Dear Friends in Christ,

"So how's it going?" Have you ever been asked that question? I bet you have. It's usually a question that is asked by someone who probably expects nothing more than an "ok," or "just fine" for an answer. I'm fairly certain that for many of us the "I'm ok" response comes automatically, even when things are not ok. Wouldn't it be interesting if the questioner really wanted to know how it was going, and was willing to spend the time to actively listen to an in-depth response?

"So how's it going?" I guess we need to figure out what exactly the "it" is in the question. How's what going? My career? My marriage? My stock portfolio? My health? My hope for the future? My relationship with the church? My relationship with God? My life?

So how is the Capital Campaign going? I'm glad you asked. We have raised \$175,000 so far. Great start. Commitment Sunday will be on Rally Day, September 10.

How are the preparations for Rally Day coming along? We have new teachers and new students for our Sunday School. We have a great picnic planned complete with a moon bounce. We still need a couple of volunteers to help put up the tent.

Imagine for a moment God asking us that question. "So how's it going, my child?" I have a feeling that God will stick around for an answer. The great thing about God is that God already knows the answer. The Psalmist writes, "O Lord, you have searched me and known me. You know when I sit down and when I rise up; you discern my thoughts from far away. You search out my path and my lying down, and are acquainted with all my ways. Even before a word is on my tongue, O Lord, you know it completely."

Is everything going ok? Is everything fine in our lives and in the world? Sharing an honest answer with God, who already knows our hurts and hopes, is an important first step in healing, and in allowing God to make us whole again. It's an important way to experience life the way God intended life to be.

How Do You Like Our New HVAC So Far?

If you've been in church since July 30th, you've had a chance to experience first-hand the new HVAC system at St. Paul's. And what a blessing it's been! We had been without the capability of cooling the church for a year, and while that was fine from October through March, let us not forget how uncomfortable things were the rest of the time, from an Easter that was unseasonably warm to our most-recent record-breaking heat this summer. We are thankful that the system is in place, and already providing cool comfort to the people of St. Paul's and the community.

However, there is still much to do. Read on for updates on the HVAC project, the **Our Time, Our Turn Capital Campaign**, and how you can help.

Is the Physical Work Finished on the HVAC Installation?

It's a noticeable difference in the church these days with the installation of the big "chiller" and the presence of cool, comfortable air during our weekly services at St. Paul's. But if you're here during the week, you will continue to see Heffron company trucks in the church parking lot. Why?

While the installation of the new HVAC system is largely complete, there are many smaller tasks still left on the project list. These include—but are not limited to:

- Filling in holes created by the construction work
- Weighing our options regarding closing

in the exposed pipe work after the pipes have been insulated

- Dismantling and removing the old iron furnace in the basement and the small boiler that serviced the sexton's apartment, and restoring the electric controls in the latter
- Addressing recent drainage issues
- Removing all construction debris and cleaning spaces

This work will continue throughout the month of September.

