Happy New Year!

Every New Year, I make a few New Year's Resolutions. Lately, they always seem to be the same ones. I'm going to exercise and watch what I eat. I will spend less time in front of screens and more time in nature.

They are all good goals, but I realized something recently. Rarely are my New Year's Resolutions religious in nature. Most of the time, they are about my physical health, not my spiritual health. So, it got me thinking about some spiritual resolutions for the New Year.

And the one I keep coming back to is forgiveness. Jesus is very clear about our need first to accept forgiveness but also to offer forgiveness to those who have wronged us.

Accepting forgiveness can be difficult, often because we don't think we need it. It can be tough to look at ourselves honestly and realize that we have done something that has hurt our neighbor. This is closely related to bearing the Good Fruit of repentance, which we know we need to do. We must acknowledge our sins before we can receive forgiveness.

But equally hard is to forgive others for their sins against you genuinely. Often, we say things like, "It's okay." Or even "I forgive you." But what we are really thinking is, *I'm going to keep my eye on you*. If I catch you doing that to me again, I will pounce on you with full force.

But this isn't Biblical forgiveness. Biblical forgiveness begins in the forgiveness won for us on the Cross. This is total forgiveness that we need to return to repeatedly. And when God forgives our sins, the Psalmist tells us, **As far as the east is from the west, so far does he remove our transgressions from us.** (Ps. 103:12 ESV) And the writer of Hebrews tells us, "For I will be merciful toward their iniquities, and I will remember their sins no more." (Heb. 8:12 ESV)

We should endeavor to extend this time of forgiveness to others. The type of forgiveness that doesn't wait to be sinned against again, so we can throw their past sins in their face. It is forgiveness that the world would call gullible. Then Peter came up and said to him, "Lord, how often will my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? As many as seven times?" Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you seven times, but seventy-seven times. (Mt. 18:21-22 ESV)

This might be the most challenging resolution I will make this year. Because of our sinful human nature, the Old Adam in us doesn't truly want to forgive others. So, we can have an emotional trump card when we need it. But if God loved us so much to die for us, shouldn't we be willing to extend that forgiveness to others as best we can?
