'PRECIOUS TO HIM'

Through Jesus, you have eternal wealth

In 1815, Napoleon was defeated in the battle of Waterloo. The hero of that battle was the Duke of Wellington. Interesting is that one the duke's more recent biographers claims to have an advantage over all the other previous biographers. His advantage was that he had found an old account ledger that showed how the duke spent his money. This, says the biographer, was a far better clue to what the duke thought was truly important, much more than just reading his letters or his speeches. It is a curious claim.

It prompts an interesting thought. What if someone wrote your biography on the basis of your checkbook, credit-card statements and income-tax return? What might they say about you, your loyalties, your priorities in life as well as who or what you serve?

It's often easy to forget that the money we have in our wallets, checkbooks, credit cards and bank accounts is really not our money. As Christians, we are God's stewards and are therefore caretakers of the money and possessions He has placed into our hands.

What would your checkbook, receipts and credit-card statements say about how you spend your money? Would God and the work of His Holy Christian Church be a consideration in that equation? Often, it's easy to get lost in what society says about our worth and value. We read it in the headlines all the time. A professional sports player signs a multimillion-dollar contract, a movie star is worth so many millions and Bill Gates and Warren Buffet are worth billions. But how much are you worth?

You could certainly look at your wallet, credit cards, checkbook and bank accounts. But I'd encourage you to read through the biographies of Jesus (the four Gospels), not only to see how Jesus did His spending, but to see how much you are worth. These biographies reveal that you are worth so much that God gave His one and only Son to die for you so that you might have eternal life (John 3:16)!

Luther's Small Catechism says it this way:

I believe that Jesus Christ, true God ... has redeemed me, a lost and condemned person, purchased and

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won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil: not with gold or silver, but with his holy, precious blood and with his innocent suffering and death."



(Explanation to the Second Article of the Apostles' Creed)

You are worth more than any amount of money. Forbes may have their list of the wealthiest people in the world. But God has His list. No one surpasses the wealth of God. Nothing is more valuable than the shed blood of Christ.

Our Heavenly Father is happy to give this eternal wealth to you through His Son Jesus. In fact, in a world that's constantly asking how much you are worth, trusting in Jesus brings tremendous hope. In a culture obsessed with person-

Tom Evans, grant writer for Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, sent this email after receiving a check from the LWML Minnesota South District:

Once more, I express Concordia Seminary's gratitude to the LWML Minnesota South District for its generous mission grant in support of our international students' education costs. When our 2021-22 academic year begins late this month, we will have 47 international students enrolled in our graduate school.

During our 2020-21 academic year, nine of our international students earned their advanced-level theological degrees and resumed their service to their home countries' church bodies. In addition, a 10th student — from Ethiopia - earned his Master of Arts degree early this year and qualified for admittance into the seminary's doctor of philosophy program. He remains on campus pursuing his doctoral studies.

This entire mission grant of \$7,000 will be fulfilled with a final payment in November.
