Even unbelievers can believe this Bible story about Jesus' birth is true. Faith is not a natural work apart from God's grace, as the Scripture clearly teaches. Rather the right kind of faith, the kind that flows from grace and that God's Word demands, is firmly believing that Christ was born for you. His birth is yours and occurred for your benefit.

"For the gospel teaches that Christ was born for our benefit and that everything he did and suffered was for us. As the angel says here, "I have good news for you, a message that will fill everyone with joy. Today your Savior, Christ the Lord, was born in David's city." With these words, you can clearly see that he was born for all of us.

"He doesn't say, "a Savior was born," but rather "your Savior, Christ the Lord, was born." In the same way, he doesn't say, "I have good news," rather "I have good news for you." For you! "I have good news for you, a message that will fill everyone with joy." This joy is for everyone who has this kind of faith."

Christ truly was born for you! Embrace that truth as we gather to worship our Savior, Christ the Lord!


OFFERINGS

Hymn Studies With Esther-December 2023

The Hymn: Silent Night, Holy Night (LSB 363)

The Author: Words: Joseph Mohr (1792-1848) Music: Franz Gruber (1787-1863)

Many of us know the story of the origination of the beloved hymn, Silent Night. But it is such a good story that I wanted to share it in this month's Hymn Study:

On December 24, 1818, Joseph Mohr, the curate at St. Nicholas Church at Oberndorf, gave a poem to Franz Gruber, the organist. He requested that it be set to suitable music for two solo voices and choir with guitar accompaniment. It is thought that he requested the guitar because the organ was in need of repair and was not able to be used.

Gruber, on the very same evening, gave the simple composition Mohr. The copy of the enclosed original was sung that same night with much success. The singers that evening were Joseph Mohr on the upper voice, which carried the melody, and Franz Gruber on the lower part. A choir echoed the final two phrases at the conclusion of each stanza.

The first stanza originally read:

Silent Night! Holy Night!

All are sleeping, only the dear

Holy couple keeps its lonely watch;

Sweet boy with curly hair,

Sleep in Heavenly peace!

Gruber made several arrangements of the carol. Those whose manuscripts have survived may be seen on the website of the Stille Nacht Gesellschaft (www.stillenacht.at).

Many of us also know of the famous truce on Christmas Eve, 1914. On that night, soldiers from both sides of the war climbed out of their trenches, shook hands and sang Silent Night together. For a short time that night, there was peace.

When are we singing this hymn? This hymn will be sung on Christmas Eve, by candlelight, as is our tradition as well as tradition of many churches.

LWML has begun collecting items needed for the Hospice and Newborn Kits for Global Health Ministries. Items can be placed in the basket in the Narthex. The goal is to assemble kits on February 11.

One Hospice Kit contains these items:

- 1 regular-size bath towel (approx. 52" long), new or gently used
- 1 washcloth, new or gently used (not microfiber)
- 1 bath-size bar unscented soap, such as Dove Unscented for Sensitive Skin, in original packaging
- 1 toothbrush, in original, individual packaging
- · 1 pick-style comb
- 1 nail clipper, Larger size preferred
- 6 Band-Aids, rubber-banded together
- 1 jar or tube of pure petroleum jelly, such as Vaseline/Approx. 4 ounces, lid taped
- 1 pair heavy-duty household gloves/Kitchen type, size medium

For one Newborn Kit use new or gently used items

- 1 regular-size bath towel (approx. 52" long)
- 1 washcloth (not microfiber)
- 1 bath-size bar white Ivory soap, in original packaging
- · 1 newborn cotton t-shirt or "onesie"

Size 0-3, or newborn

- 1 newborn stocking hat/Small size, a newborn's head is about 14" circumference
- 1 baby receiving blanket (approx. 30" x 30")
 Cotton or light flannel, knit or crocheted
- 2 cloth diapers
- 2 diaper pins

The Measure of Our Generosity

If you open up the Small Catechism, you'll find a shortened version of the Third Commandment: "Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy." But if you look up the list of the Ten Commandments in Exodus, you'll find the full version:

Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labor, and do all your work, but the seventh day is a Sabbath to the LORD your God. On it you shall not do any work, you, or your son, or your daughter, your male servant, or your female servant, or your livestock, or the sojourner who is within your gates. For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested on the seventh day. Therefore the LORD blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy. (Ex. 20:8–11)

Why did Luther shorten this commandment for the Small Catechism? Was it so that the kids wouldn't have so much to memorize? No, it was because Luther knew that all the details of the Third Commandment were part of the "shadow" of the Old Testament (Col. 2:16). Or as St. Paul puts it, there is "letter" in the Old Testament law and "spirit" (2 Cor. 3:6). The details of not working on Saturday were fulfilled by Christ. That part of the Sabbath regulation no longer applies. But the spirit of the law does remain: We need to dedicate sufficient time each week to hearing God's Word and giving it honor and respect. Or as Luther sums it up in the Small Catechism's explanation to the Third Commandment: "We should fear and love God so that we do not despise preaching and His Word but hold it sacred and gladly hear and learn it."

The same sort of analysis applies to our giving. In the Old Testament, God commanded the Israelites to give a tenth of their income to the Levites so that those men could dedicate their lives to serving in God's house, teaching the people, conducting worship, etc. In the New Testament, there is a rigid requirement listed about handing in your tax forms to church to make sure you've given enough. But the mandate to have a full-time ministry, which is the spirit of that law concerning tithing to the Levites, is right there in 1 Corinthians 9:14: "The Lord has ordained that those who preach the Gospel should make their living from the Gospel."

The New Testament church's job is significantly larger than the job of Old Testament Israel. We are commanded to preach the Gospel to all nations. There was only the temple to maintain in the Old Testament, but we have churches, schools, universities and seminaries, plus missionaries everywhere. So you tell me: Can we really undertake the work of the ministry if our giving doesn't even measure up to Old Testament levels of generosity?
