



FROM THE PASTOR'S *Pen*

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

A blessed new year to you and yours! As a new year begins, I want to use this month's newsletter article to introduce our theme verse for 2024, and offer some application for our current context.

I chose these passages from Psalm 37 because of their reference to future expectations. You see, we are going to be doing quite a lot of thinking about our future together as a congregation in the year ahead. The Ministry Clarity process that we have decided to use to establish a long-range plan for our future will be intended to involve and include as many members of the congregation as possible. While some will be asked to serve in leadership roles, the input of the entire congregation will be vital to ensure that whatever plan is created is "our" plan – is your plan – for the future.

See how the Psalm promises a future for the "man of peace." Of course, that Man refers first to Christ, the one who came to bring peace on earth, as we recently heard the angels announce to the shepherds (Luke 2). The Man of peace has a future. Risen from the dead, Jesus lives eternally. And what is more is this: by His blood you and I are those who are marked and blameless and upright. By the blood of Christ you are a man of peace, and you also have a future.

Of course, that future includes the glorified life in the new creation. But it also includes the life of blessing which we are given now by the grace of God according to His abundant blessings. You have a future. Together, we also have a future. As the people of God – as a Christian congregation – as those who are marked by the sign of the holy cross in our Baptism as blameless and upright, the body of Christ at Trinity has a future. What a joy it is to go forward into 2024 with this sure and certain promise.

But note also what the Psalm says about those who are



"Mark the blameless and behold the upright, for there is a future for the man of peace. But transgressors shall be altogether destroyed; the future of the wicked shall be cut off."

– Psalm 37:37-38

transgressors – those who are wicked. Their future "shall be cut off." This is where we must also be reminded of the Christian humility that will be necessary for us to engage in a productive planning process. For each of us will be tempted to seek our own desires, to be quick to speak and slow to listen, to think that we know what is best for the body, or to become frustrated at the actions of others. And make no mistake, we will transgress one another. Sinners working together are going to sin against one another. And if we were to continue in such sinful actions the Lord would indeed work to cut off our future together.

But we are no longer marked by our sin or identified by our wickedness. Rather, we are those who freely confess, who desire to walk together in the bond of peace, to forgive our brothers and sisters in Christ, and who will trust the promise of forgiveness to bind us together when we have done wickedness. What this means is that we will go forward in this planning process trusting the LORD not only to forgive us, but to bind us together, and to give us a future together – which is the very thing He has said He will do.

I hope you will take some time to read the Ministry Clarity report. As long as we are in this process, each month's newsletter will include such a report so that you are always kept informed about what is happening, who is currently involved, what stage of the process are we in, what events are coming up, and what is going on.

In addition, as we begin the planning process it is important that we ground ourselves in the Word of God. So please consider joining us on Sunday mornings during the month of January for adult Bible Class. Beginning January 14th, I will be teaching a three-week study entitled: What Is the Church? What Is Her Ministry? What Does this Mean for

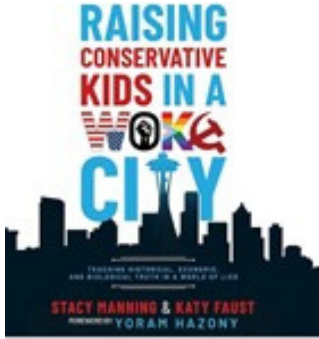

FOR ALL THE SAINTS:

St. John Chrysostom

January 27th

O God, who gave to your servant John Chrysostom grace eloquently to proclaim your righteousness in the great congregation, and fearlessly to bear reproach for the honor of your Name: Mercifully grant to all bishops and pastors such excellency in preaching, and fidelity in ministering your Word, that your people shall be partakers with them of the glory that shall be revealed; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

St. John Chrysostom was born in 347 in Antioch (where the followers of Jesus were first called Christians). His feast day would ordinarily be on September 14th, the day of his death, except that is the Feast of the Holy Cross, so he is commemorated on the day his body was transferred to Constantinople (where he had served as archbishop), January 27th. He was trained in rhetoric at an early age and developed great skill, becoming a lawyer. As he grew more committed to the Christian faith, he became a hermit to study the Holy Scriptures. In time, he was ordained a priest and began applying his rhetorical skills to the Holy Scriptures. He focused on explaining the scriptures and applying it to the lives of his people, and he became greatly loved for his preaching. One incident that happened during his service in Antioch illustrates the influence of his homilies. When Chrysostom arrived in Antioch, Flavian, the bishop of the city, had to intervene with emperor Theodosius I on behalf of citizens who had gone on a rampage mutilating statues of the emperor and his family. During the weeks of Lent in 387, John preached more than twenty homilies in which he entreated the people to see the error of their ways. These made a lasting impression on the general population of the city: many pagans converted to Christianity as a result of the homilies. The city was ultimately spared from severe consequences.