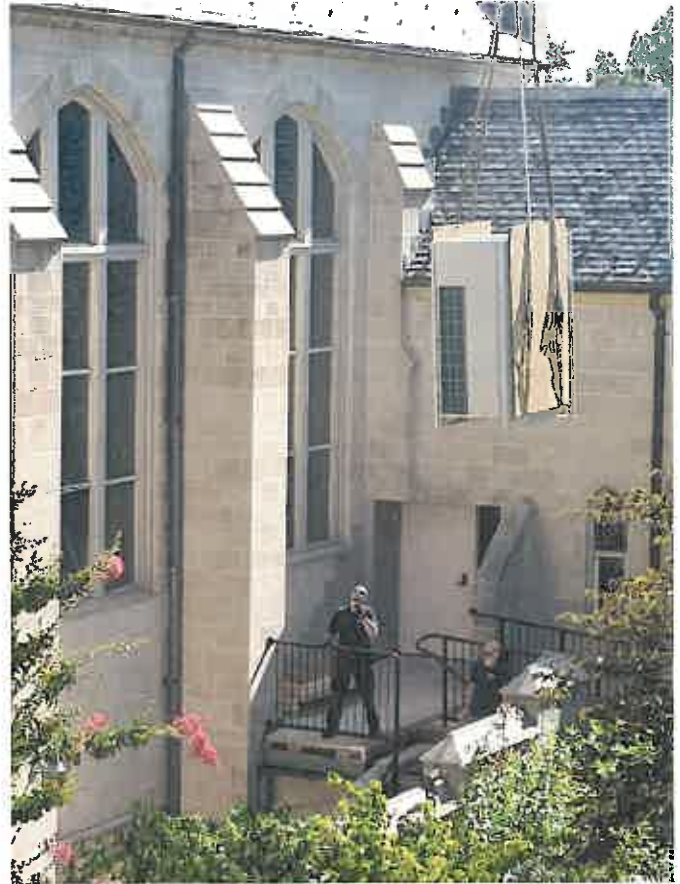

Dear siblings in Christ,

Now I've...had...the time of my lllife, and I owe it all to youuuuu.

I cannot adequately express with words what this last year has meant to me. Being able to serve in this congregation and work alongside all of you has been the opportunity of a lifetime and has formed and shaped me both as an individual and as a future leader in the church.

When I first walked up to the St. Paul's property in the spring of 2016 to meet all of you for the first time at the Confirmation service & picnic, I remember grabbing my husband's hand a little tighter and feeling slightly overwhelmed by the sheer size of the sanctuary...but as soon as we set foot through the Portico doors, I experienced a sense of relief, comfort, and loving welcome, and it just kept getting better from that point on.

I will carry with me such a treasure trove of memories from my time here. Gliding down a moonbounce slide on Rally Day, discussing theology over a pint with the young adults, joyful conversations during midweek Soup & Supper, interviewing shepherds and angels at the Christmas Eve service, staying up late with the youth group at retreats and lock-ins, and experiencing the magnificence of an Easter morning brass quartet; and this just begins to scratch the surface. I have felt pretty much every emotion possible, and was blessed to accompany all of you through the highs and lows of an extremely eventful year.

In short, I just want to say thank you. You welcomed me, supported me, guided me, and allowed me to fall and get back up again (literally, at times, like when I tripped on my robe going down the altar steps in my first service). You offered your gifts and sense of community freely, expecting nothing in return, and showed what it means to live out a call to

mission as followers of Christ in an ever-changing world. Your understanding of discipleship is inspiring, and your love of God and each other is palpable.

You are beloved children of God, and I can't wait to see what the Spirit has in store for this congregation.

Again, our family is delighted to begin at St. Paul's Lutheran! Please introduce yourselves, and we look forward to meeting everyone!

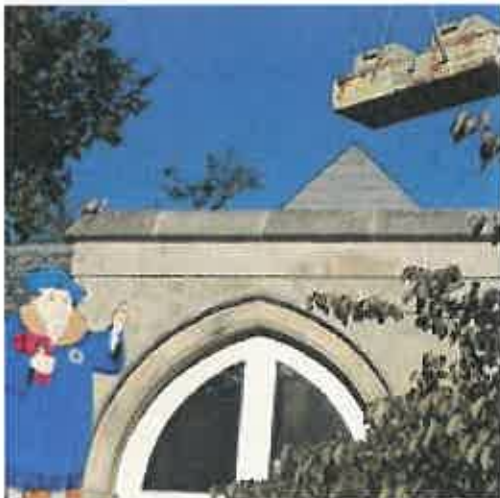

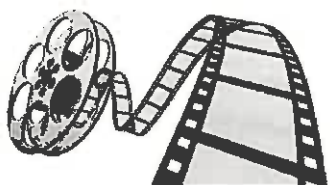


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### Traveling Martin Luthers:
