A Note from Pastor Lutz about Bishop Abia's Visit to Minnesota

As the huge silver jet climbed into the blue horizon and became a dark spot in the sky, our hearts were filled with a feeling of gratitude to God for the warm reception that was given to Bishop Peter on his recent visit to Minnesota. The clergy, laity, ethnic groupings, individual members helped to make his visit a success. Lutheran Heritage Foundation of Macomb who has mothered the Evangelical Lutheran Church of South Sudan/Sudan now for 30 years, and which now numbers 150,000 baptized members!

Bishop Peter's visit included Moorhead, Park Rapids, Cohasset, Grand Rapids, Virginia, Sauk Rapids, Eagan, Inver Grove Heights, Faribault, St. Paul, Woodbury and Winona. He visited with the Minnesota South District Present, President of Concordia University and many others who are numbered with the saints. A send-ff was held at Woodbury Lutheran Church on May 31. Rev. Dr. Dinku Bato, Africa Sec for LHF blessed us with a Spirit filled message.

We are confident that this mission visit will result in the extension of the Gospel in East Africa through generous support for the work of Lutheran Heritage Foundation, better services for the students at Concordia Seminary in Yambio, the Lutheran Primary Schools of ELCSS/S and increased support for the Lutheran pastors of the ELCSS/S. The ELCSS/S will be received as a partner church at the LCMS Convention in Milwaukee, WI in 2023!! Praise the Lord!

Generous offerings have already been mailed to the LHF. We appreciate your partnership in this unique ministry and thank you for your prayers and support in sharing the name of Jesus among the lost. Your support is helping to provide the financial support to travel 2,345 miles and two overnight hotel stays. All other overnight stays were provided by friends of Bishop Peter. Lutheran Heritage Foundation is thankful for your support of its mission to help new Christians understand the Word of God.

Several meetings (Faribault, Sauk Rapids and Woodbury) were held with the Sudanese Lutherans of Minnesota and the ground work was laid for helping the Lutheran Church in East Africa to become even more successful in the East Africa nations.

The Bishop's departure was not pleasant as the airlines required papers that we did not have for his departure on Untied Airlines. After three attempts we met all requirements...except the luggage challenge. They took only eight pieces, leaving five suitcases for others who travel to South Sudan. Rev. Kevin Cram (Alamogordo, NM) purchased Lutheran Study Bibles, Christian Doctrine, and The Lutheran Confession for the 22 students studying at CLIHIM in Yambio. Forty LW books are also included in the contents of

the five remaining pieces we were unable to send with the Bishop.

Thank you for your love, your excitement for sharing the Good News about Jesus, and your support for the work of the Lutheran Heritage Foundation as it helps new Christians understand the Gospel.

Christ is Risen! He is risen, indeed! Alleluia!

- Paintbrush -




What you do:

BOARD REPORTS

Elders - Jerry Grudem

The elders continue to assist the pastors and are looking for an usher coordinator.

Evangelism – Connie Fondow was absent but sent a report which was read by Dr. Helm.

The Board of Evangelism would like to thank all those who participated in the March Trivia event to assist a family who encountered devasting losses after the December tornadoes in the mid-south region of the United States. The congregational support of time, talent, and treasure was extraordinary.

The board is awaiting positive confirmation of our grant application in the amount of \$1,200.00 with LCMS Life Ministries to assist with the "Bless a Mom" bags. Once again, the members of St. Johns "stepped up" in dramatic fashion and all 40 proposed bags were sponsored by individuals. We will purchase the items to be included in the bags as soon as we receive word on our grant application. The bags will be assembled and taken to the Pregnancy Resource Center where they will be distributed to women in the area as needed.

"Breakfast in Bethlehem" will be our main focus in the fall as we plan to organize for Saturday, December 3. We will hopefully be able to count on those individuals who had previously volunteered to assist us last year in addition to others who may have had their interest peaked for a successful venture this year. The board appreciates any support that may be offered for this community outreach event during the 2022 Advent season.

