

Why is it that I find Good Friday more meaningful than Easter? Don't get me wrong, I've always loved Easter, with its joyful celebration of new life and rebirth. It is the event, Jesus' resurrection, that is the basis for our life, hope and eternal destiny! Without Easter, we are "to be pitied" (1 Corinthians 15:19). But, there is something about Good Friday that 'moves' me like no other day, like no other worship service of the year.

As a child, our family observed Good Friday by not eating 'meat.' (Outside of tradition, I don't know why. We were Lutheran and no meat on Good Friday seems pretty Catholic.). Our 'traditional' Good Friday dinner was canned salmon, creamed corn (Yuck!) and scalloped potatoes. Good Friday was/is supposed to be dreary, no sun shining to fit the somber mood of the day. I remember the Good Friday that I got the great news that I had been accepted into the graduate program I had been hoping for and how guilty I felt at the Good Friday worship service that I was so happy and excited. Thankfully, God's work in my life is not based on how I feel at any given moment, including during a worship service.

I suppose Good Friday is so meaningful because it is the reality of Jesus' (God's) profound love for me, demonstrated in the brutality of that day and the death he died that was really meant for me. I've always been drawn to the reality that on the cross, in all of Jesus' passion, I can be honest with who I am. I also find comfort in seeing everyone else being honest that we are all poor miserable sinners. I don't know about you, but I am exhausted, constantly trying to tell others and convince myself that I'm ok, that I am 'fine.' It is an unrelenting job trying to be 'enough,' lying to myself and others that I've got it all together. In the violent judgment of Good Friday, I'm laid bare as the helpless sinner that I am. And it feels good, the honesty, met by the unrelenting, endless love of my Savior.

As I look upon Jesus hanging on that cross, he is looking at me, with all of my failures, selfishness and open rebellion, yet he looks at me with love and mercy in his eyes.

All of that would mean nothing, though without Easter. If he had not risen, he would be no better than any other person who has known me and pitied me. Easter means that Christ is enough and by virtue of my Baptism, I am enough! Being laid bare and

exposed for the sinner that I am, and knowing that Jesus died and rose for all of that, to take that away, changes everything.

In the works of one of my favorite podcasters, Dan van Voorhis, because of Good Friday and Easter (Resurrection) Sunday, "the rumors of grace, forgiveness, and the redemption of all things are true.... Everything is going to be ok."

Happy(?) Good Friday and Happy Easter!



The preschool will hold its Spring open house Tuesday, April 9. This is typically when new students and their families have an opportunity to meet the teachers and see our classroom. While many of the visitors who attend the open house are already registered or are likely to register, all prospective students are welcome. If you know of any families with preschool-age children, please invite them to this event! The in-person visit will help families discern whether LELP will meet their preschooler's needs.

During April, the students will learn about pets, the letters Y and Z, and select New Testament stories. The students also learn a scripture verse every month; for April it will be John 3:16. Most likely, you already know this verse – consider memorizing 3:17 as well!

Stewardship Corner

Whose Is It Anyway?

If you have every bought or sold a house, you are acquainted with the concept of a "title search." Before you can sell your house, and before anyone else will feel comfortable putting down the money to buy it, you have to prove that you really own it. So a title company looks through the public records to ensure that you bought it from the person who really owned it, who bought it from the person who really owned it before that, all the way back to the earliest records of your state, including when your state was only a territory or colony of England.

Peak into a preschool classroom during playtime and you'll see a simplified version of this. A child starts playing with a ball, but another child says, "That's mine: I had it first."

You can't understand the Seventh Commandment without understanding this concept of ownership or title. As the Small Catechism puts it:

You shall not steal. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not take our neighbor's money or possessions, or get them in any dishonest way, but help him to improve and protect his possessions and income.

Your neighbor's possessions are *his*: you don't have a right to take them. And likewise, your possessions are yours. Ownership and property rights are foundational to any functioning society.

But there is something deeper to know about ownership, and that is the question of who has the title and ownership *to you*? Paul says, "Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price" (1 Cor. 6:19–20).

If you yourself are owned by God, then of course everything that you own, you really only possess by God's leave: all of it, at bottom, belongs to Him since *you* belong to Him. For you were bought with the blood of Christ.

This notion is the foundation of all Christian stewardship. It all belongs to God. It should all be used for things that bring honor to His name, blessings to our neighbors and the extension of His kingdom.

Members often ask how we are paying our bills when our offerings are often short of our budgeted needs. The short answer is that we need to budget for all expenses we are obligated to pay. At the end of each month, we will show how our offerings are actually being spent. The mortgage balance as of February 29 is \$21,692. Any surplus funds at the end of our fiscal year (June 30) will be discussed with the congregation at the annual budget meeting.
