Endowment Committee

You may be eligible to make a direct transfer of funds from your IRA, payable to the St. Luke Lutheran Church Endowment Fund. Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCD) can be counted toward satisfying your required minimum distributions (RMD) for the year, as long as certain rules are met.

In addition to the benefits of giving to charity, a QCD excludes the amount donated from taxable income, which is unlike regular withdrawals from an IRA. Keeping your taxable income lower may reduce the impact to certain tax credits and deductions, including Social Security and Medicare.

While many IRAs are eligible for QCDs – there are requirements:

You must be 70 ½ or older to be eligible to make a QCD.

QCDs are limited to the amount that would otherwise be taxed as ordinary

income. This excludes non-deductible contributions.

The maximum annual amount that can qualify for QCD is \$100,000. This applies to the sum of QCDs made to one or more charities in a calendar year. (If, however, you file taxes jointly, your spouse can also make a QCD from his or her own IRA with in the same taxes year for up to \$100,000.)

For a QCD to count towards your current year’s RMD, the funds must come out of your IRA by your RMD deadline, generally December 31.

The St. Luke Church Foundation is a great place to direct your QCD, knowing that you are helping the community while reducing your taxes. A tax advisor can help you determine if both your IRA and charity qualify for QCDs.

Greetings from Naples!

I want to update everyone on our status in Naples. I, along with my supervisor and our congregation, are all safe following the storm. While there is extensive landscape damage and many downed trees and power lines, we are very fortunate that we did not sustain structural damage to our homes or the church. Unfortunately, this cannot be said for everyone in Southwest Florida. Mobile home parks in Naples were decimated and people living in low-lying areas sustained significant flooding in their homes. Massive power outages are the biggest concern at the moment. South Florida heat and humidity without air conditioning is downright brutal. I lived it in for just four days and I can't imagine having to go through it for an extended amount of time.

As I was driving to my supervisor's home yesterday, I saw a massive food and water distribution center and a lady wading through her front yard, pulling a canoe. While some of us are slowly making our way back to normality, there are some who have lost everything. When we gathered for worship as a congrega-

tion the Sunday following the storm, people were very emotional. The Christus Victor family came together to support one another as we journeyed together. Below is the sermon that I preached that day.

"What a week. It's hard to wrap our minds around all that has transpired in the past seven days. And, yes, it was just only seven days ago that Hurricane Irma emerged from the Gulf of Mexico and slammed the coast of South West Florida. I don't know about you, but I'm feeling the mental, physical, and emotional exhaustion of this rollercoaster named Irma, and her aftermath. By this



time last Sunday, I had evacuated the Intern House and was staying with the Slater family for the duration of the hurricane. On Sunday, we tried to distract ourselves from the howling winds and creaking metal outside with card games and conversation, but as the eye of the storm approached and the power finally gave out – our fears and anxiety were palpable as I'm sure many of yours were

as well. Were we individually, and all of our friends and family going to be safe in the storm? What damage was happening every time we heard those fierce winds blow? Would we have a home to return to once the storm did finally pass?

With all of our questions and fears, we turned to worship and prayer. We pulled out the church bulletins and we followed the order of the service. When it came time for the Prayers of Intercession – I read part of the prayer of the Psalmist in Psalm 46. When I think of raw, vulnerable, human emotion in scripture – I often think of the Psalms. Psalm 46 holds special significance for me as I sang an arrangement of it with the seminary choir as Hurricane Matthew ravaged my home state of South Carolina.

In Psalm 46, the psalmist writes, "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore we should not fear, though the earth should change, Though the mountains shake in the heart of the sea, though its waters roar and foam, though its mountains tremble with its tumult.

There is a river whose streams make glad the city of God. The holy habitation of the Most High. God is in the midst of the city, it shall not be moved. God will help it when the morning dawns. The nations are in an uproar, the kingdoms trotter. He utters his voice, the earth melts. The Lord of Hosts is with us, the God of Jacob is our stronghold."

When I shared part of the Psalm last Sunday, the line that stood out to me was, "God is in the midst of the city." God was present in the midst of the city of the psalmist and God was present last week in our cities as the winds were rattling our homes, breaking down trees and power lines, and the water filled the streets. God's reassuring presence in the midst of the hurricane was our refuge and strength.

As I was reflecting on my message for today, I was drawn again to Psalm 46. The Psalm concludes with, "Be still and know that I am God! I am exalted among the nations, I am exalted in the earth." "The Lord of hosts is with us, the God of Jacob is my stronghold." This time, I was struck by the words, "Be still and know that I am God."

As we all experienced this past week, life as we know it comes to a halt in

the aftermath of a hurricane. Our electricity for all the appliances and electronics we rely on goes away. Our phone lines are shut down. Our work schedules are interrupted. The conditions of the roads or the scarcity of fuel prevent us from traveling as we normally would. But now, as the rebuilding continues and as we're starting to resume aspects of our lives, we might be feeling a



combination of two different things. On one hand, we're feeling overwhelmed by all that we have to do; all that we need to catch up on. We have homes to repair, yards to clear, houses to reorganize, not to mention the workload of the past week that awaits us at our jobs. But on the other hand, we're just yearning to get back to our everyday routines. I miss coming into the office every day. I miss being able to shop at Publix and prepare meals in my kitchen. We're eager to move on from the great big pause caused by the hurricane and get busy doing all these things, but God also is calling us to

be still. And I think that as much as we're ready to get busy and stay busy, we need to take time to be still and process all that has happened.

To be still and know that God is God.

To be still and know that God is a God who hears our prayers.

To be still and give thanks to God that we safely survived the hurricane.

To be still and give thanks to God that we still have a place to call home and a job to return to.

To be still and just simply REST.

As we close this traumatic week of Hurricane Irma and begin to move forward rebuilding and returning to our routines, with our seemingly endless to-do lists - it's important that we remember to be still - to center ourselves on God and rest our souls. To be still and turn all of our thanksgivings, troubles, and emotions over to God. To know that God walked with us through the hurricane and God will continue to walk with us every day.

As Jesus says in Matthew's Gospel, "Come to me, all you that are weary and carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls." Thanks be to God, The Lord of hosts who is with us, the God of Jacob who is our stronghold. Amen."

Thank you for all of your thoughts and prayers as we continue our journey of recovery down here. It has been quite the learning experience for me, but I am humbled by the grace of God and the support of the Body of Christ through this time.




