Pastor's Note:

Greetings to you, in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ,

As we journey through the Scriptures, the words of Jesus stop us in our tracks with their bold call to discipleship: *"If anyone comes to me and does not hate his own father and mother and wife and children and brothers and sisters, yes, and even his own life, he cannot be my disciple. Whoever does not bear his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple"* (Luke 14:25-27). These words are not easy to hear (We will be hearing them on September 7th). They challenge us to examine the depth of our commitment to Christ and what it truly means to follow Him.

Jesus' use of the word "hate" is not about fostering resentment or division but about a radical reordering of priorities. Our love for Him must be so profound that all other affections—family, friends, even our own desires—take second place. To "bear our own cross" is to embrace the sacrifices, challenges, and even suffering that come with living for Christ in a world that often pulls us in other directions. It's a daily choice to surrender our will to His, trusting that His path leads to true life, even when it's difficult.

As we reflect on this passage, let's ask ourselves: What are the "crosses" we are called to bear today? Are there comforts, ambitions, or relationships we need to hold more loosely to follow Jesus more fully? The beauty of this call is that we do not walk alone—Christ Himself walks with us, and His grace empowers us to live out this radical discipleship.

One way to grow in this commitment is through the study of God's Word. We're excited to announce that Sunday School begins September 7, 2025! Classes for children, youth, and adults will provide a space to dive deeper into Scripture, ask questions, and support one another as we seek to follow Jesus. Whether you're new to the faith or a lifelong believer, Sunday School offers a chance to strengthen your walk with Christ and build lasting connections within our church family.

Let us prayerfully consider how we can take up our crosses and follow Jesus with renewed devotion. May our time in worship, study, and fellowship equip us to live boldly for Him.

Proposed Congregational Mission Project

[Jesus declared,] “The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed” (Luke 4:18).

At Saint Paul’s Lutheran Church, we are called to live out our faith through service, extending Christ’s love to those in need. With this in mind, I am excited to propose a new congregational mission project: partnering with Lutheran Braille Workers (LBW) to produce materials for the blind and visually impaired. This meaningful initiative aligns with our commitment to share God’s Word and love with all people, including those who face the challenge of visual impairment.

Lutheran Braille Workers is a ministry dedicated to providing free Braille and large-print Bibles, devotional materials, and other Christian resources to individuals who are blind or visually impaired. By joining this mission, our congregation can directly impact lives by making God’s Word accessible to those who might otherwise struggle to engage with it.

Vision for the Project

I would propose that Saint Paul’s commit to producing materials for Lutheran Braille Workers on a regular basis—whether monthly, every other month, or quarterly, depending on what works best for our congregation. This could involve assembling Braille books, binding large-print materials, or contributing to other aspects of LBW’s production process. Volunteers of all ages and skill levels can participate, making this an inclusive opportunity for our church family to serve together.

Why This Matters

The Bible reminds us of Jesus’ heart for the marginalized, including the blind, as seen in Luke 4:18. By partnering with LBW, we can embody this mission, ensuring that everyone has the chance to encounter the hope and truth of Scripture. This project also offers our congregation a chance to grow in faith, fellowship, and service as we work together for a common purpose.

Next Steps

I invite you to pray about this opportunity and consider how you might get involved. At our November Congregational Meeting, I will discuss the logistics, training, and schedule for this mission project. Whether you can contribute time, skills, or simply your enthusiasm, there’s a place for you in this ministry. We as a congregation will decide if we would like to take this on as a Congregational Mission Project.

I pray that we may come together as a congregation to shine Christ’s light in a tangible way, bringing the gift of God’s Word to those who need it most.

--\$348 donated to the LWML Mite Box Missions

Hymn Studies With Esther- August 2025

***All information taken from Lutheran Service Book- Companion to the Hymns, published by Concordia Publishing House**

The Hymn: LSB 547, The Lamb

The Author: Gerald P. Coleman (1953-2023)

Hymn Background:

According to Gerald Coleman, the composition of this hymn began with a visual image. In 1985, a fellow seminarian, James Disney, mounted an exhibition of his paintings. One of them, entitled “The Lamb of God,” showed a white lamb on a black background. The legs are tied and the Lamb seems to be still, except for the impression that it is offering its neck.

