# Living Among the Bible's Trees

Trees are a valuable commodity here in Minnesota. Nearly every day we see logging trucks hauling trees to the paper mills. People are often busy cutting down trees for firewood to heat their homes. Minnesota is home to many birds and animals who call the forest their home.

This year for Lent, we will examine how the trees of the Bible point us to Jesus' death and resurrection. We will hear how the Bible uses trees in both a law and gospel context. The trees of the Bible reveal that we are sinners and the trees of the Bible make known that there is forgiveness and hope found in Jesus. A tree (the tree of knowledge of good and evil) played a central role in our fall into sin and Christ was crucified on a tree (wooden beams that came from a tree) to save us.

We certainly live among the Bible's trees! The Bible reports God creating trees on the third day (Genesis 1:11–13), and trees apparently survive the Last Day's annihilation of the present ground and sky to reappear on the new earth under the new heaven (Isaiah 65:17; 66:22; 2 Peter 3:13; Revelation 21:1–2), such as in the new Jerusalem (Revelation 22:1–20). So the Bible's trees are relevant to us. In fact, considering them helps us realize why we need a Savior, how God provided a Savior for us in Jesus, who died on the cross, and how the saved lives of repentant believers look.

Many trees are mentioned in the Bible. In addition to the trees mentioned in this series, we think of the following: the burning bush (Exodus 3:1–4:17), Absalom's tree (2 Samuel 18:10), trees decorating the temple (1 Kings 6:29–32), Elijah's broom tree (1 Kings 19:1–18), Jonah's vine (Jonah 4), Zacchaeus's tree (Luke 19:1–10), the palm trees (John 12:12–19, Revelation 7:9–17), and Judas's tree (Matthew 27:5–10; Acts 1:15–26). There are, in fact, almost enough trees for another full Lenten sermon series. Trees


are central to the whole of biblical faith (1 Corinthians 2:2) and certainly to the season of Lent.

Paul wrote several letters to the early Christian churches and to their pastors. The New Testament preserves thirteen of them for us. About AD 51, Paul wrote the first of his letters, 1 Thessalonians. 2 Thessalonians soon followed. In these two letters, we gaze into the lives of early members of the Christian Church. What makes Paul's letters so important is both their timeliness and their timelessness. Paul wrote them within twenty years of Christ's death, resurrection, and ascension.

1 and 2 Thessalonians are God's thoughts on the Antichrist, the second coming of Christ, church discipline, and the encouragement of believers during persecution. Only God, through Jesus Christ and by the power of the Holy Spirit, brings the comfort and hope shown in Paul's letters. May God's Word penned by Paul comfort and encourage you as you study 1 and 2 Thessalonians, for "The Lord is faithful. He will establish you and guard you against the evil one" (2 Thessalonians 3:3).





## **Stewardship Corner**

We are at the beginning of Lent. During the Lenten season, the church calls to our attention the sufficiency of what God gives. It points to the sufficiency of God's grace in the atoning work of Jesus. It shows us the sufficiency of faith in Jesus' work for us. It makes known the sufficiency of God's Word in faith and life.

But Lent doesn't just remind us of the sufficiency of God's spiritual gifts, the gifts that pertain to our redemption and salvation. Lent also reminds us of the sufficiency of the physical, temporal gifts of God, those that pertain to this body and life. In other words, it reminds us of the importance of godly contentment and of outward discipline and training of the body.

This outward training of the body teaches us not to give in to every desire of our flesh but to learn to say no to them. And it does this in such a way that if you fail, it is no sin. It is a way to practice without putting yourself into a compromising situation.

The easiest example of this is fasting. When you fast, you are practicing saying no to the desires of your body. But if you fail in this, if you break your fast, you have not sinned. You have, though, learned something about how your flesh works, how difficult it is to fight against it, and how you need help from above in order to do it.

There is another example of this. It is alms-giving. This is an increase in giving to the church and its mission during this time. We all know that our flesh finds security in money and stuff. By committing to give more to the church, you are training your flesh. You are, by this outward discipline, training yourself to be content with what God gives. You are practicing saying "no" to your desires. Again, if you fail, you have not sinned. But you've learned just how powerful your flesh is in leading you instead of you leading it. You've learned how you need help from above in being content with what God gives.

This is why St. Paul instructs young Pastor Timothy in this way:

"But godliness with contentment is great gain, for we brought nothing into the world, and[a] we cannot take anything out of the world. But if we have food and clothing, with these we will be content. But those who desire to be rich fall into temptation, into a snare, into many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evils. It is through this craving that some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pangs." (1 Tim 6:6–10)

Our sufficiency is not of ourselves; it is in God. Let us learn this without sin by training our flesh this Lenten season.

Members often ask how we are paying our bills when our offerings are often short of our budgeted needs. The short answer is that we need to budget for all expenses we are obligated to pay. At the end of each month, we will show how our offerings are actually being spent. Any surplus funds at the end of our fiscal year (June 30) will be used to pay down the church mortgage (\$785,239 on 1/31/20).
