In early February, I took an exploratory trip north of Tokyo to become acquainted with the third of the three Japanese pastors serving the small confessional Lutheran Ev. Christian Church entity here in Japan.

Pastor Nidaira serves two congregations in Tochigi Prefecture, one in Ashikaga, the other in Utsunomia.

What a blessing to find a well-crafted sermon proclaiming Christ as Savior, clear distinctions of Law and Gospel, the traditional Japanese Lutheran liturgy, and solid catechesis following worship! At the same time, what a great need for prayer that God would bless the faithful ministry of His Word and Sacraments in such a resistant culture!

For those visiting Japan, the land and culture appears to be steeped in religion with shrines, temples, and sculptured images around every corner, in back yards, in the households, and along the country paths.

Paradoxically however, most Japanese consider themselves nonreligious and simply follow societal "customs" without any obligations of specific doctrines or membership.

Their "religious viewpoint" of life along with their customs seem to lie on a moveable point somewhere between the religious and the non-religious depending on circumstance and perspective: sometimes as "Japanese spirituality", sometimes as superstitious folkways, sometimes as traditional customs, festivals, or holidays with religious origins but tenuous religious weight.

What functions as a glass barrier is that Japanese-ness seems embedded, in part, in its distinction against the "foreign" Christian faith.

At almost every funeral, ritual reverence for and communication with one's ancestors beyond the grave endures as the pervasive, religious substratum of the culture.

This is a major challenge for the proclamation of new life in Christ who was crucified for our trespasses and raised for our justification.

Growing Ministry

In addition to occasional visitors, we are very pleased to welcome those staying in Japan for longer periods of time who often come from some distance in order to gather at our Shinjuku Tokyo worship site. Recently Cacey and Moeko Barnett (from the north), Matthew Hetland (from the south), and the Terjesen family from the Yokosuka military base, all found their way to us.

In January, we received news that a new LCMS military chaplain, Rev. Ryan Schnake, has begun serving in Okinawa Japan through the LCMS Ministry to the Armed Forces. We are glad to entrust into his capable hands the work we have carried on there through our occasional visits these past two-and-a-half years.

At our current host congregation, I am particularly delighted that those who use only Japanese have a confessional, liturgical service available in the morning service with Pastor Yoshimura. Those who use only English have a confessional, liturgical service available in our twice-amonth Sunday afternoon service under my care. And those who are bilingual—

or who have invited someone to worship of either category—can worship at either service or at both depending on their preference. For example, on some occasions in the afternoon, everyone is either comfortably bilingual, or struggling to a greater or lesser degree with the English liturgy and sermon. So, for catechesis after the service we switched to Japanese for the greater comfort and understanding of those who were struggling. It reminds me that in heaven there will be those of many nations and languages all worshipping at the throne of Christ. •
