

Dear Members and Friends of St. Martin's,

WHILE I realize it is not unusual, it still feels odd to me that March begins with the Third Sunday of Lent and ends with Easter Sunday. I much prefer when Easter falls in April. This says to me two things: there is a LOT to accomplish in March, and March will seem to go very quickly! With that in mind, I would simply like to encourage all of us this month to keep up with

and participate in all the many ways that March will "bloom" (Spring begins on March 19) with reminders of all that Our Lord has accomplished for us in His Passion, suffering, death, and Resurrection.

Laetare Sunday is March 10, marking the half-way point through Lent. The rose-colored paraments and vestments of the day suggest our joy as we anticipate the coming festival. In his book *The Church's Year*, Leonard Goffine writes of this Sunday and our preparation for Easter:

If we would sing a joyful Alleluia with the Church on the festival of Easter, we must fulfil her desire, and prepare ourselves to celebrate it worthily. Therefore, we should shun improper, clamorous meetings, and retire often to pray in solitude, especially to mediate on the bitter sufferings of our Savior, for when man is alone, God speaks to his heart (Hosea 2:14). We should carefully examine our conscience, and consider how we stand before God, for upon this day shall be the expiation for you, and the cleansing from all your sins: you shall be cleansed before the Lord; for it is a Sabbath of rest, and you shall afflict your souls, that is, by fasting, watching, and praying (Lev. 16:30-31). From this Sunday until Easter we should fast more strictly, give more alms to the poor if we are able, or if poor ourselves, bear our poverty more patiently, offering it to Christ in union with His poverty, His hunger, thirst, etc.; we should make a sincere and contrite confession, and purify our heart from the old leaven of iniquity, that we may keep the Easter meal with Christ in the unleavened bread of purity and truth (1 Cor. 5:7-8). For this end we should incite ourselves to holy desires, rise from sin, which is the death of the soul.

Passiontide begins the next week with Passion Sunday, March 17. From this day until Easter, all crosses, statues, and pictures of Christ are draped in purple in memory of Our Lord's having hid Himself from the Jews until His entrance into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, no longer showing Himself in public (Jn. 11:54). Also from this day in the Church's liturgies, the *Gloria Patri* (Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit, *etc.*) is omitted because in the Person of Christ, the Holy Trinity was dishonored.

Finally, the Church enters into the holiest week of the year, Holy Week, beginning on Sunday, March 24, Palm Sunday. Every day from Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday, we are invited to gather for worship and meditation on Our Lord's Passion, all of which He underwent for our salvation. Each day of the week has its own emphasis, and throughout the week we have opportunity to hear the readings of the Lord's Passion from each of the four Gospels.

Holy Week culminates in the three holiest days of the Church's Year, the sacred *Triduum* of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday/Easter Sunday. On Thursday we commemorate the institution of the Blessed Sacrament of Our Lord's Body and Blood, participate in the *Mandatum*, the washing of feet. At the conclusion of the Mass, the Altar is stripped, to show that Jesus took off, as it were, at the time of His Passion, His Divine glory, and yielded Himself up to utter humiliation into the hands of His enemies to be crucified, and that at the crucifixion He was forcibly stripped of His garments, which the soldiers divided among them, as foretold in the Twenty-second Psalm, which is used during this ceremony. The church remains open throughout the evening until 9 a.m. on Good Friday morning for anyone who wishes to come and spend time in prayer before Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament at the Altar of Repose.

Good Friday begins with the ecumenical Cross Walk at 10 a.m. This walk has been happening for many, many years, and is a wonderful way to meditate on the Seven Last Words of Our Lord as we stop at area churches (active and vacant) with our brothers and sisters in Christ from other churches to pray and sing the praises of Our Lord. At 1:00 p.m. we gather at the church for the Solemn Afternoon Liturgy of the Passion and Death of the Lord. This liturgy includes the Solemn Veneration of the Cross wherein all present are invited to make an outward gesture of their gratitude and love to the sign of our redemption, the Cross. We conclude this solemn day with evening Tenebrae devotions, with its familiar and startling sound of the *strepitus*, a loud bang which symbolizes the closing of the tomb.

On Saturday evening we gather back at the church for one of the most ancient and beautiful of the Church's rites, the Easter Vigil. It is a wonderful evening full of darkness and light, readings and chants, renewal of Baptismal vows, the Litany of the Saints, and the first Mass of Easter. For the first time since Septuagesima Sunday on January 28, Alleluias will once again resound in the church, marking the beginning of our joyful celebrations of Our Lord's Resurrection. We gather after the Vigil for a brief potluck hors d'oeuvre reception in the education wing kitchenette to begin the joyful feasting at the conclusion of the

great Lenten fast!

Our Easter celebrations begun on Saturday night continue into Sunday morning as we gather together for a delicious Easter breakfast and fellowship hosted by the Parish Education and Fellowship Committees beginning at 8 a.m. The feasting continues as we gather together for the Mass of Easter Sunday at 10:15 a.m. Our Alleluias continue, expressing our joy at the Resurrection of Christ, and the hope of eternal happiness which He has obtained for us.

Again, looking back over it, it seems like a LOT to ask of March! Considering the fully packed schedule of events for the month, it is easy to feel tired and overwhelmed before any of it even begins! Still, I am reminded of the words of the Apostle St. Paul in 1 Thessalonians 5:24: "He who calls you is faithful, and He will do it." The same God Who calls us together in worship and fellowship for what remains of this Lent, and into Passiontide, Holy Week, and Easter, is the same God Who I know will bless us and see us through it for His honor and glory. I invite and welcome you, therefore, to heed His call and continue the journey with your brothers and sisters in Christ.

Wishing you a blessed remainder of Lent, Spring, Passiontide, Holy Week, and Easter (all in March!), I remain . . .
