Pastor's Corner

A LENT AND EASTER PREACHING AND WORSHIP

Sermon series by Erik Rottman

No Old Testament saint attests to God's grace quite like King David. Raised from the sheepfold to the throne of the house of Israel; raised again (and again, and again) from sin: pride, murder, adultery, and despising of God; lifted clear of the snare of the wicked (Psalm 119:110), of the pit (Psalm 30:3), of the very gates of death (Psalm 9:13); with no merit or worthiness in himself, David was continually raised up by God's grace and favor.

God's grace wells up in Psalm 41, where David exults in divine mercy amid his own weakness, powerful enemies, and treacherous friends. In this psalm, David tracks the flow of divine grace back to its source at the cross and, with prophetic vision, finds it springing forth in the lives of all baptized believers—including you.

How has God's grace raised you? If you haven't been set on a royal throne or made ruler over a great people, maybe you've seen improvements in your finances or employment. Or perhaps family strife has been quieted. Or maybe a compassionate helper or valuable ally has entered the picture at just the right moment. Have you shaken off a bad illness, a bad habit, or a bad influence? If so, rejoice and thank God for His grace and favor!

But if you feel like you're sinking instead of rising, what then? Is there any comfort for the saint of God who looks around to find that "the waters have come up to my neck" (Psalm 69:1)? David knows that saint's fortunes because they are his as well:

In the day of trouble, the LORD delivers him; the LORD protects him and keeps him alive; he is called blessed in the land; You do not give him up to the will of his enemies. (Psalm 41:1–2)

You have a certain hope! Therefore, do not look for hope in your experiences or your emotions, which will portray for you the same bleak scene that David captures in Psalm 41:

- * My enemies say of me in malice, "When will he die, and his name perish?" (v. 5)
- * When one comes to see me, he utters empty words, while His heart gathers iniquity. (v. 6)
- * Even my close friend in whom I trusted, who ate my bread, has lifted his heel against me. (v. 9)

Faith offers a better vision: despite all that binds and bruises and bleeds you, God will raise you up. He has raised you already! In Holy Baptism, God has "raised us up with Him and seated us with Him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus" (Ephesians 2:6). If you are in Christ, how can you sink? How can you fall?

Lent is the ideal time to meditate on David's ordeals and your secure position in Christ. Psalm 41 provides the ideal guide to your meditation. If the laments of Psalm 41 call to mind your numerous difficulties and need for deliverance, they depict even more clearly the work by which your deliverance has been won through Jesus Christ! David "prophesied about the grace that was to be yours" and "searched and inquired carefully" concerning your salvation (1 Peter 1:10). And that salvation is this: the Son of David, by grace, "might taste death for everyone" (Hebrews 2:9).

Are the scheming enemies of Psalm 41:5 not the foes of Christ, who is sustained on His sickbed (v. 3) but the one by whose wounds you are healed (Isaiah 53:5)? Even the close friend of our Lord has lifted his heel against Him (Psalm 41:9). God be praised, all these sufferings are yours too! Or "do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into His death" (Romans 6:3)?

Because you are in Christ, you share in all things with Him, even the prophetic Word. David's vision in Psalm 41 has become your reality in Christ. In the day of trouble, the Lord delivers you; the Lord protects you and keeps you alive; you are called blessed in the land (see Psalm 41:1–2). Press on to know the Lord's suffering, death, and Word. As surely as the Lenten journey ascends to the victory of Easter, you shall be raised up.

Trustee Updates

January 20, 2024

It has been a busy time since Thanksgiving and we have accomplished several projects and are making great progress on others.

Our utility building is making good progress. As everyone can see, it is fully built and now the side walls are insulated and the drywall is installed. The electrical is all roughed in. The next steps will be to finish the electrical, finish the drywall and install the HVAC units and lastly, it will be painted.

During the past several months we have with the great help from Bill Terrill and Jack Basler, have gotten the fiber optics internet access to the foodbank and have



finally gotten the new phones installed and working correctly. So, the internet and phone systems are ATT and we no longer use Comcast for anything. In total, it means that our streaming of service is greatly improved, and we have a reliable phone system at less cost than with Comcast. We will remove our 40-year-old phone system that has served us well but can no longer get it serviced.

For the past several years, we have annually added wood chips to the school playground. The result of that is we were having the level of the playground higher than the building at the entrance to the school. It also caused damage to our fence due to wood chips pushing against it. During the Christmas break, we took the fence down, scraped out a lot of the wood chips and reestablished the grade to have rainwater flow away from the building. The playground was recovered with new chips and the fence was put back up with new reinforcing. All in all, it looks very good.

Currently there are issues with three of the HVAC units, #s 7,8, and 9 which will be somewhat expensive to repair so we will be adding some funds to the budget for next year to cover some ongoing expenses for HVAC.

