Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age." MATT. 28:19-20

Each passage illuminates the people, places and callings to which Jesus said "go." They inspire us to imagine what it might look like for us to go first — both in our relationship with the Lord and with others, as individuals and as a congregation.

Perhaps it's going first into your neighborhood to get to know others and invite them to your church. Maybe it means going first to the single parents of your congregation to offer childcare or to start a neighborhood food pantry. It could mean serving as a mentor to confirmation students or joining community conversations about race and biblical justice. Dream big! Jesus went first into death and back to life to show us the power of His going first and to prepare the way for us to follow.

Some of my initial conversations about going first have been extremely exciting. One conversation was about going first to the community with a summer school program open to all. Another was a dream to begin a Christian hospital that cares for the whole person — body, mind and soul. By collaborating with other Christians who uphold a biblical view of care, it would finance, build, staff, train and teach what it is to care for the whole person. And by building the first hospital in a needy community in Minneapolis, it would be used as a model to expand across the state and even the nation. Like I said, these are exciting conversations!

I've placed each of the above passages into four groupings to help us focus and explore how we can go first. In the coming months, I'll unpack each: Life together, soul care, collaboration and intentional outreach. As we continue along our way following Jesus, I'd love to hear from you about your dream to *Go First!* Talk to you soon.

MISSION GRANT FOCUS CTSFW

The voting delegates of the Minnesota South District LWML selected the Concordia

CTSFW Food and Clothing Co-op

Theological Seminary Fort Wayne (CTSFW) Food and Clothing Coop as one of the top two recipients of their Mission Grant votes at the June convention. Our mission-minded women understand the tremendous support that the co-op provides to seminarians and their families, often offsetting as much as 85 percent of a family's grocery budget.

Deaconess Katherine Rittner, Food and Clothing Co-op director, was recently kind enough to share some interesting facts our mission-minded women might not know about the co-op.

"Mission grant monies are restricted and used only for the purchase of items provided in the Food Co-op as well as the processing of the hogs and steers that are donated to us year-round," Rittner says. While the co-op does employ several full- and part-time workers, mission grant dollars are never used for this purpose. Much of the work is done by seminarians who volunteer their time to help sort and restock. Rittner speaks highly of the student volunteers, "The time that the students provide is so they can show their appreciation to our amazing donors for their continued care and support. It is also how the students earn their points to shop in the Food Co-op, which are assigned based on their family size and ages of their children."

Curious about what exactly your LWML mite dollars buy? Rittner explains: "We purchase fresh milk, eggs and produce on a weekly basis for our students to shop for every Tuesday. We also order monthly from Sam's Club individually wrapped fish fillets, butter, cream cheese, diapers, wipes, laundry detergent and dishwasher detergent. In addition, we purchase items

to stock our shelves from Aldi, wholesale retailers and Dollar Tree, including cereal, tortillas, spaghetti, canned goods, seasoning, flour, sugar, oil, personal hygiene (shampoo, conditioner, deodorant, razors, shaving cream), almond milk (for those with allergies), and gluten-free items as we can get them. An added plus is that we are a member of the local Food Bank which allows us the opportunity to purchase items at a greatly reduced rate."

What a host of mighty blessings come from those little mites!

August is a busy time of the year, with the arrival of new students and the return of vicars to campus, "sometimes with more family members than what they left with," Rittner says. "The vicars are always the most thankful and appreciative of the co-ops because they have been out and away for a year and have had to figure out how to do it on their own. Of course, the congregation that they have spent the last year at does amazing at caring for them, but it doesn't compare to what we are able to do at the co-ops with your help.

"The 'first-timers' are always the best. When they first come in to shop and have no idea how to do it, sometimes it makes for a special bonding time with them because of their amazement that so many from across the country have taken an interest in their well-being, and that they are being provided for while they are here preparing to go into the harvest field of Christ."

With your affirmation and contact information on the form, including your return email address, there is no longer a need to send a hard copy by U.S. mail.

Nominations for regional offices can come from anywhere in the Synod, but the nominee must reside in the designated region.


Nominations must be received by Oct. 29, 2022, but are desired as soon as possible.


