2024 Budget

Over the last two months the church council has been working on our 2024 budget.

- Inflation has hit all of us, as well as the Congregation its self.
- Over each of the last two years our offerings have fallen short of our expenses by \$20,000/yr. We have been able to cover the short fall by dipping into our saving funds each of those years. Since 2019 our expenses are up over \$10,000/yr. and our giving has dropped over \$10,000/yr. Our savings is now at a level where we will not be able to cover a short fall like we have had the last two years.
- The council has cut items like our Right Now Media account; we have cut or eliminated many of our Outreach efforts; we have postponed the hiring of a choir director (a position we have had for over 50 years); and more.
- We pray that you will be able increase you're giving by 10%. If you are giving \$10/wk, can you give \$11! If you are giving \$100/wk, can you give \$110!
- I want to close with 2 Corinthians 9:7
 - "Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."

A Healing Space for At-Risk Children Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch, ND — \$100,000

The Christ-centered healing ministry of Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch (DBGR) creates an eternal, life-giving impact in the lives of children, ages 10 to 18, who have faced unimaginable trauma. Due to childhood traumas of violence, abuse, neglect, and more, children coming to the Ranch have experienced debilitating emptiness and loneliness at the deepest of levels; levels that only Christ can heal. A construction date of Spring 2024 has been set to build a chapel on their Bismarck, ND campus to serve as a healing space to help them know and experience the mercy of Christ and His healing power.

Parents for all the hard work you did helping your kids learn their parts and making sure they were at church for the practices. Without your help, this program would not be possible.


Last, but not least, a special thank you to the amazing Sunday School kids for sharing the Christmas story with the congregation. We are all so proud of you.

Hymn Studies With Esther-January 2024

The Hymn: LSB #411- I Want to Walk as a Child of the Light

The Author: Kathleen Tomerson

During a heat wave during the summer of 1966, Kathleen Tomerson and her family, in an effort to escape the rolling brownouts of St Lous, elected to return to the comfort of her mother's air conditioned home in Houston. Tomerson's recent meditations on Scripture passages dealing with childlike faith unexpectedly began to evoke the first stanza of this hymn, which she composed, phrase by phrase in text and tune, instead of packing for the airport. She completed the remaining stanzas in the same way after arriving in Houston. It was originally used as a choral anthem, and performed at Church of the Redeemer in Houston. Congregation members routinely took the copies from the pews at that church-leading to the necessity of copyrighting the hymn in 1970. It originated at this Episcopal church, but has been in hymnals of numerous denominations and has been translated into Welsh, Japanese, Spanish, Dutch, and Hmong.

Hymn Background:

Although in our hymnal's Epiphany section, the text, which has even been used at weddings and funerals, bears a prominent Advent theme. The direct emphasis on light contrasted with darkness, links it not only to the hymn tradition of Luther, who also focused on this contrast. Greek hymnody also alluded to the light of Christ to the Gentiles. The hymns origin, as well as its devotional character, also suggests general congregational use beyond one or two liturgical seasons.

The theme of Christ abiding within the heart of the Christian was inspired by Ephesians 3:17- "so that Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith." The hymn may manifest a theme of childhood, alluding to Jesus' words in Matthew 18:3- "Truly, I say to you, unless you turn and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven," but was initially composed for adults to nurture their childlike faith. The popularity of this hymn was a surprise to the composer, who originally only had modest aspirations for her choral anthem.

When are we singing this hymn?

#411- I Want to Walk as a Child of the Light- will be sung on January 7, when we celebrate both Epiphany and the Baptism of our Lord.

Here is a list of all the items needed for the Hospice and Newborn kits.

One Hospice Kit contains these items:

- 1 regular-size bath towel (approx. 52" long), new or gently used
- 1 washcloth, new or gently used (not microfiber)
- 1 bath-size bar unscented soap, such as Dove Unscented for Sensitive Skin, in original packaging
- · 1 toothbrush, in original, individual packaging
- 1 pick-style comb
- 1 nail clipper, Larger size preferred
- 6 Band-Aids, rubber-banded together
- 1 jar or tube of pure petroleum jelly, such as Vaseline/Approx. 4 ounces, lid taped
- 1 pair heavy-duty household gloves/Kitchen type, size medium

For one Newborn Kit use new or gently used items

- 1 regular-size bath towel (approx. 52" long)
- 1 washcloth (not microfiber)
- 1 bath-size bar white Ivory soap, in original packaging
- · 1 newborn cotton t-shirt or "onesie"

Size 0-3, or newborn

- 1 newborn stocking hat/Small size, a newborn's head is about 14" circumference
- 1 baby receiving blanket (approx. 30" x 30")
 Cotton or light flannel, knit or crocheted
- 2 cloth diapers
- 2 diaper pins

The Chief Stewards of Humanity: Mom and Dad

St. Paul tells the Ephesians that the first commandment with a specific promise attached to it is, "Honor your father and mother so that it may go well with you, and you may live long in the land" (Eph. 6:2). This promise is one indication of the importance of this commandment. The other thing that highlights the special nature of this commandment is its placement within the Ten Commandments.

The Ten Commandments are clearly organized in two big categories. The first three commandments deal with our relationship with God. This category is called the First Table of the Law. The last seven commandments, the Second Table of the Law, tell us how we should relate to other people. These two tables correspond to what Jesus calls the two greatest commandments: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind," and "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Matt. 22:37–39).

The order of the Second Table of the Law is also important. Murder is a greater sin than adultery, which is a greater sin that stealing, or lying, or coveting. But why is the Fourth Commandment first in the Second Table, ahead of "you shall not murder"? Is disobeying your parents really worse than murder? Or maybe we should give up on thinking these commandments are ordered?

The overall effect of this order is to get us to see our parents as a connection point between our neighbors and our God. Throughout our upbringing our father and mother stand between us and God and deliver His gifts to us: God clothes us, feeds us, protects us and teaches His Word to us through our parents.

So, parents have a very high calling from God. They are called to be stewards of the greatest gift: the gift of life.


