Pastor's Corner

New Year's Resolutions?

As we begin a new church year in December, I'm reminded that people love to make "New Year's Resolutions" at the beginning of a new calendar year. While living in Florida I worked out at a local YMCA. I really enjoyed the stationary spin bike classes. But every year, like clockwork, at the start of January the YMCA parking lot was always full!! Why? People wanted to fulfill their New Year's resolution to get in shape. They were going to exercise and lose weight (although many people workout and then go to Starbucks and get a calorie laden latte and wonder why they're not losing weight).

Around mid-February the YMCA parking lot was back to normal, and many car parking spaces could be found. Why? Many had tried to keep up with their resolution, but for various reasons they couldn't keep up with them. Of course, there were those few who did keep their resolution and became "regulars" at the Y.

Why does this happen so often? People set good intentions to fulfill a "resolution," but end up not following through. Many times, when we make these New Year's Resolutions, we're setting ourselves up to fail. New Year's Resolutions are lofty goals that are really "laws" that we want to apply to ourselves. When we put ourselves under the law, we will all too often fail to keep that law, resolution, or intention. Laws can be kept when a penalty is involved for breaking them, but most wouldn't penalize themselves for missing a workout session, then another, and another.

You're probably thinking by now, get to the point Pastor? As we begin a new church year some might be inclined to make a "New Church Year Resolution." That resolution being to be in worship more often and be involved in Bible Study and church activities. That would be such a great goal and I wish you would all make that resolution and keep it!! But, as mentioned before, motivation by the law is often bound to fail.

Rather than concentrate on "resolutions" and "goals," as you read this stop and ask yourself this question, "What do I need?" Some might think of Abraham Maslow's atheistic/humanistic hierarchy of needs, but I'm being simpler than that. Humans will go to great lengths to satisfy their idea of what they need. Teenagers to-day would have temper tantrum meltdowns if their parents took away their cell phones. After all they really need their phones, and don't we all?

When we're hungry or thirsty our bodies let us know that we need to eat and drink. When we're sick, we need to go to the doctor. Unfortunately, all too often we don't recognize our need for the most important thing in this life that gives us eternal life: THE FOREGIVENESS OF OUR SINS. This is why I wrote to stop and think about what you need now. Do you need forgiveness of sins? If you're honest, you'll have to say yes.

The place where you get the certainty of forgiveness is in the Divine Service, through confession and absolution, the Word of God, the sacrament of Jesus' body and blood. The means of grace are just that; the way we receive the grace won for us by our savior Jesus Christ. All that Jesus did on the cross for us and his resurrection are given to us through his means of grace.

Rather than focus on how you can fulfill a "resolution" this church year, ask yourself about what you need. Do you need forgiveness? The good news is it's here for you because you need it.

Lessons from the Wise Men

"Magi from the east came. . . On coming to the house, they saw the Child with His mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped Him. Then they opened their treasures and presented Him with gifts of gold and of incense and of myrrh." Matthew 2:1, 11)

We don't often think of the Wise Men as stewards, but we can learn some valuable stewardship lessons from their actions. First they came. They didn't stay in their homes, studying the ancient books and watching the stars and wondering. They followed the one star some distance in order to find the newborn King. Then they entered His house and bowed before Him. They were kings in their own right, yet they submitted to a Baby, because they acknowledged that Bab6 to be Who He was. They present to Him. By all these acts, they worshipped Him.

As stewards, we, too, are to seek the Lord where we can find Him. We are to enter His house where we find Him in Word and Sacrament. We are to submit to Him in reverence, acknowledging Him as King of kings. We are to come with gifts in our hands to offer Him.

Will our worship require sacrifice? Look at the sacrifice of the Magi. They left their luxurious surroundings and endured difficult travel for many days, weeks, maybe much longer. They sacrificed their own power as they knelt in worship before the Baby. They sacrificed their treasures. Does our sacrifice compare? (We haven't even mentioned the sacrifice of our Savior Himself in coming to this sinful world!)

Search you Bible to find other examples of people sacrificially worshiping their Lord (Start with Matthew 26:6-13).

Prayer: Dear Heavenly Father, forgive me for considering my own comforts and convenience and neglecting proper worship of You. Give me joy in sacrificial stewardship. Return to me the joy of my salvation that results in grateful service through all the gifts You've given me. Through Christ I pray. Amen.


2023-2024 Assistance Recap:

We have several projects that are coming along very well.

First, the new utility building has been started and the contractor is close to getting the footings poured. We expect to have the foundation complete before Christmas. Photo is view from preschool sidewalk looking towards parking lot.



Second, we are converting our phones to an AT&T fiber optic VoIP system. The foodbank and the church phones will be connected thru the internet infrastructure so Linda will be able to direct a call to the foodbank without requiring the caller to hang up and redial the foodbank number. This means that all our 40-year-old wiring infrastructure will become obsolete and our recently installed internet infrastructure, a combination of fiber and CAT 6 cable will be the backbone of our communications system.

We also will be having a general workday outdoors around the church on December the 9^{th} to rake leaves and do general maintenance. Please come and join us for the morning. We will start around 8:30am.



What you need:


- A strand of Christmas lights