Education – Lori Griess

Preschool-Final day of preschool was May 26. I day short due to early close of public school. We had 36 children attending classes this year. There were 25 of the 4-year-olds and 11 of the 3-year-olds. There was a wait list for most of the year. For the three-year-old closing program on May 17 there were 80 people in attendance and for the graduation of our four-year-old children there were 145.

Sunday School – Averaged about 25 children per week. Despite sending postcards, and reminders in the bulletin and newsletter last fall we were unable to bring the numbers attending to pre cov-id. Children did a fund raiser during the month of February and March for the food shelf.

Discussed next year's Christmas Program practice and the teachers feel that it would be beneficial if there was practice during the entire Sunday School hour to give the children more time to learn parts and songs. We will have a meet and greet on August 21 for Sunday School. It went over well last year and would like to encourage other members of the congregation to assist if possible. Ideas presented: return of the dunk tank, cotton candy, bowling pins, fish tanks, popcorn, ice cream, balloons, bounce house, and plinko. Sunday School Rally Sunday is September 11. Guest speaker will be the President of Concordia, St. Paul. Would like to send out handwritten notes to students in early August after VBS to invite them to Sunday School.

We are still exploring options for different Sunday School material.

Also discussed presenting attendance awards during church instead of just handing them out during the Sunday School opening. We will be sending out post cards to the children with a list of upcoming events and important dates to remember.

VBS - Date for VBS is August 7-11. Once again in the evening to encourage participation by the parents and members of the congregation. Theme this year is "Food Truck Party" On a Roll with God!

Release Time - Laurie Kimball reported that release time went very well. Looking for help for this fall.

Bible Classes—Going well. Pastor Newton is leading the Sunday morning Bible class. The topic is "End of Life."

Graduate School - Graduated May 20. Thank you for the opportunity to complete the program!



Motion, seconded and carried to accept all reports.

OLD/NEW BUSINESS

Rachel Krause - The PPC voted to ask the congregation to provide mission support to Rachel Krause, missionary in Germany of \$3,000 annually, prorated to \$1500 for this year. Motion, second and carried to approve the request. Following discussion, motion by Jerry Grudem, second by Derek Ricke that this would be paid for through special offerings designated for her. Any shortfall would be paid from the Ted Haberer memorial fund.

Scholarships – Ginny gave some background information/history on scholarships. The Endowment Fund was established around 1990. The congregation decided that interest from the fund would be used for scholarships for members of the congregation attending colleges and seminaries of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. For students going into full-time church work (after graduation would be employed by LCMS congregations, schools and agencies, e.g. – pastor, DCE, DCO, Teacher, etc.) the amount could not be more than \$1,000 or less than \$500 per student. In 2013 the Board of Stewardship set the amount at \$750. Students attending an LCMS college but not enrolled in a full-time church worker program could receive \$100 per year with a cap of \$500 total. In years where there were no students, interest would be used to support the MN North District Scholarship Fun at a minimum of \$500 and maximum of \$1,000 not to exceed that year's annual interest received with the stipulation that it be used for Seminary Student Aid only. Over the years we have given scholarship to several members most recently to Taylor Wheeler. There is currently \$1,440 in this account. This spring we gave a \$1,000 scholarship to Daniel Neubauer. We also have funds in the Ted Haberer trust dedicated for scholarships for those entering full-time church work. Amount was approximately \$50,000 to start. We have given Taylor Wheeler \$8,000 so about \$42,000 remains. There was discussion on increasing the scholarship amounts and setting up a formal process to apply for the scholarships. This will be referred back to the stewardship board.

Dr. Helm explained the new arrangement for preparing funeral lunches. There is a book in the kitchen that outlines menus, recipes, etc. Thanks to everyone who worked on setting this up and to all who volunteered to serve in the groups.

He also told the assembly about the plan to do some deep cleaning. There is a notebook in the church office with various tasks. You can complete a task when it's convenient for you and check it off when you're done. So far Connie Fondow has cleaned the accordion doors in the social hall, Tim and Ginny Ranisate cleaned the lights in the social hall and the Hall Family cleaned the accordion doors in the east classrooms as well as all the windows and blinds. Thanks! Larry Hetrick asked people to consider being a driver for the church bus. You get to go to some fun events!

Adjourned. Pastor Newton closed with prayer and the Doxology.