The text, tune, and setting were written during a three hour summer school class at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. Coleman wanted to bring together the sacrificial suffering of the Lamb and the vision of the Lamb upon the throne by portraying both through the lens of triumph. He wrote the tune first, ending each stanza with the refrain, “Worthy is the Lamb, whose death makes me His own! The Lamb is reigning on His throne!” After experimenting with word choices and rhymes, he was able to complete the text, tune and setting before the end of the class period.

During a weeklong break from summer school courses, Coleman went to Nebraska to play for an ordination. A friend, Frank E Winter III, invited him to spend the week with his parents and brother at their home. Frank’s mother, Carla, was a fine church musician. In gratitude of the Winters’ family generosity to him, Coleman named the tune WINTER. He said to Carla at the time, “Some people get flowers: you get a hymn!”

Personal Note:

Pastor Gerald Coleman was the campus pastor at Concordia University, St. Paul, while Pastor and I attended. He was a dear man, and had a rich, deep singing voice, an amazing talent at the piano, and gave the BEST hugs. When Pastor and I were married at the chapel at CSP, Pastor Coleman (or PC as he was known to students) performed our ceremony. He now rejoices in Heaven, and, I’m sure, is accompanying the heavenly choir of angels on the piano.

When are we singing this hymn?

#818 will be sung on Sunday, August 31st, the 12th Sunday after Pentecost.

Jesus' transforming presence

“But Zacchaeus stood up and said to the Lord, ‘Look, Lord! Here and now I give half of my possessions to the poor, and if I have cheated anybody out of anything, I will pay back four times the amount.’ Jesus said to him, ‘Today salvation has come to this house, because this man, too, is a son of Abraham. For the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost’” (Luke 19:8-10 NIV).

Who knew, all those kids sitting in Sunday school were getting a lesson in stewardship! Generations of children have very often heard lessons based on the familiar account of Zacchaeus. The diminutive tax collector's curiosity surrounding the person and ministry of Jesus is what the Holy Spirit used to set him on a collision course for a total stewardship transformation. This transformation, according to the text of Luke 19, is not just about this life. This stewardship transformation is about eternity as well!

Remember the story: Zacchaeus was a tax collector. Do not think of friendly neighborhood IRS agents. This was more like a toll booth operator, but the governing authorities did not set the toll. They would contract men to staff roadside booths and tax the commerce that was passing along the road. This was an enterprise full of greed and graft. The tax collectors would take as much as they could and only pass on a portion to the government. The rest did not go into the community chest either! It went into the pocket of the tax collector.

This is why the people had such disdain for *Jewish* tax collectors. They were seen as both crooks and traitors. They were crooks in that they extorted their compatriots and others in the toll process. But worse, they were seen as traitors because their efforts supported the occupying Roman authorities. That is the real reason that the people would not make way so that short Zacchaeus could see Jesus.

For this reason, he runs ahead and climbs a tree. He had heard all the stories. He wanted to see this Jesus with his own eyes. Mercy is on display. This hated crook and traitor gets a direct audience with Jesus — at Jesus' own request! Jesus invites Himself to Zacchaeus' house. This is where the transformation is about to take place!

Notice how Jesus does it. He does not preach a three-week sermon series, nor does He ask Zacchaeus to make a pledge. There is nothing programmatic about Jesus' approach. But Zacchaeus is completely transformed! The transforming force is the very presence of Jesus! Direct time with Jesus takes a crooked, selfish, criminal and makes him the most faithful steward.

This new life of stewardship is marked by the promises made. First, he gives half of his ill-gotten gains to the poor. These are people whom he would not have defrauded at all! Yet, after spending time with Jesus, they are His first concern. Only after this does he double the requirement of the Levitical law on fraud. And what does Jesus say is the result? Salvation!

Doing the acts of stewardship does not save. Rather, the faith in Jesus that is created by the Holy Spirit is what saves! This is critical for us to confess. Failed stewardship can and will cut you off from God. The only antidote for failed stewardship is the presence of Jesus.

We do not need to run ahead and climb a tree for this presence of Jesus. He makes Himself available to us every week in the Divine Service. He speaks His Word of invitation to us in the pages of Holy Scripture. This, and this alone, transforms us from sinner to saint, from owner to steward of all that belongs to the Lord.

Do you want to become a more faithful steward? Spend more time with Jesus. Make the Divine Service a weekly priority. Feast on Christ's body and blood weekly! This is the great gift that brings salvation from God's House to yours!

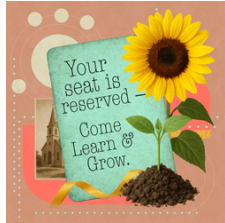
