Pastor's Note:

Then Jesus said to His disciples, "If anyone would come after Me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me" (Matthew 16:24).

Greetings to you, in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ,

"Then Jesus said to His disciples, 'If anyone would come after Me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow Me'" (Matthew 16:24). At these words, many of us hang our heads, breathe out deep sighs, and grudgingly prepare to put one foot before the other, as we reluctantly take up our crosses. We see ourselves as martyrs to the cause of Christ, but martyrs with long faces void of joy. How different from our Lord, "Who for the joy set before Him endured the cross, scorning its shame..." (Hebrews 12:2)!

The word "joy" did not come to Peter's mind, either, when Jesus began telling His disciples what lay before Him. In fact, Peter tried to dissuade Jesus from walking that path He came to take. Matthew 16:22 tells us that Peter "rebuked" Jesus! Jesus' response was just as audacious: "Get behind Me, Satan! You are a stumbling block to Me; you do not have in mind the things of God, but the things of men" (Matthew 16:23).

And isn't that our problem with the whole "taking up the cross" issue? We have an Earthly mindset, not an eternal one. We have a "What about me?" mentality instead of "What about Christ?" and "What about the mission Christ has for me?" Our attitudes need adjusting. "[Our] attitude should be the same as that of Christ Jesus." Who willingly gave up His rights as God and joyfully took on human flesh in order to walk the walk we stumble and fall on, in order to take the penalty for our sin that demands life as payment (Philippians 2:5-8).

February 14th will be marking the beginning of Lent, as we observe Ash Wednesday. This is a beautiful period of time in the church year when our Bible readings and sermons and hymns all focus on Christ's sacrifice. When we think on Christ, He does adjust our attitudes! When we think on Christ, we are compelled to serve as He serves, to give as He gives, to love the unlovable as He loves us, sinners though we are. We eagerly, with the joy set before us, take up our crosses and march victoriously along the paths He sends us.

Lent is a time for spiritual discipline. Often people will choose to give something up for Lent as a type of spiritual discipline. Instead, this Lent, you may want to take on something. Let me suggest a spiritual discipline for you to consider: Read from Luther's Small Catechism every day and read through Luther's Large Catechism once (If you don't have a Large Catechism, and would like to read it, talk to Pastor Burns and he will be able to get a PDF of it for you). This will make the Lenten season a blessing for you.

May our Lenten Journey be a time of reflection on the teachings of Scripture as we look to Christ our Savior. In Christ, Pastor Burns Romans 1:16

Sharing Christ's gifts with those in need

God's Word for Central and South American Missions - Lutheran Heritage Foundation - \$100,000

Lutheran evangelical efforts are being intensified in countries like the Dominican Republic, Chile, and Uruguay. There is an ongoing need for Spanish language Bibles, Luther's Small Catechism, children's materials, devotions and other resources. New pastors who are being trained to be missionaries and evangelists need to be equipped with materials that help share the Good News. This grant will provide for the translation and printing costs of approximately 25,000 books by the Lutheran Heritage Foundation (LHF). LHF will distribute the printed books free of charge to people of Central and South America who live from week to week and are very poor. Economic and political conditions may force missionaries to leave these countries but they leave behind the Lutheran books which continue to teach for generations.


CROSS NEWS

God has blessed Saint Paul's Lutheran Church for over 150 years with faithful members who love their Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. In the Church, as well as in our households, there are times that can be challenging. Saint Paul's is facing this right now. Hymn Studies With Esther- February

The Hymn: LSB #414- 'Tis Good, Lord, To Be Here

The Author: Joseph Armitage Robinson (1858-1933)

Joseph Armitage Robinson wrote this hymn in 1888, basing it on the Gospel for the Transfiguration of our Lord. Robinson, not generally known as a hymn writer, wrote this hymn wile Dean of Christ's College, Cambridge, and assistant curate of Great St. Mary's Church, Cambridge. At the time it was written, hymns for Transfiguration were rare. This hymn was first published in the 1904 edition of Hymns Ancient and Modern. The hymn was introduced to American Lutherans not long afterward in the Common Service Book of the United Lutheran Church in America.

Hymn Background:


In this hymn, we see a portrait of the Transfiguration story from Luke 9:28-26 set in the voice of Peter. The radiance of the Lord and the appearance of Moses and Elijah complete the scene.

Verse 3 looks to both the past and the future. Jesus is confessed as "fulfiller of the past." The foretold Redeemer of Israel is Jesus, the "hope of things to be," for "with the Lord there is steadfast love, and with Him is plentiful redemption."

The final two verses complete the drama, with us, as singers wishing to "hold the vision bright and make this hill our home." This is what Peter wished, who suggested that he build tents for the Lord, Moses and Elijah. The hymn ends with a prayer for God's abiding presence among those who must "leave the mount" and return "to the plain."

When are we singing this hymn?

#414 will be sung on February 11, on Transfiguration Sunday.

Here is a list of all the items needed for the Hospice and Newborn kits.

One Hospice Kit contains these items:

- 1 regular-size bath towel (approx. 52" long), new or gently used
- 1 washcloth, new or gently used (not microfiber)
- 1 bath-size bar unscented soap, such as Dove Unscented for Sensitive Skin, in original packaging
- · 1 toothbrush, in original, individual packaging
- 1 pick-style comb
- 1 nail clipper, Larger size preferred
- · 6 Band-Aids, rubber-banded together
- 1 jar or tube of pure petroleum jelly, such as Vaseline/Approx. 4 ounces, lid taped
- 1 pair heavy-duty household gloves/Kitchen type, size medium

For one Newborn Kit use new or gently used items

- 1 regular-size bath towel (approx. 52" long)
- 1 washcloth (not microfiber)
- 1 bath-size bar white Ivory soap, in original packaging
- 1 newborn cotton t-shirt or "onesie"

Size 0-3, or newborn

- 1 newborn stocking hat/Small size, a newborn's head is about 14" circumference
- 1 baby receiving blanket (approx. 30" x 30")

 Cotton or light flannel, knit or crocheted
- · 2 cloth diapers
- 2 diaper pins

Caring for My Neighbor

If any of the Ten Commandments might tempt us to think that keeping the Law is easy, it would be the Fifth Commandment. After all, how hard is it to get through life without murdering somebody? The vast majority of people can handle that!

But Jesus famously blows up this notion by pointing out that the command, "you shall not murder," goes much deeper — down to the heart.

You have heard that it was said to those of old, "You shall not murder; and whoever murders will be liable to judgment." But I say to you that everyone who is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment; whoever insults his brother will be liable to the council; and whoever says, "You fool!" will be liable to the hell of fire. (Matt. 5:21–22)

Hatred and disdain come from the same sort of crookedness of heart as murder. With both murder and hatred, you look down on another person and think them of little worth.

In the Small Catechism, Luther also points out that every "do not" in the commandments also includes a "do this:" "We should fear and love God so that we do not hurt or harm our neighbor in his body but *help and support him in every physical need*" (SC, Fifth Commandment, emphasis added).

We are not called merely to avoid evil; we must also do positive good.

So when Jesus drew near to us and became our neighbor by taking up our humanity, He came not only to avoid harming us, but He came to positively help us, bless us and serve us.

We are now called to show the love to our neighbors that Christ showed to us. Your neighbor is yet another gift that God has given you that requires your stewardship. We are called to show mercy, to be kind, to love and serve our neighbor. One aspect of this stewardship is financial: our neighbors need us to support the church's work so that they can hear the Gospel and come to faith. Our neighbors need the church's alms and mercy work. Our neighbors need our faithful service in all we do in the name of Christ.
