ABC this upcoming year. There are 12 on the church rolls. One family has registered for next fall already (she is from this year's waiting list).

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Classes offered: 3's - M/W am (2 day/week), 4's - M/W pm, T/Th am and F am (2,3,4 or 5 day/week), (adjusted as needed)

Staff: 1 teacher/director, 1 teacher's helper and 1 volunteer bookkeeper

Upcoming:

*Parent-teacher conferences: early April

* Easter break - April 14-18

* Last day - May 27

Year end programs?? Last year we went ahead with the programs. We did not do the traditional ice cream social but instead served wrapped treats - freeze pops and cookies. We did not encourage families to stay to socialize but had space available for those who wished to sit and eat. I think we will go ahead with them again this year. I'll plan on getting a Thrivent Action card to help cover expenses. Any thoughts on what we should do for treats?

Sunday School – Averaging between 25 – 34 children per week. Despite sending postcards, and reminders in the bulletin and newsletter last fall we have not been able to return the numbers attending to pre cov-id. Children are doing a fund raiser during the month of February and March. Children will sing Palm Sunday. Discussed next year's Christmas Program practice and the teachers feel that it would be beneficial if there was practice during the entire Sunday School hour to give the children more time to learn parts and songs. Discussion on having a meet and greet on August 21 for Sunday School. It went over well last year and would like to encourage other members of the congregation to assist if possible. Ideas presented are: return of the dunk tank, cotton candy, bowling pins, fish tanks, popcorn, ice cream, balloons, bounce house, and plinko. Sunday School is scheduled to start on September 11. Would like to send out handwritten notes to students in early August after VBS to invite them to Sunday School. We are still exploring options for different Sunday School material. Also discussed presenting attendance awards during church instead of just handing them out during the Sunday School opening.

VBS -Recommended date for VBS is August 7-11. Once again in the evening to encourage participation by the parents and members of the congregation.

Release Time - Report from Laurie Kimball:

Release time is going well. Had some trouble with needing substitute teachers in February and we had to temporarily move our existing teachers around to cover all the classrooms. Talked recently to a member who may be interested in joining our teaching staff next year.

Working on making Easter goodie baskets for the students in April. A member donated money to purchase Easter candy for the baskets. 1st grade lamb boxes, 2nd grade chick boxes, 3rd grade Easter egg and chick boxes, 4th grade butterfly boxes. Each box has an attached paper describing what the Easter symbol represents in the Christian faith.

We had two students leave the program last month by request of their parents. Always sad to see any student leave us.

April 27 will be the last day for release time this year. We are planning some fun activities for the last day, ice cream sundaes, bible trivia, younger children will decorate a tote bag to take their materials home in.

**YOUNG PEOPLE – Brandi Backmann**

In addition to Pastor Newton's report they have been doing Lenten meals and will prepare Easter breakfast. Senior recognition will be May 22 between services.

CHURCH PROPERTIES – Randy Griess

There have been some roof leaks in various spots. Haataja Construction came out and looked at the roof for the front entry. Rod will contact them to see what they found out. The old bus was sold for \$1,000. Funds will be set aside for future maintenance. Samuelson Laney did some work on the boilers. The board approved a service contract with Samuelson Laney for yearly maintenance on the air conditioners and boilers. A new vacuum cleaner has been ordered. Discussed the noisy convection oven. Brandi had recorded a video of the problem. Ginny will contact the repair company about fixing it.

STEWARDSHIP – Pam Heeren was absent. Daniel Neubauer is attending Concordia University, Chicago with the intention to become a Lutheran School teacher. The board voted to provide a scholarship this year for \$1,000 from the endowment fund interest for him. Additional scholarship funds will be discussed as he continues his education.

PARISH FELLOWSHIP – Elayne Luiken

Held the new member welcome on Sunday, November 21 between services.
Put up Christmas decorations on Monday, November 29.
Sponsored the Cookies and Carols on Sunday, December 19 between services.
Took down Christmas decorations on Monday, January 3.
Made chili for the youth lock in January 14.
Prepared and served a meal for Trivia Night on Sunday, March 20.
Will prepare meal for confirmand exam on April 27.

PUBLIC RELATIONS – We plan to advertise Easter services in the Enterprise.

OLD/NEW BUSINESS:

School – Discussed the possibility of starting a school. Pastor Newton has met with Pastor Meyer from the district about it. There is a comprehensive program available through the Synod for churches considering a school. Cost is \$10,000. There is money available from the District to help with this. Ginny said we could use funds from the Endowment Fund. Rod also received information from Andrew Fondow about a "micro school" model. Discussion on the pros and cons of starting a school. This progressed to a focus on "year of the child" and what the general direction of St. Johns should be. Decided to investigate options further and work on setting up a committee. Pastor Newton will contact Pastor Meyer about preaching and presenting information on Rally Sunday, September 11.

A free workshop will be held in St. Louis to train people to help with gifts/estate planning through the LCMS Foundation. Pastor Neubauer will contact a couple of members to see if they are interested.

Closed with prayer by Pastor Newton. Motion to adjourn by Elayne, second Brandi. Motion carried.