We have had the boots replaced on all the vent pipes to stop some water leaks in the education wing during heavy rains. These should hold us until we replace the entire roof in approximately five years.

Spring training for Christians

The word Lent comes from Middle English and German words for springtime. In light of the start of baseball season, some people call the pre-Easter season "spring training for Christians." This fresh perspective moves away from the flawed understanding that Lent must be somber, or that giving something up for Lent is punishment for sin or a way to earn God's favor.

As people of faith, we should never take a season off. But every so often — at least once a year! — we do well to examine where we need to get back in shape spiritually. Perhaps we will indeed opt to give something up: that swearing habit, sleeping in on Sundays, or the cost of a weekly treat so we can donate the money instead. Or maybe we'll take on something new for Lent: a Bible study, prayer routine or service project.

Hebrews describes spiritual discipline as challenging in the moment but yielding righteousness later. The writer urges us, "Lift your drooping hands and strengthen your weak knees ... so that what is lame may not be put out of joint but rather be healed" (12:11-13, ESV). May the spring training of Lent strengthen and heal us all.



Food Bank Ministry Board: December 2023 TLC Epistle

Timothy's Cupboard - Status Update

The restructured Timothy's Cupboard food bank operation started in November 2023. Changes to the enabled retail store donations included Monday pickup (Sam's Club, Walmart, Target - Woodstock and Target – Canton) and Tuesday pickup (BJ's - Woodstock and Target - Woodstock). The format for the updated food bank operation format included a single day (Mondays) for "stocking" and only one day (Tuesdays) open to clients. We extended the food bank "open" hours for clients (on Tuesdays) to incorporate (merge) Thursday's clients to Tuesdays.

One of the goals for the restructuring was to downsize the food bank operation to better align with the limited number of volunteers willing to help. It is questionable if this goal was achieved, as the willing volunteers are working twice as hard to assist needy families (hunger). The 'open' hours on Tuesdays have been extended to help our client families to receive food donations from us.

At this point, we will continue to target Fridays to receive deliveries from ACFB. Each ACFB delivery has a minimum 4,000-pound weight, so volunteers will be needed on those Fridays to help sort and store (shelf) the delivered items.

This does not mean there won't be any work on other days. There are still tasks that will need to be done:

- Assembling the dry boxes for the clients (coming on Tuesdays). Currently we are pre-assembling
 approximately 60 dry boxes per week usually on Wednesdays through Sundays (timing is flexible to allow
 volunteers to work around their schedules). We need volunteers to step up to help with this task.
- Reporting enabled retail store donations (poundage), and monthly summary reports.
- Placing orders with ACFB must meet minimum 4,000 pounds for delivery
- Shopping at local stores for food items not available in ACFB inventory.
- Sorting and storing purchased items ordered from ACFB that currently are delivered on Fridays (averaging every third week or more frequently as we are headed into the holiday season).
- Other activities or tasks.

There is an urgent need for more volunteers to help with these tasks.

The client family / household information has been migrated from hard paper files to digital format utilizing Oasis Insight software (web-based / cloud- based). The food bank office has been shredding the hard copy files to protect the client household data as the migration to computerized database has occurred.

Recently Timothy's Cupboard was awarded a \$10,000 equipment grant from ACFB Fall 2023 Grant Program. We are prioritizing equipment requirements to address our operational issues and needs.

Timothy's Cupboard Results through December 2023

The table below highlight the results of the full year of 2023.

- The results of 2023 continue to look promising to be better than the past two years, but still below the performance of previous years (between 2018 and 2020).
- The 2023 forecast is close to 78% of any of those years.

- As expected, the month-to-month results of 2023 seem to be fluctuating with no definitive pattern.
- Starting in November 2023, Timothy's Cupboard switched to a "single client day" per week (Tuesdays). For November and December, the food bank has averaged 53 client households per client day. Looking at the three prior months (August – October 2023) which averaged 26 client households per client day – so in a normal week (with two client days), that would equate to 52 client households.

Kid's Corner



Make this heartfelt craft as a decoration or gift.

What you need:

- Yarn
- Scissors
- Parchment paper
- Baking sheet
- Heart-shaped cookie cutters
- ¼ cup cornstarch
- ½ cup water
- Adult help



What you do:

- 1. Cut yarn into 12-inch pieces.
- 2. Place cookie cutters atop a baking sheet lined with parchment paper.
- 3. Combine cornstarch and water in a saucepan. Heat mixture over medium heat, stirring until thick and smooth. Remove from heat and cool to form a "glue."
- 4. Dip each piece of yarn into the mixture to coat completely. Squeeze off any excess.
- 5. Place yarn in the cookie cutters, allowing pieces to cross and loop within the heart. Add more until the cookie cutter is filled and the yarn looks like a heart.