One consistent theme of his preaching was on the abuse of wealth and the neglect of the poor. One example:

Do you wish to honour the body of Christ? Do not ignore him when he is naked. Do not pay him homage in the temple clad in silk, only then to neglect him outside where he is cold and ill-clad. He who said: "This is my body" is the same who said: "You saw me hungry and you gave me no food", and "Whatever you did to the least of my brothers you did also to me"... What good is it if the Eucharistic table is overloaded with golden chalices when your brother is dying of hunger? Start by satisfying his hunger and then with what is left you may adorn the altar as well.

After being appointed archbishop of Constantinople (the imperial capitol), he added to that preaching against the abuse of power. Not surprisingly, this earned him the anger of both the emperor and empress, as well as the social elites and, sadly, many of the clergy, who were quite accustomed to their power and luxuries. This ended in St. John being exiled during which time he fell asleep in the Lord. So beloved was he for his preaching, that he is remembered to this day as Chrysostom, the golden mouth. In spite of all of the hardships and difficulties of his life, the Golden Mouth's last words were, "Glory be to God for all things."

The December Winkel was held on Tuesday, December 12th, at St. Paul's, Sedalia, hosted by Pastor Jeremy Freeman. Pastor Smith led a Bible study on 1 Samuel 15:10-35; Pastor Braun led a book study on Carl Trueman's *The Rise and Triumph of the Modern Self*. The January gathering will be held on the 9th at Zion, Lincoln. There remain three congregations in the circuit in a pastoral vacancy: 1) Faith, Warsaw; 2) St. Paul's, Stover; & 3) Trinity, Clinton, which has extended a call to Rev. Matthew Brackman, of Texas City, TX. Please continue to pray for these congregations as they continue the call process, and for Pastor Brackman as he deliberates.

Learning to acknowledge the abundance of God's blessings to us is the beginning step of putting together the gift plan within our overall estate plans.

"Did you have a good Christmas?" Beginning December 26th, you will probably hear that expression a lot. Most answer with a litany of the gifts they received or the parties or gatherings they attended. Sam was asked that same question by his good friend Daniel.

At first Sam felt awkward, finding it difficult to formulate an answer. But then he remembered something very unique about this Christmas. He and his wife had been working with their LCMS Foundation Gift Planning Counselor to put together an estate plan that would certainly include inheritance for family but would also include a bold commitment of financial support to their favorite ministry and a missionary halfway around the world.

Through regular communication they had pictures of people who had been baptized and come to faith through that mission activity. They kept all those pictures on their refrigerator. This year they purposely planned to share their estate plans with their kids. They began by telling them about inheritance. Then they spread out all those pictures from the refrigerator all over the kitchen table where they were sitting, talking about their intended gift for ministry. To their shock and joy, their children didn't even ask questions about inheritance but asked their parents to tell the stories of those who are now part of Jesus' Kingdom. "That time of sharing with our kids was the highlight of my Christmas holiday," Sam said. "Now my kids are asking how they can be part of supporting the same missionary."

PPC BRIEFING OF THE DECEMBER MEETING

The Parish Planning Council (PPC) met on December 21st, 2023. We had a full agenda of business which we enjoyed going through efficiently while enjoying a charcutier tray of goodies.

We voted on two motions which passed. The first motion was to approve our service contract with the LCMS Foundation for another year for the continued assistance by Terry Gerdt to provide families in our congregation with financial planning. The second was to approve the final 2023 distributions of the "Helping God's People" endowment fund to assist the needs of three families totaling \$2,000.

The Trustee Team reported the completion of mold remediation of the vicarage bathroom and attic. The cost came in at about one third of the pre-approved estimate of \$15,000. The trustee team is evaluating LED lighting options as the old incandescent bulbs are increasingly difficult to find, increasing in price and of much lower quality than ever before.

The open position of PPC Secretary was approved to be filled by Lauren Cox beginning in January 2024.

We spent the last portion of our time doing the initial work on the Clarity Ministry Long Range Planning effort by reviewing the "core team" job descriptions provided to us by Pastor Kennaugh, our Clarity Ministry consulting leader. The core team is made up of 8 team directors. Each director is responsible for just a portion of the project. The PPC identified a list of potential candidates within our congregation who represent a cross section of our membership and are well suited for these roles. Once the core team recruiting is completed, the core team will go through a 1-2 hour training session led by Pastor Kennaugh. Our target is to conduct the training during the second week of January. Immediately after the training the Visioning portion of the project begins. The main objective of the Visioning phase includes a survey that is sent to the congregation to solicit input on opportunities for our ministry.
